Editorial

"Has worked well" was the writer's long remembered comment in his school report for history when he was twelve. That was in the days when a space of one line was allowed. It could, of course, have also cleverly implied that he achieved little!

This is leading to a few lines about words and paper. You must have noticed how newspapers, magazines, circulars, reports, guide-lines, guarantees, instructions, strategies, aims and objectives have grown in size to almost ridiculous levels. The questions: are things made clearer? Do we actually read any more? Are they necessary? Who benefits? Why are we doing it? Could we be using paper, ink, people, skills and time to better effect? How much paper goes straight to the recycling bag?

It seems sometimes that organisations which are there to deliver services, are over -staffed with people telling us what the organisation has done, is doing, or is planning to do and how it is planning to do it! We just want it done, and then we can see the results for ourselves; no need for the paper and the time spent on it.

Schools have to spend so much time writing down what they hope to achieve and what the students have achieved, that they have a reduced time to actually teach. A case recently saw the police spending an inordinate amount of time writing reports and taking details twice over, just to deal with someone handing in, honestly, some cash they found. So not 'on the beat'. You must have noticed the number of people and the amount of paper and the time spent around the reception desk of every hospital ward. So not actually nursing. The 'utilities', the district and county councils send us frequent journals of what they are doing. Why? We only want them to do what they are supposed to do, then we can see the results. They'd have more staff

available for the 'service'!

Even the National Park, which we do not automatically, like some people, blame for every ill in the area, does however seem to have a big proportion of its staff engaged on rather less important matters than the immediate work needed 'on the ground'.

We ourselves are not faultless. It's easy to use three words when one would do. It is also easy to resort to the same limited vocabulary instead of thinking about and choosing a more apt, or even interesting, word. Misunderstandings and confusions aren't automatically cleared up by using more words, but by using fewer, carefully.

"He was a man of few words" they sometimes say in praise. We assume he was a man of many good deeds. Councils, Authorities, Utilities, delegates, leaders, all of us:- off our backsides, let's get DOING! There is plenty of work: caring for the environment or caring for others.

And we've kept this editorial shorter

The Consultative Group for the Central Dales GP Practice

Synopsis of the July meeting

Cllr Blackie has been appointed to chair this Joint Committee. 11 Parish Councils / Parish Meetings are now paid up members i.e. all those in Wensleydale served by the Central Dales Practice and Muker in Swaledale. Low Abbotside is in the process of linking with Askrigg so had not been asked for a separate donation. Dent, Garsdale and Melbecks Parish Councils are Associate members.

Preparation for the Swine Flu pandemic was discussed. If patients are not able to identify a 'flu friend' then the Practice, with the verbal permission of the patient, will phone the Parish Clerk, the Health Watch representative or the person responsible for emergencies in the parish concerned for advice on someone prepared to be a 'flu friend'.

The Central Dales GP Practice is in the process of getting a new computer system that will be hosted by a company in Leeds. Patients will be asked to avoid going to both surgeries **10th-17th September** if at all possible whilst the new system is being installed.

Notes on the meeting with Pete Summerfield of the Yorkshire Ambulance Service and the Hawes & High Abbotside Parish Council meeting with the PCT have been circulated and the latter meeting resulted in the resolution of cross border journeys. In response to the request for views on hospital transport from the Richmondshire District Council Scrutiny Committee it was agreed that the Health Watch should write and support the proposal for OAPs to be allowed to use their bus passes before 9.00am to enable them to get to hospital.

The delay in awarding the 5 year Dentistry contract was causing concern. It was felt people would feel much more confident of signing up when the 5 year contract had been awarded.

The Richmondshire branch of the North Yorkshire LINk has identified as priorities: Out of hours dentistry;

Extra and continuing care inc. Community Nurses;

Hospital discharge information; A&E

It was agreed that a publication and website of Health and Social Care contacts and information would be a good use of the LINk funding available for the next 18 months

Several items from the local Press were discussed, including taking suspected stroke patients to James Cook and the temporary suspension of Maternity and Sick Children's services at the Friarage. The extra nursing for chronic patients was a management rather than a hands-on service. The Diabetes trial in the Practice had been well attended.

Best Foot Forward

Where the Park goes wild.

A lifetime is too short to know every area of the Dales and there are some bits that often get missed altogether, save for a quick view from a car.

So with this in mind I took off for the top end of Arkengarthdale beyond Whaw, a vast open area you might have noticed on either side of the drive up to Tan Hill from Langthwaite.

