

Editorial

Up north, wherever you choose to define it, there is this feeling often lurking that we don't get a fair crack of the whip compared with money awarded to what seem to us to be less worthy areas in the south and south east. It is apparently true, for instance, that London gets twice the per-capita to spend on public transport that we do. You only need to see Portillo's railway programmes with some of the clapped out rolling stock still on our suburban routes from Leeds or Manchester.

So it is partly good news that politicians are turning their attention to the 'Power House' of the north with Greater Manchester already having a taste of devolution in what are still going to be times of big cut backs. A sort of Liverpool- Manchester- Leeds axis is also talked about.

But what is the north? Unlike Greater London which tends to be within a well-defined metropolis, there are several up here. Start in the west: Liverpool/Merseyside, Greater Manchester, the Leeds/Bradford hub for the old industrial West Riding; don't stop there! Hull/Humberside with the hugely important Immingham Docks, then the Sheffield hub for the area of South Yorkshire. Turn north to Middlesbrough/Teesside, and on to Sunderland, Newcastle/ Gateshead (they feel somewhat ignored by the northern powerhouse).

Are they all part of the great northern powerhouse? If not, you can imagine some serious squabbling over limited resources. To be fair, it isn't all doom and gloom. Consider these: regeneration of Docklands on Merseyside, the still-developing excellent tram network in Manchester, Bradford desperately trying to shake off the effects of lousy planning in the 1960s, Sheffield's trams, Hull – soon to be City of Culture, plenty of riverside development on Teesside (but not good news about the underused airport), Newcastle/ Gateshead and Sunderland with the Metro and an ever-increasing arts and culture scene (not that the others haven't got these too).

So what's missing in all this, and the main point we want to get at? What we have just described is what much of the country still thinks 'the north' is, i.e. URBAN!

A vast proportion of the north is deeply and preciously rural. Seven areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty: Arnside/Silverdale, Forest of Bowland, Nidderdale, Howardian Hills, North Pennines, Northumberland Coast and Solway Coast. Five of the country's National Parks: Lake District, the Dales, the Peak District, North York Moors and Northumberland. It just might be that these all

(sometimes attracting criticism and complaint) could be our salvation.

Despite the fact that funding has been desperately cut, with more to come, these areas are still looked upon by all governments as vital resources "to conserve and enhance the natural beauty, wildlife and cultural heritage" and "to promote opportunities for the understanding and enjoyment of the special qualities of National Parks". In carrying out these purposes, they have a duty "to seek to foster the economic and social well being of local communities". This brings tourism, money and prestige.

Anything which raises the profile of areas like ours is all to the good with our essentially rural council areas of Richmondshire, Hambleton, Ryedale, Craven, Eden, County Durham, the Yorkshire coast and of course, Cumbria and Northumberland. The greatest danger for us is that the concentration on the urban 'power houses' could take the attention away from, and further reduce funding, for our very rural areas.

Maybe we need a working together, a "Northern Rural Power House". Of course, we can't expect huge injections of government cash- there aren't enough of us- but an equal amount <u>per capita</u> would be nice, plus an appreciation, not just in kind words, of the value of our National Parks and AONBs and the other really rural areas of the north, to the well-being of the whole country. "GREFRUN": Greater Recognition for the Rural North!

Just after the draft of this editorial was written ,we received a media release on behalf of AONBs and the National Park, with quotes from the Chairs of National Parks England, the National Association of AONBs and the Environment Minister, saying very similar things and referring to a new report "So much more than the view". We suggest you 'google' it!

places in Yorkshire, they have stood the test of time and are vandal-proof: no arm to bend off and you can't rotate the square post in the ground! I




have the greatest disaffection for those who think swapping signs around is funny.

and in our endeavour to rationalise or standardise (sometimes forced upon us by legislation) we lose what ought to be preserved.



More Healing

I talked in the last issue about the acute/inflammatory phase of tissue healing. Let's assume you've got through those first few days without re-injury or disruption. Next comes the rebuilding phase, which can last up to 14 days following injury for muscles. Remember these guidelines are for muscle injuries; tendons, ligaments and other soft tissues can take much longer to heal. If you've disrupted the acute phase, you will need to add a day or two onto that phase before moving on to the rebuilding phase. Pain and inflammation are your guide throughout this phase, if you ignore them and do too much too soon you will ultimately end up prolonging healing and the new tissue will be less functional.

The body is now starting to build tissue. You can begin to gradually introduce load to the tissue – remembering that although the wound may have healed, it won't be strong. Continue with passive movements and introduce very careful and controlled load bearing, little and often, throughout each day. Gradually increase either the load or the repetitions each day, varying each increase until you reach normal levels of activity pain free.

