Christmas Guest Editorial

SEVEEERN is no longer heard in Len's distinctive tones, above the glitz and glamour that marks another season of Strictly Come Dancing. This catch-phrase has been replaced by 'it's never too early for a TEN from Shirley' as the show moves onward towards the final showdown and then the Christmas Special. By then any remaining blisters will have burst, figures trimmer as weight has been lost (or redistributed), spray tan applied (again and again), sequins stitched and fleckles fleckled, as music and dancing have become one long celebration of all that glitters - which, for one couple, will lead to the glitter ball award of 2017.

Whilst TV scheduling, and adverts in particular, seem quick to declare we are only, perhaps, seveeern weeks from Christmas Day, there are times when we need to pause and remember what it is we are celebrating: could it be the biggest present given (or received), or maybe families sharing meals and spending time together, or do we remember the birth of God's only child - marked by numerous nativity productions, Christingles, and carol services throughout Wensleydale.

So, if we begin with a present, of whatever size and cost, it's clear that gifts given equal presents received: gifts from today, the present, for use tomorrow, to bring joy to somebody else. Whether offered to, or received from, family and friends, the gift becomes a symbol of relationship: the annual Toy Service in Hawes on 3rd December offers everyone the opportunity to demonstrate our care for those less fortunate than ourselves.

Perhaps the annual family gathering, or a meal together with friends, provides your Christmas celebration moment: an abundance of food, cutlery and emergency chairs pressed into use by folk arriving from far and wide. Left-overs the next day remind us of the people and conversations shared. Yet we know all too well, how many families rely on Foodbanks, with the one based in Richmond being used ever more frequently.

I wonder how many households could use this Advent period to place an item of food, daily, in a box at home by way of preparing for Christmas, and then offer the 25 items gathered to the Richmond Foodbank, as their gift for others during the Christmas season?

Christmas nativity productions might well provide that 'warm, fuzzy glow' as older generations watch their youngest take part in the traditional Christmas play, create a Christingle and sing familiar carols round the Christmas tree. Carols that tell the story we think we know so well; Christmas songs that narrate the nativity becoming the comfort blanket we cling to at Christmas because, well, 'we've always done it this way.'

But at Christmas we celebrate something new, extraordinary and completely unheard of before: God becoming small enough to hold in a manger, in the arms of you and I - Emmanuel, God with us, today.

Beneath the paper wrappings, there's an open stable door.

Beneath the fir tree trappings, there's a welcome and there's more.

Beyond the tinsel fairy is a presence that's divine,

There's a child to change the future, turning water into wine.

Clare Stainsby's carol cleverly takes us beyond the reality of Christmas in Britain today – of the multitude of gifts, over-eating and the Strictly glitter ball - to marvel at the presence of the divine in a stable in Bethlehem. Through the words of this carol we are encouraged to look, look everywhere - and with the right eyes you will see God this Christmas-time.

Indeed, it is certainly worth celebrating that there is so much more to this Christmas season than the stuff that will be thrown out with the recycling in the New Year. Whatever you are doing- preparing, performing or partying- I wish you God's blessing this Christmas-time.

Medical Alert Bracelets

How many residents in the Dale have an allergy to peanuts, paracetamol, penicillin, or anything else? We have searched the web for suppliers of silicone medical alert wrist bands, but they want to sell you 1000 at a time rather than single ones. I have called our local chemists who do not stock them – nor do Boots the Chemists. You can buy metal bands, but they are expensive and some people are concerned that a chain around your wrist could be dangerous.

Eventually we came across a supplier at Alnwick in Northumberland who sell a plain silicone band with Medical Alert printed on the outside for £5. We checked it was a comfortable size and rang straight back with an order for one red silicone band (other colours available). Printed inside the band we requested the name of person, phone number, the allergy, and blood group as hospitals need to know that information so treatment can start quickly. You can have whatever information you wish on it. It came the next day, at a total cost of £11.95.

You can contact the ID Band company at Alnwick by telephoning 0800 999 3669 or go to the web site www.theidbandco.com. They do not deal with personal callers to their offices. Hope this can help you and your relatives and friends to have peace of mind.

History of Hawes Parish and People.

I am wondering whether if, through the pages of your excellent newsletter, I could ask a favour of your readers.

