Light in the Darkness

One of the more intriguing stories of Christmastime is that of the Star of Bethlehem. A star that we are told arose in the East, and then led the Magi first to Herod and then to Christ child, where gifts were given. Ever since, people have wondered what the Magi saw. Perhaps it was the triple conjunction of Jupiter and Saturn in 7BC, perhaps a supernova, which the Chinese also saw in 5BC, or maybe both events were put together in the minds of these astrologers. Perhaps it was something different altogether.

However, it may interest you to note that this Advent, Jupiter and Saturn are again merging in the night sky - and can be seen after sunset in the south west sky on a clear night. On Dec 21 they will be almost superimposed - the closest conjunction since 1623. This may not be the rarer "triple conjunction" of 7BC, but it's still rather fun!

Light shining in the darkness is one of the key symbols describing the meaning of Christmas.

Predicting the coming of the Messiah, Isaiah wrote, 'The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness - on them light has shined' (Isaiah 9:2).

Many have experienced 2020 as a year characterised by darkness. The darkness of a global pandemic which has impacted every one of us with anxiety and isolation, and for many people, ill health, unemployment and bereavement.

There have been other darknesses too. Terrorism, nationalism, racism have all played their part, but 2020 will be chiefly remembered for the novel coronavirus. There is light on the horizon with the news of promising vaccines created in record breaking time, but there are months to negotiate yet.

John's gospel affirms, 'The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it'. (Jn 1:5).

But where is the light this Christmas?

For some it is in our determination not to be outdone by the darkness. Some villages already have a reputation for celebrating in light - and

several this year are becoming 'living advent calendars', joining in the countdown to Christmas as more and more windows light up with the numbers from 1 to 24. I suspect we shall make a special effort this year to brighten our homes as physical gathering is restricted.

Secondly, it is in our decision to be "light-bearers". This Christmas perhaps more than others, we will be conscious of needs around us. Throughout this year we have seen wonderful examples of mutual support and encouragement. Truly we have seen light in the darkness.

The word 'phosphorescence' comes from two Greek words which together mean 'light-bearer'. A phosphorescent substance glows with an inner light after it has been exposed to light. Christians believe Christ is "the true Light, which enlightens everyone, and which has come into the world" (cf Jn1:9). Although people of 'all faiths and none' have been wonderful light bearers, we trust that as we spend time with Jesus, so we become bearers of his light ourselves.

Lastly, the light this Christmas is the unchanging light of every Christmas. It's the hope centred in that historical event some 2000 years ago, and the belief that God intervened in the human story through Jesus Christ. It's poetically written in one of our favourite carols: 'Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting light - the hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight'.

The carol 'O little town' speaks here of Light that can never be quenched - and in which we will find every hope and fear met.

What do we hope for? A cure, a hug, 'normality', restoration, healing.

What is it we fear? Economic collapse, loneliness, illness ourselves or within our families...

The true light of Christmas is the meeting of our hopes and fears in the coming of Christ, the one who 'heals all our infirmities' - physical but also emotional and spiritual - and who brings a peace which surpasses understanding.

So may the Light of Christ surround your steps as you journey through this Christmas and into the new year!

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Six NYCC Councillors Support a Winter Bus Service

At a recent NYCC committee meeting, Upper Dales councillor Yvonne Peacock of Bainbridge and five other county councillors from along the A684 each contributed £500 from their Locality Budget to provide a temporary reprieve for the DalesBus 856. This is the 40 mile year-round bus service that runs three return journeys each Sunday, connecting the four market towns of Northallerton, Bedale, Leyburn and Hawes (and of course the villages between that are linked by the A684). The new funding will provide a breathing space, in the hope that longer-term funding can be found from Easter 2021 onwards. Previously Acorn Stairlifts and TransPennine have both provided much appreciated sponsorship over the years. If you can help by suggesting possible future sponsors, please let me know. Thank you.

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Central Dales Practice News

We are here to help!