Be vigilant for inflammation and pain – signs you've over-done it. Continue icing/compressing and elevating if this happens. Compression is good to continue with throughout this phase to support the weak tissue. Stretching is ok but again be very vigilant – remember you are doing it to educate the tissue about length and the direction of forces which it will have to withstand. Gentle, slow stretches, don't worry about being progressive at this stage, unless the tissue feels ready and strong enough for it. Get through the rebuilding phase without any hitches and you're well on the way to the injury being fully healed and functional again!

days as well) persistent strong winds and few sunny days so far, the baskets and troughs are beginning to really get going and are now showing colour.

A total of 120 large baskets have now been hung on new strong hand-forged brackets bolted to stone walls. This year stronger basket chains and hooks were used as well and so far they have withstood gale-force winds within days of hanging.

Over seven thousand individual plants have been planted in troughs, pots and various containers around the town, requiring over 150 large bags of potting compost.

The 'tractor display' now installed up on the green at school corner seems to be pleasing visitors and residents alike, and I hope you agree year.

The Town Foot display with troughs on the railings and just one planted island is much less of a headache for watering and general maintenance and I have lowered the big troughs as I believe they were limiting a clear view of traffic for some heights of vehicles.

Thanks to the Parish Council, Hawes Market Toll Trustees, Hawes Market Hall, The Portas' Fund, Hawes Social Club, our pubs, shops and Community and Post Office (thanks for counting out all that loose change!) and all those who have contributed and supported so generously in various ways.

> The Yorkshire Dales Food Network has been set up to boost awareness of the huge variety of food producers in the Yorkshire Dales. It also aims to improve trade by connecting them up with retailers, restaurants, accommodation providers and consumers within the National Park. It is led by a team specialising in marketing, food production and hospitality.

> A new website - eatthedales.co.uk - has been launched with the help of a £10,000 grant from the National Park Authority's Sustainable Development Fund (SDF).

New Benefice

On **July 1st 2015** there will be a new benefice created called the **Benefice of Upper Wensleydale** and the area of this new benefice shall comprise of the parish of Askrigg and the parish of Stalling Busk, the parish of Hawes and the parish of Hardraw.

Well what does this mean?

What it means is that the Church Commissioners have redrawn the parish boundaries around each of the above churches and made one big parish boundary around all four

Each of the churches will remain distinct having its own Church Council and Treasurer. There will be no joining of the finances or decision making for each church. In effect they will be completely separate churches within the boundary of one parish called The Benefice of Upper Wensleydale.

Well why have they done it then?

In theory, the process began a long time ago when they joined together the parishes of Hawes with Hardraw and Askrigg with Stalling busk; each pair having only one vicar instead of two. When the vicar of Hawes retired they then took the process a little further by having only one vicar over the four churches. Well actually the churches didn't have a vicar they had a priest in charge placed there by the bishop until the Church Commissioners made this process complete. A priest in charge is a clergy person who has been placed in charge of a church or churches by the bishop to look after those churches for the bishop until the new parish has been created.

So what happens now?

Actually nothing! The churches will continue as they always have and as they have done since 2009 when the new vicar of Askrigg, Hardraw, Hawes and Stalling Busk came to live at the vicarage in Hawes.

What is going to happen is that the churches are going to have a celebration day on **Sunday July 5th.** This celebration day is going to take the form of a safari as follows:

9.00am in Hardraw church with a short service of celebration followed by a breakfast of bacon butties

10.30am in Hawes church with another short service of celebration followed by morning coffee /tea and scones

Noon-ish in Stalling Busk church with yet another service of celebration followed by a soup and bread lunch

2.30pm-ish in Askrigg church with the final service of celebration followed by afternoon tea/ coffee and cakes

Everyone is welcome to join us in any/all of the churches to celebrate – all of the short services will be different! We look forward to seeing you there with us to acknowledge this momentous event in our churches history.

Strolling through a wildflower hay meadow is like stepping back in time. With their abundance of colourful native wildflowers, and the gentle buzz of pollinating insects hard at work, these once-common sights can evoke a sense of romance and nostalgia.

A hundred years ago these ephemeral beauties

could have been found in most parishes across the country, but today only 3% of our meadows remain. Nearly 7.5 million acres



of wildflower meadow have been lost, and they are still under threat.

Across the Dales we are fortunate that small fragments of wildflower-rich meadows and grasslands still survive thanks to traditional farming techniques, providing a snapshot of our cultural heritage, and a vital opportunity to take action to protect and restore meadows before it is too late.

Since 2006 the Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust has been working with farmers across the region to reintroduce native wildflowers to land that has lost its botanical diversity and beauty. So far more than 1100 acres of degraded meadows have been tackled across the Yorkshire Dales and Forest of Bowland.