I won't bore you with the details of more invisible rights of way across miles of open moor and marsh that eventually lead to the National Park boundary among some beautiful thick heather, but I do want to tell of two lovely *Gills*.

Returning down the dale from the boundary, William Gill comes in from the right with its bonny beck tumbling down among bracken, heather and boulders and there is a wide track. (It crosses two concrete fords with no footbridge so there could be a deep crossing after rain). It feels quite like being in the Highlands of Scotland to me.

After a mile or two travelling SW to William Gill Houses (no houses), a long bridleway coming from Tan Hill can be followed SE for two and a half miles over Great Scollit Hill, Annaside Edge and West Moor. This narrow track among the heather is a delight with a wide view to the left over Arkengarthdale, eventually arriving at some old coal levels at the head of our next gill— Great Punchard. Here again a wide easy track accompanies the beck below to the right passing interesting lead mining remains. Swinging round to the right, then left at Whaw Moor, we are soon back to the road near Whaw village.

This little village did have a welcome tea room, but do not be deceived; although details are still on the internet, it isn't there! However, a lovely riverside walk leads to Langthwaite and the C.B. Inn.

I do think, however, that after two or three days, I've got the upper reaches of Arkengarthdale out of my system! A.S.W.

New Store for Hawes

Swine Flu

possible that there could be resurgence in infection rates once the kids go back to school. So here is a quick reminder about what to do if you suspect you may have swine flu (raised temperature, generally feeling unwell, joints aching)

Firstly, **DO NOT** come to surgery. The poorly patients in our waiting rooms will not appreciate sharing your virus particles, nor will the clinical staff who are needed to treat them. If you are otherwise healthy, contact the National Pandemic Flu service on 0800 1 513 100 or online at www.direct.gov.uk/pandemicflu. will be asked a series of questions about your symptoms & underlying medical problems. Should the service decide you need antivirals, you will be issued with a voucher code. It is best to nominate someone - a 'flu friend' to pick up your medication on your behalf. This person will need to provide evidence of identity, preferably photo ID, for you & themselves at the nearest antivirals distribution point. The nearest points for the Upper Dales are Hogg's Pharmacy at Hawes or the pharmacy in Bedale. Out of hours (OOH), it is possible to pick up antivirals from the OOH centre at the Friarage hospital, but you must contact the OOH call centre first, redirected automatically to the OOH call -B82045.nhs.uk centre. Neither Hawes nor Avsgarth surgeries can distribute antiviral medication.

For those patients who have no flu friend, please contact your local surgery & we will arrange for a local volunteer to collect your medicine on your behalf. This service is being co-ordinated by your local parish councils, using volunteers who will be paying for their own fuel to help you, so

please do not abuse their kindness.

It is annual flu jab is required), or infants under one, or pregnant women, please telephone your surgery for advice. Most cases will be diagnosed & treated via telephone consultation. If your doctor decides that a direct consultation is necessary, this will probably take place at your home.

> The vaccine against this strain of flu is still under development. Once it becomes available, we will invite our 'at risk' patients for vaccination. The usual winter flu vaccination programme will be undertaken as normal, though this vaccine will not confer immunity against the swine flu strain. Consequently, some patients will be offered two flu vaccines this autumn.

In mid September the practice will be changing over to a new computer system. Consequently, please minimise your contact with the practice between Thursday 10th - Friday 18th September. During this period we will not be able to process routine repeat prescriptions, so if vour script falls due at this time please order by 9th Sept at the very latest. Only urgent doctor consultations will be offered during this period. Normal service will be resumed on Monday 21st September.

Railway passengers will be arriving in Hawes in September (by bus link from Redmire)! The excursions for WR passengers will be to Hardraw Brass Band Contest (Sunday September 13th); the Dales Harvest and Classic Bus Rally events (both Sunday September 20th) and to Richard Fawcett's Working Sheepdog event (Thursday September 24th). Please make our passengers welcome if you meet them!

Vintage buses meet every WR train at Redmire on Tuesdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays (until November 1st) to provide a link onwards to Hawes and Garsdale station. It's a pleasant ride in the opposite direction too! Why not have a trip out before the season ends? (The other regular vintage buses you see on Tuesdays run from Kirkby Stephen; they go on from Hawes up to Ribblehead station). Senior Citizen bus passes are valid for FREE travel on the vintage bus services, Dales and Distict bus services - and also on the Little Red Bus which runs six days a week between Hawes and Garsdale station.