We have never closed our doors and nor will we. We will continue to be here for you all, to help look after your healthcare needs. We will continue with the current system:

To access GP/ANP - if urgent, call before **10.30am** and you'll be called back that same day by a GP/ANP. We cannot guarantee a particular GP/ANP but we will always do our best to try. For anything urgent (same day) we spread the workload between the clinicians to ensure the workload is safe and manageable for the whole team. If you need to discuss something that's not urgent, we will book you a pre-booked telephone appointment. If following an urgent or non-urgent telephone call the GP/ANP needs to see you, they'll give you a time to come in to be seen face to face. These appointments are booked to ensure we have the least number of people in the building at any one time so please work with us to help keep everyone safe.

Nursing - many reviews and follow ups can be done by phone and we will do this as far as we can, to limit the number of people in the buildings. For those procedures that need to be

face to face, you'll be given an appointment to attend (bloods, smears, vaccinations etc).

If you are given a face to face appointment with any member of the team - please arrive **ON TIME / AT THE TIME OF YOUR APPOINTMENT**, not early as we are controlling who is in the building at any one time as we have many vulnerable patients. We are also working with other healthcare professionals who work out of our buildings (dentists, physiotherapists, midwives, and chiropodists) to ensure you are all able to access as many services as possible, as safely as possible.

If you (or anyone in your household) experiences COVID19 symptoms and need to see a healthcare professional as feeling unwell or have an issue unrelated to COVID19, **DO NOT** enter the building - call us. If you enter the building you risk closing the practice. We are more than happy to help and we have access to a COVID19 GP Assessment Centre so you will still be cared for, we just can't see you on our premises. This is so that we can keep our practice open to non-COVID19 patients.

Repeat medications - please allow three working days from ordering to collecting. If you've waited three days and want to check they're ready for collection, please help us manage our phone lines by calling after **3.00pm**. This helps keep the lines open for patients to call in to book appointments and for clinicians to call patients. Thank you.

We feel lucky to be in such a caring, supportive community and we appreciate all of your support so far. We really can't say this enough. We know that if you all continue to follow the regulations and look out for one another we will get through this lockdown and the winter months to come.

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Hawes Primary School

Hawes Primary School goes from strength to strength! Even during the current lockdown 97.8% of children are attending school. (The national average currently is 89.2%.)

In recent conversations between governors and teachers the children say they are happy to be back at school and enjoying their learning. Obviously, things are not quite the same as last year, when the school was very publicly celebrating its “good” Ofsted judgement, after some difficult years. Now the children and staff are dealing with new routines, some of which the school will keep once the pandemic is under control.

Headteacher Hanna Vasey said, “We are being creative in adapting to the current situation and the children are enjoying using outside space more regularly and learning about how to live with the virus. We have taught children about the importance of hand washing and social distancing. We are teaching them about the importance of physical and mental health for good well-being. We are supporting children to ‘catch-up’ on lost learning whilst also maintaining the creative subjects such as art and cooking. We are delighted that our catch-up plan is going well and that we are able to keep our children happy and safe as possible in these unprecedented times.”

Chair of Governors, Jan Linsley, added, “I’m delighted that children and their parents have confidence in the school to ensure amazing levels of attendance. It’s a validation of everything the school is doing to keep children safe and to ensure that the children’s learning is active, creative and enjoyable!”

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Repair work at Gayle Mill

Cultura Trust has received a grant of £59,100 from The National Lottery Heritage Fund to enable it to carry out repairs at the Grade II* listed Gayle Mill and support the Trust’s core costs during the pandemic.

The funding, made possible by National Lottery players, was awarded through The National Lottery Heritage Fund’s Heritage Emergency Fund. £50million was made available nationally to provide emergency funding for those in need across the heritage sector.

Graham Bell, Director of Cultura, said: “Thanks to the National Lottery and its players we have at last been able to gain access to the roof and other parts of the mill. Rampant vegetation was threatening to undermine the headrace. We’re grateful that The National Lottery Heritage Fund is supporting us at this crucial time.”

Stone Technical Services of Darlington won the tender and Mr Bell said: “They made a dramatic presence on site by doing the roof repairs by rope access rather than scaffolding.”

Neil Embleton, Stone Technical Services’ Contracts Manager, said: “we specialise in rope access maintenance work to historic buildings, which often have hard-to-reach roofs and architectural detail.” The work at the mill includes the stone roof slates, ridges and gable, overhauling the drainage and resurfacing the drive, which had eroded during storms early in the year, and installing new distinctive ‘Gayle-style’ gates as were made at the mill.”