We live in New Zealand, my father-in-law Arthur Mann Dinsdale came to New Zealand in 1928. His father was James William Dinsdale who was born in Hawes in 1880 (his parents being James Dinsdale and Alice Mary Chapman, daughter of Simon Chapman of Gayle).

I have been putting together the Dinsdale family tree for my husband and on a recent visit to London I discovered a wonderful book entitled "Under Wetherfell - The Story of Hawes Parish and People" by James Alderson. published by Rev. James Alderson c1980 and printed by Offset Lithography at Wensleydale Press. Hawes. The copy I found was in the Society of Genealogists Office in London and I would love to be able to obtain a copy for us if possible. I have not been able to find the book online through the secondhand book sites and wondered whether any of your readers might have a copy of this book sitting in their bookshelves which they would be happy for me to purchase.

We have visited Hawes on a number of occasions, the last time being over Christmas of 2012 when we had a wonderful week staying in a cottage in Gayle exploring the area. My husband never had the opportunity to meet his grandfather James who became a Methodist Missionary, (my father-in-law Arthur was born in Bridgetown, Barbardos in 1911) so filling in the family background is very important to us, our children and future generations.

Heavens Above

This month's Geminids meteor shower - debris from an asteroid called Phaethon - is one of the best of the year. It's active between December 8th-17th reaching a peak on the night of December 13th/14th. The Geminid display is famous for producing lots of brilliantly coloured 'shooting stars'. With the Moon out of the way, you might see 30 or 40 an hour streaking across the sky. The best time to observe is after midnight, when the Earth turns face-on to the meteor stream.

There's a real shortage of bright planets in the evening sky this winter, with only the two dim outer planets, Neptune and Uranus, on show. All the action is in the morning sky. Sadly, Venus and Saturn are lost to view, but you should be able to spot Mercury very low in the south-east just before dawn towards the end of December and the first week of January. Jupiter and Mars are also in the south-east slightly higher in the sky. They rapidly approach each other as the year turns, and by January 7th around 6 am, are barely a quarter of a degree apart – a striking sight in binoculars.

We have two 'Supermoons' in 2018, the first one on January 2nd. So-called Supermoons occur when a Full Moon coincides with the Moon's closest approach to the Earth in its orbit, causing the Moon to appear a good bit larger and brighter than usual - see if you can notice any difference.

This year's Winter Solstice, marking the official start of winter, falls on December 21st. The Sun reaches its lowest point in the sky as seen from the northern hemisphere, and we get the shortest day and longest night. Most of the bright winter stars are already well on show. however, and by late evening towards the middle of the month, the southern sky is filled with a host of bright star patterns. Orion, the Mighty Hunter of ancient mythology, dominates the scene. His outline is quite distinctive with a sloping line of three stars forming his 'Belt' and the red-giant star, Betelgeuse, marking his left shoulder. See if you can spot his Sword, the famous Orion Nebula, hanging just below the middle Belt star. Orion is trailed by his two faithful 'dog stars' Procyon and Sirius. Sirius,

the brightest of all the stars, is unmissable flashing like a diamond low over the southern horizon. Procyon, nowhere near as bright, lies by itself to the east of Orion below the twin stars Castor and Pollux in the constellation of Gemini.

Orion faces up to his old enemy Taurus the Bull to the west. Look for orange-tinted Aldebaran, a red-giant star marking the beast's baleful eye. Taurus is home to two of the best open star clusters in the sky — The 'V'-shaped Hyades (forming the Bull's Face) and slightly higher up, the Pleiades or Seven Sisters—they're both great targets for binoculars. Almost overhead is a really ancient constellation—Auriga the Charioteer. It's bright yellow leader, Capella, is the sixth brightest star in the sky.

On a moonless night you should be able to make out the pale band of the winter Milky Way flowing down east of Orion towards the southern horizon. A gorgeous sight on a sparkling winter's night.

Season Greetings and here's to lots of clear skies in 2018.

Charity Begins Close to Home at Low Mill Outdoor Centre

When we moved to Helm a few years ago we were prepared for the animal visitors that are part and parcel of living surrounded by livestock. An unexpected bonus is the host of human visitors that walk by, especially during term time! Kitted out in wellies, safety helmets and waterproofs and accompanied by their instructors these are groups from Low Mill Outdoor Centre on their way to gorge walk in the Gill. They start excited, and dry, chatting about what's to come and return a couple of hours later often wet but always with a great sense of achievement.