WR's scheduled DMU trains run between Leeming Bar and Redmire 6 days a week in September (not on Mondays), with a Diesel Gala on Fri./Sat./Sun. September 25th/26th/27th. Have Your Say About Improving Services at the Museum

Eleven years on since the redevelopment of the Dales Countryside Museum, we are now considering how to improve the services we provide.

Until August 31st there will be a display in the reception and an opportunity to contribute to the consultation process. Every day 9.30 am- 5.30pm.

National Park staff will be in the Community Office in Hawes on the 1st September between 10.00am 4.00pm, to discuss possible changes and hear your views.

The museum celebrates its thirtieth birhtday this year; to enhance the exhibitions already available and offer visitors an artistic interpretation of the Dales, Piers Browne has donated his collection of number 1 etchings, worth over £1million, to the National Park Authority. To be able to display and house the etchings DCM is proposing to build a dedicated gallery.

The donation has come at a time when DCM is considering a wider refurbishment. The Museum last had major works in 1998 and has since been surveying visitors to gather opinion on the attraction.

However, we have consistently received feedback that visitors have difficulty findto tell the free and paid for exhibitions apart. They also wish to purchase refreshments during their visit and are disappointed that there is nothing available onsite.

We want the future of DCM to address these issues and we also want the whole community to benefit from any changes and get a local operator involved in the provision of refreshments in a similar way as we did at Aysgarth Falls

DCM commissioned Turpin Smale catering consultants and Xsite architecture to explore development options in the form of feasibility studies. The resulting report highlighted that "the development would add positively to the local economy, rather than detract from it, and would present a business opportunity for a local operator [in terms of a coffee shop]". In addition "a net total of between £0.3 and £0.7 million per annum of additional local spend" is estimated from visitors attracted by the development and could support between 4 and 13 full time equivalent jobs (net).

Xsite architecture recommended a number of internal and external creating a new entrance and reception area along with converting part of the platform building into a coffee shop.

So! The glorious twelfth has been and gone, and it seems they had a grand day for it. My local shoot admitted to a smaller bag than predicted, but they excused them-Maybe I am a cynic, but I seem to have heard that one before. The grouse and the heather spell the beginning of Autumn for me and I feel inspired to take cuttings from the best of the shrubs. Semi-hardwood I suppose I should call them, but it's not always true as some put on late growth which makes ideal cutting material as long as it has no flower shoots. It's better to avoid flowering shoots simply because their energy is being channelled into the flowers and they struggle to make roots as well. Some people like to take hardwood cuttings very late in the season. This produces rather larger plants, but it is well into next year before any signs of growth appear, that is if they've taken.

Spiraea Anthony Waterer has been glorious this year, but its rich, red panicles of blossom are going over now. It's very easy to propagate, but if you plant it be prepared to give it serious discipline or it will take up lots of room. Shirobana with both pink

and white flowers is a more docile cousin. but not as good for cutting, and Little Princess is another handsome plant which can be kept small: my 20 year old specimen is barely 3 feet tall and I shall attack it shortly with the shears to tidy it up and remove the spent flowers.

The potentillas are looking really good at the moment, and they sell well when in flower. Abbottswood, the classic white is always popular and so is Grace Darling with showy flowers in mottled pink. There are all manner of yellows and creams with foliage ranging from strong green to almost grey. My favourite is Hopley's Orange which is really vivid and striking even on a dismal day. If you're looking for good value, low maintenance shrubs potentillas are hard to beat. They need extra water until they have established a decent root system, but after that all they really ask for selves on the grounds of high winds! is the occasional haircut and they flower for

> One of this year's real treats has been Hydrangea Arborescens Annabelle. I bought it years ago and it has been disappointing. Not so this year - perhaps it liked the rain. It is now covered in huge creamy white mop heads, some of them must be six inches across. More cuttings! I hope they don't take as long to root as the Petiolaris cuttings which I have been carefully watering since early June. Even though it has taken years to establish it must be worth a try.