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Living 'A Good Life' During a Crisis

In another of our series of articles celebrating local organisations who have kept us all going during lockdown, this month we are looking at the work undertaken by 'A Good Life Project - Upper Dales Covid 19 Support Group'.

'A Good Life Project' was set up by John Blackie some years ago and is working to support older and vulnerable people, making the Upper Dales a wonderful place to grow old. However, in March, when news of the Covid-19 virus was spreading fast, the remit of this organisation suddenly changed to support the communities of the Upper Dales during the anticipated crisis that was fast heading its way.

A facebook page was set up, leaflets and posters produced, and a call put out for volunteers to distribute leaflets to every home in the area. Within two days of the country entering lockdown in March, all the leaflets were delivered and the task had begun.

Immediately, calls began to come in from people in our villages who were in need of help, either advice, help with shopping, transport, prescription collection etc. Many of the ageing members of our communities had received letters instructing them to shield due to health conditions and therefore suddenly found themselves cut off from things that they would normally have taken for granted, such as a trip to the shops.

A list of 279 volunteers was produced with some caring for pets, others delivering shopping and prescriptions and some who were shielding themselves but were prepared to offer contact to others in the same position, feeling isolated and lonely. Over time, many of the volunteers became the 'go to' person within their village, becoming a Village Champion, supporting those in their village in need of assistance and reassurance. It soon became clear that the local lockdown volunteers were brilliant, proving what the people of the Upper Dales already knew, that under our noses in every village, support was happening every day but in a quiet and subtle way.

After a few weeks, this new group was also working with NYCC to make the Upper Dales Community Partnership into a Community Support Hub during the crisis. In addition, the group worked with Carrick's of Bedale to provide fresh fruit and vegetables as well as

Cockett's Butchers and Bakers in Hawes to provide meat and bread. Individuals were able to place their orders with A Good Life by Wednesday lunchtime and these were collated and sent to the suppliers as one community order. Deliveries were made in bulk to a central delivery point on a Friday and then each individual order was made up and delivered on a Friday afternoon. This service has run from 25th March and is still available, ensuring that up to 20 shielding households a week continue to receive all they may need without having to leave their homes. This was particularly beneficial when it became clear that the big supermarkets were struggling to meet the demands for online deliveries, allowing our excellent local businesses to step in and show just how important they are to our communities.

A 'Good Life Project' also got busy crafting, with many volunteers who were stranded at home offering to make up scrubs and bags for NHS and care home staff. Some of these original crafters have now moved on to make face masks which continue to be distributed across the Upper Dales free of charge to anyone who needs them. For those who weren't so good at sewing, but were good at knitting, they took up the challenge to produce hundreds of baby blankets, hearts and premature baby hats which have been delivered to the local Neo natal units.

During the wonderful spring weather, and thanks to a grant from the Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust, Simon Winstanley Ltd in Leyburn were approached to supply plants which were delivered to almost 60 households across the area to brighten their gardens during the long days spent at home.

The project has been fortunate to be able to work alongside many local organisations including local shops, the Central Dales Practice, our local pharmacy, the Methodist and Church of England churches, YDNPA Rangers, the Little White Bus and also two national charities - Age UK and MIND - all in an effort to support our small communities to ride-out this storm. It has been a really good example of how, when we all work together, the best results can be achieved.

So, now for some statistics of this successful project! Over a 17 week period, 996 contacts were made to the project (phone, email, Facebook), with 1,222 individual support actions helping 1,097 people.

There were 548 deliveries of food, 74 prescription deliveries, 276 phone calls made to check on people, 22 food parcels delivered to those in need and 11 instances of pet support, to name just a few. Wow!!

All in all, it is fair to say that this has been a truly inclusive, rapid response to a crisis that has undoubtedly helped many people within our local communities here in the Upper Dales and we should all be truly thankful to the many volunteers who stepped up during very uncertain times to ensure that it proved successful. If ever we needed a way to demonstrate that the people of the Upper Dales are resilient, determined, selfless and caring, this is surely it.