Seeing these children and young adults experiencing and enjoying this beautiful place is a great tonic, whether it's the excitement on their faces or sometimes simply their reaction to getting a closer glimpse of the dairy cows. It's clear that the original vision of The Rev. Malcolm Stonestreet and The Askrigg Foundation to make the Yorkshire Dales act "as the lungs of the city" is still being met, with people of all ages and abilities experiencing outdoor adventure, learning new skills and meeting personal challenges.

In 2016 the Low Mill team of Instructors, Housekeepers and Administrative staff, led by Terry Hailwood, enabled over 2,000 children and young adults to experience a whole range of activities in the local area. You may have seen them abseiling at Appersett viaduct, canoeing on Semer Water, gorge walking at Mill Gill or geocaching on the moors. Both residential and day groups are based at the Low Mill Outdoor Centre. Once a water mill on the outskirts of

Askrigg the building is now specifically designed to accommodate school groups and wheelchair users following the original conversion and the completion of the purpose built 'Wing'.

Last year saw the Centre celebrate its 40th anniversary – a great achievement made even more impressive as Low Mill is an entirely selffunded local charity. The Friends of Low Mill are a group of local people with a great knack for fund raising - 5k fun runs, quiz nights and the annual Charity Ball all get transformed into essential equipment purchases replacement cagoules and the new archery range. The support of the local community goes beyond that all-important fund raising. As a registered charity Low Mill must have a Volunteer Management Committee Trustees and it is the local people who give their time and energy to support Low Mill's continued success.

Mega-charities still take the lion's share of the UK's donations and it doesn't seem long since Children in Need was taking over the TV schedule. At this time, when high profile advertising and social media campaigns all compete for our purse, the positivity and satisfaction we get from supporting charities might be met closer to home. Getting involved with local charities like Low Mill Outdoor Centre not only contributes to the community but also gives us the opportunity to socialise and have some fun all in a good cause. Whether you live in the community or are visiting Wensleydale grab a coffee and take five minutes to take a look at what a local charity gets up to - check out Low Mill's website, www.lowmill.com or connect through Facebook and next time there's a fund-raising event in Askrigg why not come along too.

Green Laners and Rangers Unite to Restore Road

A section of one of the highest ancient roads in the Dales has been resurfaced by Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority rangers, with financial support from green lanes user groups.

A team of five rangers and five Dales Volunteers spent three days laying a fresh surface and clearing the drainage along 1.25km of the Cam High Road – or 'Roman Road' – above Hawes. They raked and tamped a total of 166 tonnes of limestone aggregate, brought by lorry from a nearby quarry.

Two recreational motor vehicle user organisations funded the works. The North Yorkshire group of the Green Lane Association (GLASS) donated £2000 and the North Yorkshire and Teesside group of the Trail Riders Fellowship (TRF) donated £2500.

"The contributions from GLASS and TRF are greatly appreciated," said Matt Neale, Area Manager (North) for the ranger service. "The Cam High Road is a valuable link in the local public rights of way network, and one that can be enjoyed by walkers, horse-riders, mountain bikers, as well as recreational vehicle users in 4x4s or on motorcycles. Having both GLASS and TRF help us maintain these routes and encourage responsible use of the National Park is a positive step forward. We are increasingly relying on donations from users of the National Park to help us to maintain the trail network."

The Cam High Road is part of the Roman Road that ran from Lancaster to Bainbridge. It is a 'green lane', a public right of way designated as a Byway Open to All Traffic.

From the Archives A Golden Oldie from June 1996

May Monday in Hawes saw a contest, red in tooth and claw, fought out on the cowclap patch that is the present home ground of Hawes F.C. They were being challenged by a medley of ex-Hawes F.C. players dubbed Hawes "All Stars". The latter were longer in tooth, but sharper in claw. Odds were not stacked heavily against them, though one had to wonder what sort of stars some of them might be seeing before the end. On the other hand, Hawes F. C. has this season brought their losing style to a fine art. The encounter was generously sponsored by Gordon Sleightholm, proprietor of the White Hart Inn, who is also chairman of the club. After the match there was a Pie and Pea Supper at the White Hart for £2.50. All proceeds were for the new football field which is given top priority in the Hawes Leisure Centre to be.