Heavens Above

One of the most interesting stars in the early autumn sky is Algol - The Demon - famous in astronomical circles for its long, slow 'wink'. Algol is usually about as bright as the Pole Star but every few days it fades quite noticeably losing half its brightness in just over four hours. It stays quite dim for about 20 minutes, and then slowly returns to normal. The explanation for this strange behaviour is that Algol is made up of two stars, one brighter than the other, circling round one another every two and a half days. Because they're almost edge on to our line of sight, when the dimmer but larger star passes in front of the brighter one, it gradually cuts off its light making Algol

You'll find Algol in the constellation of Perseus, high in the eastern sky for the next few months. Perseus looks like a ragged upside-down 'Y' roughly midway between Cassiopeia and the Pleiades star cluster. Algol is the constellation's second brightest star and lies at the south-western end of the 'Y'.

The Milky Way flows through this part of the sky and along it's length there are several fine open star clusters. Look out for the 'Sword-Handle' a double star-clusterj ust about visible as a hazy patch to the naked eye but a magnificent sight with binoculars or a low powered telescope. Perseus himself was the legendr hero of ancient Greece who slew the snake-haired Medusa, a dreadful Gorgon so horrible to look at that anyone seeing her was instantly turned to stone. On old star maps Perseus is often shown holding the Medusa's severed head with Algol marking the creature's malevolent eye.

Raydale update



There are now visible signs of the environmental work which the project has initiated. Down at Marsett the flood damaged part of the meadow on the Yorkshire Wildlife Trust nature reserve has been fenced out ready for tree planting. Where all the flood debris was deposited willows, alders and birch will be planted in the winter months.

At Low Blean, where Little Ing Sike flows into Semerwater, the banks have been fenced out to help reduce erosion. Cattle will no longer be able to trample the bank sending silt into the lake. Here, once the weeds have been dealt with, it is hoped to enhance the vegetation by introducing tall herbs. No tree planting will done so that the view of the lake from the bridge is preserved.

Along the west side of the River Bain the bank has been fenced out for a different reason. Here the livestock are being restricted from access so that willows can be established. During the winter four species of native willow will be planted. When fully grown these shrubby willows will form a more or less continuous tree cover linking Bain Gill woodland to the woodland on the west of the lake. Continuity of woodland habitat allows other species to spread and this is an important part of coping with climate change. The willows will also soak up any remaining soil nutrient coming from the productive fields above which will protect the water quality

of the river.

Looking to the future, residents of the four villages in the Raydale Project catchment ie Bainbridge, Countersett, Marsett and Stalling Busk are invited to an **Open Meeting at Sycamore Hall on Wednesday October** 7th **at 7.30pm.** Steve Welsh from Waterpower Enterprises will explain how a Community Hydro Scheme works for the benefit of local people..

Three Horseshoes, Wensley

This newsletter sometimes previews new ventures or a fresh start by new proprietors but on this occasion we're looking at the Three Horseshoes in Wensley a few months after the re-opening to see how things are going, now that summer is well under way.

David and Rachel Hunt took over the tenancy in March this year. They had a very successful opening night with a great many people there. However, there was some doubt in their minds about whether trade would be sustained once the novelty had worn off. Such fears were completely unfounded as the amount of business has been well beyond their expectations. The pub always has a busy feel to it, which, of course, adds to the atmosphere of the place.

Getting ready for the opening required a tremendous effort - there was a lot to do by way of renovation and decorating. David and Rachel were able to call on an army of volunteers from around Thoralby where they used to live but even so the pub was only just ready in time. Now it looks bright and clean, an attractive traditional Dales pub.

Both David and Rachel have a wealth of experience and it shows. David's calm, professional manner in the bar and the quality of Rachel's catering are based on years of working in a variety of establishments, many of them local. David trained and worked in the Wetherby area before moving to the Dales and spending three years as bar manager at the Wensleydale Heifer. Rachel trained in Buxton and has been chef at several establishments in the area. So they know the Dales well and they know what people like. 60% of the clientele this summer has been 'local', i.e. within a 20 mile radius. No doubt that figure will rise as winter approaches and visitors disappear. There may be some 'theme nights' in late autumn if trade slackens sufficiently.

Walking into the bar there is always a friendly welcome. There is a good choice of ales with a guest ale always on tap. The food menu looks appetising and doesn't disappoint. All meals are homemade with fresh ingredients and there is a flexible approach to special requests. Of course, the same could be said about many hostelries in the dale (aren't we lucky?) but the Three Horseshoes is well able to hold its own against the competition.

What of the future? Plans are afoot to move the toilets inside, which is quite a big job, but otherwise the aim is just to continue providing a quality experience. With reports of up to 50 pubs closing every week nationally, it's good to see one pub which looks as though it has a secure future. **N.P.**