A **HUGE THANK YOU** to all of those volunteers and to Julie Greenslade (project coordinator) and all those businesses and organisations who supported A GOOD LIFE here in the Upper Dales. It goes without saying that this project is ongoing and now we have seen a second national lockdown, has once again been on hand to help out so, if you are in need of support, please get in touch by calling **Julie on 07817-711227**.

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Full Steam Ahead for Ribbleshead Viaduct Repair

Listed building consent has been granted to Network Rail to carry out significant repairs to Batty Moss (a.k.a Ribbleshead) Railway Viaduct, arguably the most iconic built structure in the Yorkshire Dales National Park and part of the longest conservation area in the UK.

Owners Network Rail came forward in April with a plan to re-point eroded mortar joints and replace broken stones on the 24-arch, 400-metre-long, 32-metre-high Grade II*-listed structure.

It has taken months of painstaking work to refine the plans, including laboratory analysis of ten samples of mortar from the viaduct to ensure that the mix used in the repair will be as close to the original as possible. Network Rail has said the works will cost £2.1m and take place from now until the end of February. Scaffolding is currently being erected, with a formal decision to grant listed building consent having been made November 6th.

Member Champion for Development Management at the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority, Jim Munday, said: "If you asked anyone in England to picture a train on a viaduct, they'd probably think of Ribbleshead Viaduct. It is a star attraction for our area, although it is but one of many superb Victorian viaducts in the Yorkshire Dales National Park; Smardale Gill Viaduct is probably in the same league and then there is Arten Gill and Dent Head."

"We're so pleased Network Rail is investing significantly in Ribbleshead Viaduct and carrying out the first major repairs since the 1990s. This was a massive application for listed building consent to deal with and I'm thankful that we've been able to draw on internal and external expertise to get it just right."

Phil James, North West route director at Network Rail, said: "It's a privilege to look after so many significant buildings and structures across the rail network, but Ribbleshead Viaduct has got to be one of the crown jewels of Victorian civil engineering. We know the structure is incredibly important both locally and internationally, and we want to give it the care and attention that it deserves so it can be enjoyed by future generations of passengers and sightseers."

Gala Committee Formed and Looking at Having a 2021 Gala

Hawes and District Gala Committee are delighted to announce that, following their Socially Distanced AGM in October, the Committee now has seven members. 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Seriously Damaged Memorial Bench Restored to Former Glory

The Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority has completed the replacement of a memorial bench to former National Park Officer George Hallas, which was seriously damaged by fire in 2019.

Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority Chief Executive David Butterworth joined George's wife and local historian Dr Christine Hallas, her daughter Jo and husband Nick, and grandchildren Peter and Georgina to formally unveil the new bench on Wednesday.

The bench on Long Road, Askrigg Common, was established in 2007 to commemorate George's contribution to the National Park, following his untimely death in July 2006.

Work to replace the bench was completed by National Park Authority Maintenance and Facilities Officer Paul Bishop and was re-positioned with help from Access Ranger Paul Sheehan and Apprentice Ranger George Jacobs.

Dr Hallas said: "I was very sad when the original bench got damaged - it took the life out of me for a time - but I am very grateful to the National Park Authority for organising the replacement. George would have loved to be here today, and I know he'd have loved the words inscribed across the front - wilderness is not a luxury but a necessity of the human spirit".

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Police Report

As I write, we are in the midst of a second national Coronavirus lockdown. The rules and exemptions are many, but I urge you to take a common sense approach with regular hand washing, maintaining social distancing, wearing a face mask and self-isolating when told to do so. By following the official advice, fingers crossed that we can have a Christmas with family and friends in as normal way as possible.

The following incidents of note have occurred in the Dales area this month;

Overnight on October 12th the Recycling Centre on Moor Road, Leyburn was broken into again and scrap and batteries stolen. Please report any suspicious activity in the area at the time to police.

In the early hours of October 29th unknown persons have entered seven tractors parked at Washfold Farm on Moor Road at Leyburn, and stolen valuable 'intelliview' screens and GPS systems from within. Any information please call 101 quoting ref. 12200189725.

On the afternoon of November 8th suspected shoplifters were spotted by vigilant staff at Leyburn COOP making off with bottles of whisky in a red Peugeot car. Police soon intercepted the vehicle, arresting the two occupants, recovering a large quantity of stolen alcohol and suspected laundered money. The two have since been linked to other similar offences around North Yorkshire. This is a good example of members of the public keeping calm heads, noting vital information, such as the car details, and immediately ringing the police.

