Guest Editorial

In 1995, not long after I settled in Wensleydale, I was both intrigued and inspired by a letter the late Tom Knowles had published in the D and S Times. In it he pointed out that it had been the farmers and landowners who had created the beautiful landscape of the Yorkshire Dales.

It was through the Association of Rural Communities which he founded that I became aware of the intense frustration so many Dalesfolk felt at having their lives ruled by what, to them, were outsiders making important decisions about their lives.

Having recently returned from working overseas with aid and development agencies I couldn't help comparing this to what I had seen both in South Sudan and among Afghan refugees in Pakistan. I remembered a conference I had attended in Pakistan where the donor agencies were telling the aid workers what boxes they had to tick to get any money. The aid workers remained silent. They desperately needed the money to assist the refugees, but knew that Afghans just wouldn't accept what they saw as foreign interference in their lives.

I soon learnt that Dalesfolk can be just as fiercely independent! And I have gained a deep respect for the families who have done so much to preserve the landscape. As Alastair Dinsdale, the present chairman of ARC, commented:

"The very words National Park are very misleading as 95% of the land is privately owned and managed by farmers and estates as unpaid keepers with no direct control from the Parks Authority!

"Its landscape and special features were created by many generations of farmers, miners and quarrymen who worked the land and scratched a living from it but with care and consideration that it's resources were still available to their successors. "

So I can well understand what Tom had meant about their wanting a greater say in decision making.

I was, therefore, encouraged during the virtual meeting of the YDNPA on March 30 to hear its head of land management, Adrian Shepherd, state in his report that the Authority was in the forefront of national thinking on future support for farming in the uplands because it was focusing on the outcomes that can be achieved by using the skills and knowledge of the farmers themselves to help deliver the desired results – rather than prescribing how to do things.

One example he gave was how the Authority is working with eighteen to carry out practical trials for a new approach to agri-environment support where payments are linked to the environmental results achieved rather than detailed management prescriptions.

He said the payments currently on offer to farmers will be withdrawn over the next seven years and will be replaced with a new system which will offer a significant range of opportunities to farmers to obtain funding mainly as a reward for providing public goods. This funding will come via the National Park Authority.

"The programme will be delivered by farmers working in partnership to protect the landscape," he said and added that during the transition period there would be huge challenges for the farmers who would have to take on board many new opportunities.

This would enable farmers, he explained, to use their skills to deliver "environmental outcomes".

Tony Serjeant, the senior wildlife conservation officer, also emphasised this when recommending that the YDNPA should prepare a new Nature Recovery Plan by March 2022. This, he said, could influence the Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS) that will become a legal duty upon county and unitary authorities when the Environment Bill becomes law.

At the meeting on March 30, however, it was the Authority's chief executive officer, David Butterworth, who sounded a warning. As he said - a local authority which can work with individuals and organisations is far more effective than "two blokes sat behind a desk in Whitehall".

I wonder what he could mean by that? What does come to my mind is the recommendation in Julian Glover's Review of National Landscapes that a new National Landscapes Service should be created (covering almost 25 per cent of England) which would have a small board appointed by the Government. This would then appoint all the members of the Boards of our National Parks with their chairs being appointed by the Defra Secretary of States (see UWNL editorial August 2020). The Government is expected to make a decision on that soon.

I agree with Mr Butterworth – such decision making should be kept as local as possible, and not resting with someone in London far away from the realities of life in this rural area.

Newsletter AGM

This was held via a Zoom meeting on Wednesday April 21st.

Newsletter Annual Report

Well that was a challenging twelve months – not only for the country as a whole but for the Newsletter committee too.

It started with the first U.K. lock-down which meant a last-minute cancellation of the Newsletter AGM at the end of March 2020. Concerns were also raised about the safety and appropriateness of distributing Newsletters to our traditional outlets and so it was decided not to print the April Newsletter. As it actually had already been prepared a decision was taken to remove the adverts and publish the rest on-line on our usual web-site.

Our advertisers were informed of our decision and that there would be no charges levied until we were able to go back into print again – and that turned out to be not until the August 2020 issue. In the meantime we continued to produce an 'on-line' only version of the Newsletter for May, June and July. A big thank-you to our Guest Editors and regular contributors who continued to supply us with articles during this difficult period. We know that some of our regular readers managed to find us on-line and from the many comments received welcomed the opportunity to get their monthly 'Newsletter fix'!

So lock-down restrictions eased in July and we were able to hold a 'normal' committee meeting again - albeit in the garden of Lilac House. At this meeting it was announced that an absent Alastair Macintosh had asked to be removed of his share of editorial responsibilities because of his slow recovery from a recent operation. Alastair was still happy to retain the chairmanship of the committee and to attend committee meetings when possible. Barry Cruickshanks and Kevin Davis confirmed that they were happy to continue as joint (alternate) editors but would continue to seek additional help in Newsletter production. Also Sue Duffield had asked to be relieved of her responsibility for managing the advertisers in the lower dale. Barry offered to take on this responsibility temporarily in addition to managing advertisers in the upper dale but sought some assistance in this role in the longer term.