The match was thoroughly enjoyed by a large crowd and the total takings were slightly over £800. Does the result matter? Indeed it does to the old-stagers for they stormed (all right then, staggered) to victory by four goals to two. Does it matter that Mel Dinsdale's excellent refereeing did not extend to counting the numbers of players at any given moment – 26 at

Plenty of enthusiasm was shown by the young members of the Ladies side but one has to acknowledge that the balance of skill was shown by the Youth Club who won handsomely.

9.00p.m. your third pint/glass of wine= 9 units.....and so on.....

By midnight you could easily have absorbed over 25 units of alcohol, well above the legal drink drive limit. Should you choose to drive you are now a fatality waiting to happen.

The Next Day

The average liver eliminates alcohol from the body at a rate of 1 unit per hour. Based on your night out, the following morning you may potentially still have 12 units of alcohol in your system, enough to be over the legal limit and certainly enough to impair your driving. This is just an example of how units of alcohol build up in your system. Simply put, do not drink and drive.

As this issue is covering Christmas and into the New Year, I will take the opportunity to wish you all a Merry Christmas and safe New Year.

News from the Vets

We are all settled down at the new surgery now. We love having all the extra space especially in the consulting rooms and the car park and we hope clients are enjoying it also; certainly most dogs seem calmer in the larger consulting rooms. Lambing time has arrived again and will be keeping the dale busy. We would like to take the opportunity to ask people to keep dogs on leads when walking through fields with sheep in them;- the presence of a dog can be very stressful to pregnant sheep. Also we have been seeing an increase in a type of tape worm in sheep that arises when they eat grass contaminated with tape worms from dog's faeces. These then travel to the sheep liver and form cysts for which there is no treatment. Please always pick up your dog's faeces and worm your dog with a tapeworm product on at least a quarterly basis.

One more sheepy notice, this is a time of year when people will often find sheep laid on their backs after becoming 'rigged'. If the sheep aren't put back onto their feet they can die so if anyone finds a sheep on its back either roll it back over, or if you don't feel comfortable doing so, contact the farmer as a matter of urgency. Anyway, on that note, better get back to our new lambing shed and get everything ready.

Carol's Music Corner - At Christmas

Christmas means so many different things to people – a religious festival for some; decorations, the hope for snow, excited children, cheesy television, presents and eating and drinking far too much for others and often a welcome chance for families to get together from far and wide.

1) Christmas Oratorio by JS Bach

A glorious and massive work (running for over 2 hours), it was written for Christmas Celebrations in 1734 and is in six parts which tell the story of Christmas. Bach in places reused music from other works written over the previous 2 years (which is not surprising given the huge amount of music he was under pressure to produce and the massive scale of this work).

2) Sussex Mummers Christmas Carol arranged by Percy Grainger

There are many old Christmas carols that are now rarely heard. Percy Grainger was a great collector and arranger of folk music. His piano arrangement of this old Sussex carol is sublime writing for the piano. Grainger also produced an arrangement for piano and violin or cello which are beautiful (but sadly there are no good recordings on YouTube of that version). I first heard this carol in 2013 on a CD by Swedish cellist Mats Lidström (who came and played for us in Aysgarth Church in June). His CD called Smörgasbord is well worth a listen and available at Amazon.

3) 'Good Day, Sir Christmas!' by Cheryl Frances-Hoad

Christmas music doesn't have to be ancient. This short choral work was written in 2015 and published in BBC Music Magazine. In February this year we had the pleasure to welcome the composer to Bainbridge for a recital where Fenella Humphreys gave an astonishing violin recital as the opening concert of Wensleydale

Concert Series' 2017 season, including a new work written for her by Cheryl. During the year Cheryl has had work performed at the BBC Proms and also a performance of a work written to celebrate the physicist Stephen Hawking's 70th birthday.

4) Christmas Tree Suite by Franz Liszt

Written in 1881, Liszt dedicated this work to his 21 year old granddaughter Daniela von Bülow and it was first performed on Christmas Day. The work exists in 2 versions – a solo piano work and in 4 hand duet form (I have included a duet version on YouTube). It consists of 12 short pieces mostly based on Christmas themes (many based on old carols) and unlike most of Liszt's writing of that period is not terribly virtuosic but written for domestic performance.