About 10.45pm on November 10th thieves were seen taking two quad bikes from a farm at High Force in Raydale above Bainbridge. A combination of local people, police patrols and the police helicopter were quickly mobilised in a search of the area. Within a couple of hours the quads were found abandoned not far away, with suspect males being seen getting into a car in Bishopdale. The police are now following up leads regarding a suspect vehicle believed connected to the theft. In this case good information sharing and boots on the ground led to the recovery of the stolen items.

Overnight on November 10th Thoraby Post Office was broken into and cash and stamps were stolen in an untidy search. Any information please quoting ref. number 12200198411.

Overnight on the 16th a cabin and container at the site Yorkshire Water are working at in Appersett was broken into and a search made, luckily nothing was taken. On the same night there was an attempted break-in at a business on the business park – the thieves did not gain entry. However, if anyone has any CCTV/dash cam footage of the roads around these locations on this night where vehicles or individuals can be seen, please contact us.

So that's it for another year (and what a year eh?). I hope you all have a very Merry Christmas and we'll try and be as optimistic as possible about 2021!

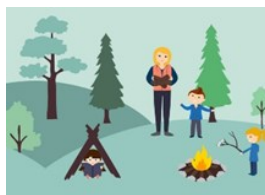

Cookery Kitchen

Here is something nice and tasty but straightforward.

Sausage Plait with Blue Wensleydale, cranberries & walnuts .

Serves 8-10

500g block of puff pastry

1kg good quality sausage meat

Black pepper & 1 teaspoon of mixed herbs

85g (3oz) Blue Wensleydale cheese, crumbled

60g (2oz) walnuts, chopped

30g (1oz) dried cranberries

1 egg

Pre-heat the oven to 200C. Roll out the pastry into a large rectangle (around 30cm x 20cm).

In a bowl mix the sausage meat, pepper & herbs together thoroughly.

Put the sausage mixture down the middle of the long length of the pastry. Using the side of your hand, press down the middle to make a deep groove and then fill with the cheese, cranberries & walnuts. Gently pull the sausage meat over the top of the cheese mixture so it is encased in a tube down the middle of the plait.

With a sharp knife, cut slits in the pastry 2cm apart going from the middle to the edge of the pastry, slanting slightly away from you. Brush with beaten egg. Starting at the end nearest to you, fold the pastry cuts alternately overlapping each other to give a plait effect. Brush the top with egg.

Transfer to a baking sheet lined with parchment and bake in the centre of the oven for 20 minutes. Reduce the temperature to 160C and bake for a further 20 minutes until well risen and golden brown. Serve warm.

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Swaledale Festival Adapts for Uncertain Times

Swaledale Festival has received a grant from the Government's 'Culture Recovery Fund' administered by Arts Council England, to enable it to move forward through the uncertain year ahead.

Artistic Director Malcolm Creese says: 'It has been a difficult year for Swaledale Festival, as it has for the whole world. Having to cancel the 2020 Festival was hugely disappointing, but thanks to the generosity of our ticket buyers, Festival Friends and Angels, and the recent news that we have received this grant from the 'Culture Recovery Fund', we are now in a relatively secure financial position to move forward. We're also able to keep our excellent team of part-time professionals together and working'.

The Festival is always planned well in advance and a full programme for 2021 was completed months ago. However, given the current Coronavirus restrictions and the uncertainty of what the country will be faced with next May, next year's Festival will now have to be rather different.

Instead of grouping a large number of events into a two-week period in May/June, the Festival plans to offer a series of individual events throughout the year. 'We feel this is our best chance of providing high quality music, arts and guided walks in the region, whilst helping to

minimise the risks and lessen the burden on local people and infrastructure. The safety and well-being of ticket-buyers, volunteers, staff, performers and local people will, of course, be paramount', Creese says.

The Festival is also planning a comprehensive programme of projects and performances for local schools and care homes, providing music, arts and entertainment to some of those who are in particular need of cultural activities.

Details of Festival activities in 2021 will appear on the website www.swalefest.org soon.