It was also agreed that the Newsletter would continue to provide book and equipment awards to students attending further education courses in the autumn but would suspend the Children's Writing Competition for this year in the light of uncertainty of schools opening times.

At the October Committee Meeting Peter Wood said that after twenty years of involvement with the Newsletter, he had decided it was time to step down from the committee, and as co-ordinator for distribution, at the end of this year. Peter offered to retain the Newsletter archive for the time being until a replacement could be found. It was agreed that Robin Peters would be approached and asked to take over the distribution responsibility – which he subsequently agreed to. Alastair offered to take over the responsibility of the Newsletter Archive once lockdown was lifted.

Then we had the second lockdown and the November meeting had to be cancelled. We went ahead though, with a printed copy for December and January. It was decided in January to embrace the 'Zoom' technology for the January and subsequent committee meetings and this has proved quite successful. It will also be a 'Zoom' AGM this month.

And so, like the rest of the country, we look forward to the new 'normal' life returning this year. We are proud of the fact that we kept the Newsletter going throughout difficult times and as can be seen in the accompanying Financial Report we are still in a healthy position. We would like to thank our advertisers, Guest Editors and contributors for supporting us throughout the year and we cannot wait to see a full-page of 'What's ons' once again in future issues.

The accounts were audited and approved on March 15th 2021 by Barry Wilcox, MCMI.

The Newsletter's finances have certainly been different this year because of the restrictions placed on publication and distribution of copies due to the Covid-19 pandemic. The lack of four printed copies (April - July 2020) reduced our income from adverts this year by about half of the usual amount and the collection boxes have yielded a little over a third of last year's total.

The change in renewal date for annual subscriptions (from February 1st to May 1st) has meant that the bulk of those payments will be made in the next financial year. The deficit in income, however, has been moderated by reduced production and distribution costs, and there have been fewer student applications for the book and equipment award. The UWNL Children's Story Writing Competition did not happen this year because of the school closures.

We supported six local students with book and equipment grants this year, amounting to £2693.58, and although there were fewer monthly competitions, we donated to several charities on behalf of competition winners: British Heart Foundation, PCC of Askrigg, Perennial—Gardeners' Royal Benevolent Society, Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal 2020, the Stroke Association and the Yorkshire Air Ambulance.

There were few requests for donations this year and the Committee decided to support the Swaledale Mountain Rescue Team with a donation of £200, and the Gayle Bench fund (\pounds 100) in lieu of sending Christmas cards.

We end the year with sufficient reserves to continue with our student grant scheme, but possibly at a reduced rate per student, and with the hope that the story-writing competition will proceed later in 2021. We are, as ever, most grateful to our generous readers who send us a little extra with their subscriptions or who put a little more in our collection boxes – thank you. J.W.T.

Heavens Above

It's a great month for spotting Mercury and Venus, the two closest planets to the Sun. They're on view shortly after sunset but you'll need a flattish outlook to the north-west to catch them as they're both very low down. Venus is a dazzling 'Evening Star,' brighter than anything else in the night sky apart from the Moon. It gets even brighter as it pulls away from the Sun during the coming months and stays with us right through the year reaching maximum brilliance - magnitude minus 4.7 - in early December.

Tiny Mercury, the innermost planet, puts on its best evening show of the year. It sits a little above and slightly to the left of Venus for most of the month, but the best time to catch it is around the middle of May when it reaches its maximum separation from the Sun and lies higher in the sky. On the 13th it forms a striking tableau with the slim crescent Moon, Venus and the Pleiades star cluster.



The Red Planet, Mars, is still visible in the evening sky low in the north-west not too far from the twin stars Castor and Pollux, but if you want to see the two biggest planets, Jupiter and Saturn, you'll have to get up really early as they're in the pre-dawn sky. Saturn rises in the south-east around 2.30am followed by Jupiter 30 minutes later.

This month's Full Moon on May 26th is the biggest and brightest of the year – a so-called 'Supermoon'. It should appear some 30% brighter and 14% bigger than the faintest Full Moon. A 'Supermoon' occurs when the Full Moon coincides with its closest approach to the Earth in its orbit. This doesn't happen every month as the Moon's orbit isn't a perfect circle and as a result its closest and farthest approaches change from month to month.

Supermoons seem to have caught the public's imagination in recent years but if you want to see the Moon at its best, have a look at it when its waxing or waning. The slanting light from the Sun's rays makes the craters and mountains stand out in a really dramatic fashion especially along the 'terminator', the boundary between the Moon's sunlit and night-time hemispheres.

There's also a total lunar eclipse on May 26th but unfortunately it can only be seen from Australia, New Zealand and parts of the Pacific Ocean. We'll have to wait until the early hours of May 16th 2022 to see the next one visible from our latitudes. Have clear skies!