5) Nine Lessons and Carols from Kings College Cambridge

It seems a life time ago now but back in 1976 I was at Kings College Cambridge and took part in the traditional College Christmas celebration. No Christmas is quite complete without the traditional visit to Kings College. I have included a link to last year's televised service.

6) Adam Lay Ybounden by Boris Ord

Missing from the 2016 service above is my favourite ancient 15th century 'carol' – here is a recording from Kings College in 1996. Not strictly a Christmas carol as the words are about the fall from grace in the Garden of Eden but traditionally sung at Christmas. Boris Ord was organist and choirmaster of King's College, Cambridge between 1929 and 1957.

Prunings

It is a sobering thought that by the time we meet again in print we shall have enjoyed (endured?) the Festive Season, seen in another year and made resolutions which we have some chance of keeping. No change there then! And the first signs of new life will be waiting for the days to lengthen before they make their moves. In the light of this may I wish everyone all the best for the coming festivities. However you choose to spend it make the most of the holiday, and if you don't have the opportunity for a break, enjoy whatever you do.

Today, (November 14th) I noticed the tips of some bulbs poking through. If we have snow later on I shall be reminded of the swan: smooth and calm on the surface, but a good deal of frantic activity going on underneath.

A relative with a new garden has been telling me about recent purchases including around a dozen fruit trees which she hopes will provide a harvest throughout the season. No shortage of enthusiasm then! There is even a greengage in the selection. She is now choosing roses which she hopes will provide months of colour. The greengages reminded me of being a student in Paris in the summer when they were everywhere, but only for a short season. The French called them La Reine Claude, I don't know why, but they were delicious.

The roses made me think of my grandmother who came to Leyburn in the early forties, and persuaded my grandad to bring her favourite rose with them. It was planted on a west facing wall, and despite grandad's best efforts it struggled. The flowers were beautiful, yellow and highly scented, and were always cut early so that she could enjoy them in the house before the wind destroyed them. It was "Gloire de Dijon" Being moved from a sheltered estate garden near Ripon, where grandad had been head gardener, to the wilds of Wensleydale must have been on the edge of its tolerance. No wonder it never forgave them for the move. I looked it up. It can still be purchased from David Austen Roses - at a price. It was originally introduced in 1853 so it must have been a good one to be still selling today.

Wonderful new varieties continue to be developed. They have amazing perfume and many are virtually trouble free. Garden News listed ten of the best last week: it is claimed that one of them, "Mutabilis", can flower from May to December in a good year; "English Miss" is reckoned to be one of the best for perfume, and "Margaret Merril" is the best of the new whites. There is also something to be said for buying locally. In around 1975 I bought a rose from Leeming Braithwaites at Bar. "Compassion" it was the one Mr Braithwaite recommended for a south facing wall. It flowers beautifully for a long season as long as we remember to dead head regularly, and on a still day the scent on the patio is delicious. However sad they all look now they will be spectacular next summer.

Good luck! And whatever you grow, take time to enjoy it. Rose Rambler





Sustainable Development Fund: 'Grants available now'

The National Park Authority's Sustainable Development Fund (SDF) provides a simple and accessible source of money for a wide range of initiatives and nearly £100,000 is still available this financial year for small-scale projects that result in positive benefits for the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

So far this financial year, 18 local projects have been allocated £77,818, from an annual budget of £175,000. The grants will support refurbishment works at Crosby Garrett Village Hall; archaeological excavation in Fremington; a public car park upgrade in Thornton Rust; new interpretation panels at Malham Tarn Field Studies Centre; and the purchase of a new all-terrain wheel chair for disabled visitors to the Ingleborough nature trail and cave.

The fund is open to individuals, community groups, businesses and the voluntary sector. Any scheme which contributes in some way to conserving the national park or promoting the enjoyment of it – and which provides some social or economic benefits in a local community – will be considered.

Sustainable Development Officer Andrea Burden said: "Projects eligible for SDF money can be far-ranging, and big or small, from community composting and village enhancement, to local wildlife conservation and educational programmes, to renewable energy, sustainable transport and eco-tourism schemes."

Tup Fever

Watch out! A fever is about, sending normally well-rounded men and women berserk. It is so contagious that you are advised to whisper its name. It is called 'Tup Fever'. Tup fever has one unmistakable symptom: tup talk. Anyone who catches it brings tup talk to breakfast, dinner, tea and supper. There is no cure, but it should pass by the start of Advent.