Chairman Dr. Susan Miller says: 'Looking (optimistically) a little further forward, we are already working on a fantastic programme for May/June 2022 when we will celebrate Swaledale Festival's 50th anniversary. We thank you for your continued support'.

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Best Foot Forward Colsterdale and Back

There have been reports that, as a nation, we are now fitter than we have been for quite some time. If true, that must have something to do with people having more time to exercise. There have certainly been plenty of folk out walking in recent months but it remains to be seen whether this pattern continues into the winter period. The weather and darkness have a tendency to put a lot of us off, as we say goodbye to the shorts, sun cream and floppy hat and exchange them for woolly hat, gloves, fleece and torch. But with good preparation a walk can be just as enjoyable in winter as in summer and plenty of walking groups have an all year round programme, at least under normal circumstances.

This walk is not too ambitious, being eleven miles if started at Cover Bridge, but only nine miles starting at East Witton. Choosing a dry day has been quite difficult recently and even if the weather is fine, there has been much rain recently to make the ground pretty soggy. Starting beside the River Cover there is immediate evidence of the erosive power of water, which has been eating into the river bank for quite some time. It brings to mind the closure of the footpath on the opposite bank many years ago, after much of it had been washed away.

It is only a short walk to East Witton, which has a very attractive setting with a long village green. It still has a shop which (it says) is open three mornings a week. Most of the village lies within the national park, near what is almost the most easterly extent of the park. (Hudswell Woods near Richmond is 200 metres further east) but the Blue Lion pub and the church are outside the boundary on the opposite side of the A6108. The village is mentioned in the Domesday Book but it was largely rebuilt in the nineteenth century by the Earl of Ailesbury, owner of Jervaulx Abbey at that time.

Leaving the village by the south east corner, a tarmac lane is followed through a farmyard and uphill to Thirsting Castle Lodge, an intriguing name but just a gamekeeper's house. The tarmac ends here but a good track zigzags its way up the hillside, giving ever more expansive views of Lower Wensleydale. Prominent features are Danby Hall, seat of the Scrope family in Tudor times, and Thornton Steward Reservoir, from which most of us get our water.

The gradient levels off after Hammer Farm. The right of way goes close by the farm buildings but there is a "Privacy Plea" asking walkers to divert to a track above and then follow the signage back to the through route. Legally diverting a public footpath is an expensive business, so following the unofficial request, which is not onerous, makes a lot of sense. The beech hedge at the end of the detour is particularly attractive when in its autumn colours.

After crossing a minor road the route becomes a bit difficult to follow. Signage is poor and careful navigation is required to reach Ellingstring. At the top of the village, where



there is a farm, the route goes through an open gateway into a wood. Again there is no signpost so a map is helpful. It is very clear that outside the national park there is not the same attention to the footpath network as there is within the park. The county council understandably does not have the resources to look after every footpath in England's largest county.

Entering the wood, a grassy track leads gently uphill. After 200 metres this track curves away to the left, so it is vital to cross a broken stile out of the wood onto the open moor. A rather wet path then follows the wall alongside the wood. The way across the moor is a little vague, although there are one or two waymark arrows to reassure walkers. The route is part of the Six Dales Trail, which visits Wharfedale, Washburndale, Nidderdale, Colsterdale, Coverdale and Wensleydale. It was created in 2000 and this probably explains the presence of the waymarks but it doesn't look well used and is rather neglected.

Dropping down through more woods, the trail reaches Gollinglith Foot in Colsterdale. This must be one of the less visited valleys in the Yorkshire Dales. It is part of the Nidderdale



Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. Household waste bins labelled HBC are a reminder that this is Harrogate District and that makes it feel a long way from Wensleydale, but for how much longer? Our council boundaries look set to be reorganised in the near future.

A short stretch along a quiet tarmac road leads to an ancient track back up onto Agra Moor. The track is severely eroded and after wet weather it is like walking up a stream gully. On the right are Slipstone Craggs, a quarter mile long outcrop of Millstone Grit. My 1974 Yorkshire Gritstone climbing guide makes no mention of it but the current edition has over fifty routes, none very high but some very hard. On this day there were a few casual scramblers and two more serious climbers. They were a distraction on an otherwise uninspiring ascent onto a broad plateau.