Now, with 97% of our meadows having been lost over the last century, it's a poignant reminder that much more work is needed to look after the few remaining meadows and work with farmers to ensure that others are restored to their former glory. At YDMT we are looking to the future with our ongoing programme of meadow restoration and education work, helping to ensure that traditional flower-rich meadows can be enjoyed by our grandchildren.

Police Report

A mixture of native trees including rowan, downy birch, hazel, hawthorn and blackthorn have been planted in Bishopdale to create this new 100 acre woodland, which it is hoped will become a vibrant habitat for a range of native wildlife species.

The woodland (known as Longridge Wood, with its open day last month) is located on the hillside between West Burton and Cray, and forms part of



the Dales Woodland Restoration Programme - an initiative which aims to double the amount of native woodland cover across the Dales by 2020. partnership including local charity Yorkshire Dales 2nd place behind Bedale in the league table. Windows 10 again

If you have a computer with Windows 7, 8 or 8.1 chances are you have seen a new little icon appear at the bottom right hand corner of the screen. It is black and white and looks like a picture of a window in four panes (a bit like the key on most keyboards to the left of the space bar). If you hover your mouse over it a message pops up saying Get Windows 10.

As far as I can tell Windows 10 will become available at the end of July and for most Windows 7 and later users is likely to be a free upgrade during the first year.

A few quick questions and answers:

- 1) Should you upgrade now? No! There will be questions teething problems in Windows 10 and in particular carol.haynes@dalescomputerservices.com there are likely to be some issues with the upgrade process in the early days. Hold fire for a few months and let them get rid of the gremlins before you take the plunge.
- are making the effort to make the transition easier.
- 3) What about Windows XP and Vista users? If you is becoming more and more insecure - but your reps. from Procter's and LWB have been invited. existing hardware might not be good enough for Windows 10. Windows Vista is still a current operating system and receiving support so there is no need for immediate panic.
- 4) What should I do before upgrading? This is very important – before even contemplating upgrading do a full backup of your computer. There are facilities in Windows 7 and Windows 8 to do a System Image Backup of the whole computer on to an external hard disk – you should do this before even thinking about doing the upgrade - that way if there is a problem you can restore your computer back to the way it was. It is probably also worth getting a simple backup of all your files, photos, etc. on to an external device so that you can't potentially lose anything in the process. Upgrades usually work OK but you can never guarantee the process will work 100% of the time!.

Office Software

A number of people I have spoken to don't want to upgrade to latest versions of Microsoft Office with annual subscriptions etc. (which will probably become standard in the next release of Micorosft Office) and have asked for advice about alternatives.

If you need an equivalent to Word, Excel and Powerpoint I recommend downloading and installing LibreOffice from www.libreoffice.org. This is 100% free for private or business use (you can give a donation which would be appreciated). LibreOffice grew out of the OpenOffice project and is compatible with Microsoft Office and OpenOffice files. There are a few differences in the way it works but for most people it provides everything you need at a very good price!

Good News for Wheelchair Users

Wheelchair users wanting to explore the breath-Ivy Dene, Middlegate, Burtersett DL8 3PA 0r taking scenery of the Yorkshire Dales now have even more information and support at their fingertips to help them plan their trip.

> Two £5,000 grants from the National Park Sustainable Development Fund have been a welcome boost to Huddersfield-based Experience Community, which provides films information about walks and other leisure activities for wheelchair users and the wider community.

> The not-for-profit Company is now producing short films showing four different routes in the National Park that offer varying degrees of challenge to wheelchair users. Two covering Malham Tarn and Aysgarth Falls are now available on Experience Community's website, while the others are in the planning stages. The films explain the route length, path surfaces, gradients and any other potential obstacles, and are also on YouTube.

> The second SDF grant will help Experience Community to buy a third Mountain Trike for use by wheelchair users on rougher terrains. A series of free taster sessions has been planned so people can gain experience and confidence to tackle more challenging routes.

> The next will be held on July 3rd and 4th in the Freeholders Wood at Aysgarth Falls in Wensleydale from **noon to 4.00pm** followed by a taster ramble on July 5th starting at noon at Bolton Castle. To book a place please

Heavens Above

You may notice we've two Full Moons this month - one on July 2nd and the other on the 31st. Some people call the second Full Moon in a single month a 'Blue Moon' but I'm not sure why as it's not a particularly rare event. The bright naked-eye planets, Venus and Jupiter, have put on a great show this year but not for much longer I'm afraid. On July 1st you'll find them close together low in the south-west soon after sunset looking like a brilliant mismatched double star. Over the following few weeks they slowly draw apart and sink lower in the sky before disappearing into the twilight at the months end.