Tup fever is caused by those most pampered and entitled of upland farm animals, the male breeding sheep. At this time of year they are emerging from their lush corners of the farm to spend six weeks serving the ewes. Either that, or they are being brought to market - such as the 800 plus Swaledale tups sold at Hawes Auction Mart in late October

The Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority first caught tup fever more than 40 years ago. In 1974, a photograph was taken of the champion tup at the Muker Show. That photo was turned into our emblem, which can now be seen on all our buildings, signs, leaflets, car park stickers and rangers' jackets. The Swaledale tup was seen to represent the way that farming - and extensive grazing - had shaped the stunning

a "white plague", the Swaledale tup remains the perfect emblem of the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

If you have any doubts, visit the just-opened 'Voices From The Land' exhibition at the National Park-run Dales Countryside Museum. located just a stone's throw from the auction mart in Hawes. The exhibition features audio recordings and photographic portraits of about 40 farmers from across the national park. including some of the country's most renowned Swaledale breeders.

Listen to Raymond Calvert as he describes how it is the sheep that makes living in the Park special: "If you ask me, 'What keeps you in the area?' It's them - the Swaledale sheep. They've got this fantastic ability to not only manage in these tough areas but to thrive." Or listen to Thomas Iveson describe the best tup he ever saw, which went by the name of 'Aygill Officer'. "The hairs on the back of my neck stand up when I think about him," he said. "I went to see him at his home. He came down the hillside and blew me away. Just the depth of his black - the deepest black, with the brightest, hardest white - it just hit you from a distance. It was his bone, and the silver on his eyes. He wasn't great on his legs, a little narrow behind as we say, but he was quality: the tup of my lifetime "

If you haven't got tup fever after that, then I declare you immune.

The Arts Society Wensleydale

Lectures on two major artists straddle the Christmas period for The Arts Society Wensleydale. The early career and influence of Gustav Klimt, who shocked Viennese society in the 1900's with his sexual imagery, bold colours and use of gold-leaf, is the subject of Gavin Plumley's lecture on **Tuesday**, **December 12th at 2.00pm** at the Middleham Key Centre.

Writer, broadcaster, and expert on Viennese culture, Gavin is commemorating the centenary of the artist's death on 6th February 2018. The presentation considers Klimt's early years as a muralist for grand municipal buildings and royal and aristocratic palaces of the Austro-Hungarian Empire. It also illustrates the many changes in Klimt's life, his rejection of public pomp and the impact of his style and work on the artists who followed him.

Employing the long neglected art forms of tapestry and the decorated vase, Grayson Perry's art is a unique and powerful commentary on the world of today. His documentaries for Channel 4 reveal how his work emerges from his genuine engagement with communities and individual's stories.

Harry Fletcher's lecture on Tuesday, 9th January 9th at 2.00pm at the Middleham Key Centre outlines Grayson Perry's life and work with its style, humour and flamboyance. He discusses Perry's remarkable achievements: Turner-Prize-winning BAFTA-winning documentary maker; author, social commentator, curator. In 2013, Grayson received a CBE, and became the first visual artist to deliver the prestigious Reith lectures.

The Garsdale-Hawes 'Book of Bridges'

Last year, special events were held in and around Hawes to mark the 140th Anniversary of the opening of Garsdale station in 1876 i.e when the Settle-Carlisle line opened. A highlight of the programme was the chance to see the book of original engineering drawings for structures on the Garsdale-Hawes Branch, opened in 1878.

The book itself (which is a vard wide, two yards when open, and two feet high) is old, fragile and in need of skilled professional conservation/restoration to safeguard drawings inside. However with modern techniques it has now been digitally scanned for permanent reference. If funds become available, replica copies can be made, to be used for or exhibition purposes importantly, to ensure that a replica copy is kept elsewhere in case of loss or damage to the original drawings.

Formal consent has been granted restoration to he undertaken experienced conservators appointed. I am convening a group to raise funds by launching an Appeal for the £3,100 required. Advice and support have been received in planning the project, from staff at the North Yorkshire County Record Office, the Dales Countryside Museum (DCM, Hawes), Network Archives, the trustees of the Macfie-Calvert Collection (held at the DCM) and others - a tremendously encouraging start.