From the top it is a fairly boggy descent to Sowden Beck Farm and then on a good track past a water storage plant (discreetly underground) to East Witton and back to Cover bridge.

This may not be the most inspiring walk in the dales but it does go to places which are less often walked. It's always good to explore new ground.

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Heavens Above

The two biggest planets, Jupiter and Saturn, put on an impressive double act in this month's evening sky. They've spent most of the summer and autumn low in the south-west slowly edging nearer to each other as Jupiter catches up to the slower-moving Ringed Planet. By December 21st when they're at their closest for almost 400 years, they'll be a mere six arcminutes apart. That's less than a fifth of the diameter of the full Moon, about a tenth of the width of your little finger held at arm's length!

Planetary get-togethers like this are called *conjunctions*. They are aren't particularly rare and there's absolutely no chance of the planets involved colliding with each other, as they're really just a line of sight effect with each planet remaining in its own orbit many hundreds of millions of miles apart.

Exceptionally close encounters like this month's between Jupiter and Saturn, however, are much less frequent as they only occur once every twenty years or so. This one, dubbed a 'Great Conjunction', is particularly special as it's the closest alignment of Jupiter and Saturn for nearly 400 years. In fact there won't be another quite like it until 2080.

If you'd like to catch this spectacular event you'll need to find a location with a clear, flat south-western horizon as both planets are **very** low down. You'll also need to be out straight after sunset on December 21st - just after 4.00pm from our part of the world – as the pair set really early around 6.30pm. Binoculars will easily split the pair but they're at their best seen through a telescope which will show you both planets *and* their largest moons all in the same field of view. A once in a lifetime sight!

A week before Jupiter and Saturn's rendezvous one of the best meteor showers of the year – the Geminids – reaches its peak on the night of December 13th/14th. There's no moon to spoil the view so it should be a pretty good show. You might see well over 100 of these slow, multi-coloured meteors an hour in a good year. The best time to observe is after midnight from a dark location well away from street lighting.

The return of the long dark nights means that the winter stars are back on the scene. By late evening towards the middle of the month, the view south is filled by a crowd of bright

constellations - Orion the Hunter with his two faithful hunting dogs, Canis Major and Minor, Taurus the Bull (home to the lovely Pleiades star cluster), Gemini the Celestial Twins, Lepus the Hare, and high overhead, Auriga the Charioteer – a beautiful sight on a cold and frosty night, well worth dragging yourself away from the TV for.

If you're out and about in the early morning hours during the run up to the festive season, you'll find we have a dazzling 'Christmas Star'. It's the planet Venus, blazing away like a miniature beacon low in the south-east, a tiny symbol of hope in these rather unsettling times. Have clear skies!

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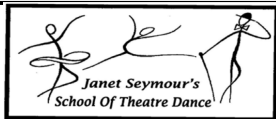
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Prunings

At the end of this very strange year I should like to wish everyone Happiness and Peace at Christmas even though it may have to be somewhat changed from the usual arrangements. There is a tiny chink of light at the end of the tunnel, and let's hope that when the new growth appears in the garden, and the bulbs are surging through with all their wonderful colour, some semblance of our former lives may yet be possible.

Story of Schools

January 30th to April 21st 2021

'The Story of Schools' team have been working with Upper Dales schools and communities to create a giant photo mosaic that will celebrate our youth past and present. The mosaic, which will be made by digital artist Helen Marshall from The People's Picture, will consist of 1,500+ images of youth and school-life that will come together in a spectacular fashion to create a whole new image. Local people of all ages have shared memories, family archives and photographs for this project.

In October, Education and Outreach Officer, Heather Hodgson, visited three primary school playgrounds with actor Mark Cronfield, who was in the character of a Victorian teacher, and a film crew from the Barnard Castle-based Howell Film. They re-enacted old playground games with year 5/6 pupils and talked about Victorian school life with footage captured on camera. Due to local school federations, the three sites encompassed a total of six schools: Hawes, Reeth and Gunnerside Federation and Bainbridge, Askrigg & West Burton Federation.

'The Story of Schools' in the Upper Dales is funded by The National Lottery Heritage Fund and the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's Sustainable Development Fund and will open at Dales Countryside Museum on **January 30th, 2021** – including the big reveal of the photo mosaic and short film as well as an exhibition with resources, oral history snippets, artefacts and activity packs for children.