If you've a really flat north-western horizon and a decent set of binoculars scan to the right of Jupiter (much dimmer than Venus) between July 5 -8th and you might *just* glimpse Comet PanSTARRS which should be at its brightest then. Don't despair if you can't pick it out though, as it will be a very tricky object in the bright evening twilight. The ringed planet, Saturn is a late evening

• Hands-on Heritage Woodworking Experience object low in the south-west in the constellation of Libra the Scales but it's pretty poorly placed for observation. Both Mercury and Mars are a bit too close to the Sun to be seen this month

The nights get just that little bit longer in July but you'll still have to stop up fairly late to enjoy a properly dark sky. Roundabout mid-night see if you can pick out the three bright stars - Vega, Deneb and Altair - which form the well known 'Summer Triangle' asterism. It dominates the high south right through the Summer months and well on into Autumn. Look out for the rich stream of the Milky Way running through its middle down towards the dense star clouds of Sagittarius low on the southern horizon. A lovely sight in binoculars.

Sagittarius is home this year to Pluto, formerly the solar system's ninth planet but now

reclassified as one of a new species of dwarf planet. It was only discovered in 1939 by Clyde Tombaugh a American young astronomer, and is so small and faraway



even the largest telescopes only show it as a Day minute point of light. All being well, however, we admin@gaylemill.org.uk

should soon get some really good close up views of this remote little world along with its five moons when Nasa's New Horizon probe whizzes through the system on July 14th. The spacecraft is travelling at 31 thousand miles an hour and after an epic nine year journey covering more than three billion miles will only have a scant few hours to complete its mission. It then sweeps onwards to explore the uncharted outer reaches of the Solar System. Who knows what it might find out there! Have clear skies!

Leyburn Cycling Group was set up in 2011 and organises weekly social rides all year round, primarily for the over 50s, though anyone is welcome.

Rides are on Thursdays, starting at 9.30am from Leyburn Market Place. To add variety to the rides roughly every 6 weeks we have an "away" start from places such as Ripon, Northallerton or Wharfedale. Prunings



How comforting it has been to feel the sun and enjoy a little warmth, I did wonder if it would ever happen. As I write it is mid-June and I was shocked the other night

when the forecast suggested that there was still a risk of overnight frost, not something you really want to hear.

It is such a wonderful time for colour. I sat in the sun in a tiny garden, lush evergreens on one side - Laurel, Ivy, Choisia, sported a myriad shades of green, amongst them were dark red flowers on a Weigelia, whist overhead hung the drooping racemes of Laburnum. It was just magical, and I suspect, very low maintenance.

Strange how late the Ash trees have been this year. The Horse chestnuts are flowering, the Rowans already have developing berries and the Ash is barely in full leaf. I hope this is not a sign of the dreaded Ash Die Back. The Dale will be a poorer place without them. Some of the most spectacular blossom just now is on the Hawthorns which are resplendent. It always interests me that, if left to their own devices they grow gnarled and floriferous, but in a neatly trimmed roadside hedge their summer colour is the reddish tips of new growth.

All this growing is an indicator that this is a good time to take cuttings, as most plants will have lots of healthy shoots. I prefer to snip shrubs now making softwood cuttings, rather than wait for hardwood cuttings later. In principle the technique is the same: select healthy non flowering shoots, cut them about five inches long, trim to just below a node (leaf joint), strip off most of the leaves, nip out the growing tip, scrape the stem gently to expose the cambium and plunge them into seed or cutting compost. Water them well, this helps to settle the compost, and keep in a warm, sheltered place not letting them dry out. Don't be tempted to test them, you will know if they have struck when fresh growth appears or roots poke out at the bottom. Its amazing how quickly and easily some will root.

Honeysuckles come into their own in early summer and they really are a brilliant multi-purpose plant. They will scramble up trellis, cover eyesores, provide both colour and scent, whilst a judicious

choice of cultivar can produce a long season of flowering. Moths and pollinators love them, large established specimens can be nesting sites for birds and the berries will feed our feathered friends in winter. Most Honeysuckles (Lonicera) have strong scent but a few of the showier ones such as L brownii "Dropmore Scarlet" and orange flowered L tellmanniana are unscented, so be careful when you choose. For the best scent go for yellow flowered "Graham Thomas" or any of the Dutch honeysuckles. For best results they like their feet in shade and their heads in the sun. They can become tangled, but are easy to deal with. Cut back early flowering forms by a third when the flowers fade. Thin out Japanese forms in spring, shortening long whippy stems. They can be renovated by cutting back to a suitable framework, and if all else fails they'll forgive you if you cut them back to a couple of feet above the ground.

Good luck! And whatever you grow, take time to enjoy it.