Next year, Covid-permitting, we'll be working alongside Upper Dales primary schools once

more – inviting groups to The NASH for some immersive Victorian classroom sessions and working with Key Stage 2 either in person or via Teams/Zoom to explore their education heritage.

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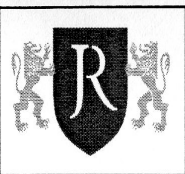
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Bolton Castle and its Landscape

Described as “...a climax of English military architecture” (Pevsner 1973: 104), Bolton Castle was built at the end of the 14th century by the Scrope family (whose descendants still own it today). It is both a Grade 1 listed building and a scheduled monument and has been involved or linked with several key events in British history – including the Pilgrimage of Grace and Mary Queen of Scots’ house arrest by the English and the Civil War. The castle’s imposing silhouette, which “...still gives something like the shock of power and menace...” is visible for miles around.

Landscapes are a vitally important part of the historic environment, forming the context that sites and finds should never be considered



without. To the east lies the village of Castle Bolton, to the west and south-west lies the extensive agricultural field system and medieval quarry, and to the north and north-west lies Bolton Park and Bolton Park Mine.

The village of Castle Bolton in its current form was most likely built at the same time as the castle, or shortly after, but evidence suggests that a settlement may have existed in or around its current location before this point. The houses, built out of sandstone quarried from close to the edge of the village, were probably constructed by the Scrope family to house workers for the agricultural field system to the west and south west.

This field system is the result of perhaps hundreds of years of human activity. It is a complex area of landscape that includes built structures, livestock pens, plantations, lynchets, and ridge and furrow. It is an extremely finely preserved example – though its exact development is not yet fully understood.

Like many noble residences, the castle was associated with a park or series of parks, some

walls of which still survive. The park was used to enclose (and sometimes hunt) livestock like deer and boar as well as valuable resources like timber and minerals. Hunting towers may have been built on the land to allow views of the park and act as look-out posts for any poachers.

The park also includes the Ellerlands Rabbit Warren, which is a large artificial warren made up of pillow mounds (various sized and shaped mounds of earth for the rabbits to burrow in). Such warrens were common features of deer parks, which in turn were once important and highly valued features of the Yorkshire Dales.

Also situated within the park is Bolton Park Lead Mine. This was one of many lead mines in the surrounding area and, of course, one of hundreds of mining sites in the Dales as a whole. It was only in operation for a short period, but it managed to produce 1,400 tonnes of lead. Two settling ponds, a two-storey building (used as an office/shelter/store) and the remains of a reservoir, sluices and leats can be seen on the site.

New Connections for Hawes

Since our previous update in the November edition, it has been interesting to learn that there are so many projects across the country seeking to bring back the railway to localities. The Department for Transport's (DfT) Ideas Fund seeks proposals for projects to restore lost rail connections to communities. In July 2020, Rail Minister Chris Heaton-Harris stated: "Improving local transport links is vital as we level up access to opportunities across the country, reconnect communities and kick-start our recovery from Covid-19".

To recap: the Upper Wensleydale Railway (UWR) scheme proposes the reinstatement of the 6 mile Garsdale to Hawes branch line: extending the present Manchester - Blackburn - Clitheroe service to Settle, and the Yorkshire Three Peaks area, and on to Hawes. The Ribbles Valley Rail Group are being supported by the DfT with their business case for the reopening of the line between Clitheroe and Hellifield. The combined effect of both proposals would be to greatly enhance connectivity for Hawes and all the other destinations along the route.

Passengers for Hawes from Leeds, Bradford and the Aire Valley would be most likely to change trains at Hellifield. Passengers from Manchester, Blackburn and Clitheroe would travel via Hellifield (on the Settle- Carlisle line), whilst those to or from the North would change at Garsdale.

We were very pleased that the 'Yorkshire Dales Review' – Autumn 2020 edition carried a double page spread about UWR aspirations, written by Andrew Longworth. Interest is building both locally and nationally in community transport and the Government's unfolding environmental commitments, and support for rail reinstatement projects through the DfT Ideas Fund are encouraging. The decision on our application for funding towards the costs of a feasibility study is still pending at the time of writing.