Prunings

I bought some Agapanthus in the Autumn because they were (supposedly) hardy. I didn't risk putting them into open ground, but potted them up and then buried the pots just under the house wall hoping to give them some shelter. The cold weather came and they disappeared completely. I resigned myself to having lost them, and made a mental note not to try that again. This week little green shoots have begun to show. Amazingly they just might be tough enough to stand our conditions. More information to follow.

The dwarf lilac on the patio is covered in buds and will be spectacular when it eventually blooms. It is an interesting demonstration of how much more important light levels are than temperatures for spring growth. As those of us with arthritic joints know well, it can look like a beautiful day, still feel uncomfortably cold, but the plants don't seem to care. I have also been surprised by how dry things are. My other half moved some tulip pots onto the gravel and remarked that they were unusually light. After a generous dollop of water they looked 100 per cent better. Time to water all the pots, even those that are not yet showing many signs of growth will still have dried out. When it is cold

it does not feel as if everything is getting "droughty".

Our regular cock pheasant visitor has started to bring a lady friend. Somewhere in the wild patch she must have a nest. I am happy to see them, and if they hoover up the spilled seed under the feeders they are most welcome. However I have an uncanny feeling that they may be responsible for the non-appearance of some new alliums I put into the raised bed, and their presence might go some way to explain why crocus in a stone trough were over so quickly! We had a new visitor which I did not recognise. I spent a long time peering at the illustrations in my latest bird book, but am now satisfied that it is a reed warbler. I can't imagine why it is up here so far from the water.

I had a very pretty "Pot Combination" last year. (sounds like my Grannie's underwear!). It was a grey Artemesia partnered with a very attractive pink Argyranthemum. The pink daisy of course has not made it through the cold, but the Artemesia is happily sprouting. I shall now have to seek out something similar or equally complementary to try and repeat the show. The bags of compost are now stacked up at the bottom of the steps waiting for me to get on with it, and the sweet peas, which arrived far too early are still sitting in the porch waiting for a chance of warmer temperatures. They don't seem to have suffered so far, but they need pinching out, and I can't leave them in the "Root -trainers" much longer.

Next problem – Need to rescue the dahlias. Whatever you grow, take time to enjoy it!

Police Report

His departure from the Leyburn Policing team will be a great loss to the Dales and I know that many of you will join me in wishing him a happy retirement and thanking him for his many years' service to the residents of North Yorkshire as a serving Police Officer.

"Firstly, an update on the planned move of Leyburn Police Station to the shared facility at Leyburn Fire Station. The sharp eyed amongst you will have noticed that this has not happened yet. It is still going ahead but has been delayed due to a technical problem with IT. We will keep you posted as to when we are moving.

The last month has seen little in the way of crime. One stand-out offence was the theft overnight on March 23rd of ten chimney pots, valued at over £500, from outside Cellar Antiques in Hawes. Please contact us with any information.

We have taken a number of reports of recent attempted scams in the area. Please remember that a genuine bank or organisation will never contact you out of the blue to ask for your PIN. full password or to move money to another Only give out your personal or account. financial details to use a service that you have given your consent to, that you trust and that you are expecting to be contacted by. Also, don't be tricked into giving a fraudster access to your personal or financial details. Never click on a link in an unexpected email or text. And finally, always question uninvited approaches in case it's a scam. Instead contact the company directly using а known email or phone number. If you have been affected by fraud, report it to Action Fraud 0300 1232040 or www.actionfraud.police.uk.

On a personal note, I shall be retiring in May from the police and my role as Beat Manager and Wildlife Crime Officer at Leyburn. I would like to take this opportunity to pay tribute to the many past and present colleagues who I have worked with in the last 29 years, and whose support and friendship has been much appreciated. Policing is a unique and varied career, with many challenges. When I joined we were largely focused on crime, whereas your average officer today has a wide range of demands, not only investigating crime and

disorder, but also working with partners to and safeguard victims the vulnerable. Personally, when dealing with people I have always tried to work on the principle that behaviour breeds behaviour. This approach must have had some success as I very rarely needed to draw my truncheon, and was only shot at once (he missed!). A big thank you to the dedicated volunteers, such as Dales Watch, who help to keep crime levels low, and Swaledale Mountain Rescue Team, who are always there to help with the seemingly impossible. They are just two examples of the support which is freely given in our amazing Dales. Others, such as my friends in the Yorkshire Dales National Park and RSPB deserve a mention, but this risks becoming an Oscar acceptance speech!"

We have been busy preparing resources for outdoor classes and are ready to offer a variety of learning opportunities. Although we haven't been able to offer this sort of service for some years, we've gained plenty of experience of working with young people through events such as the Dark Skies Festival and the Young Ranger groups – so teachers can be assured that their pupils will receive a high quality learning experience."

The National Park Authority has begun to produce an e-newsletter, once per term, for teachers. The newsletter includes information about opportunities for schools to get out in the National Park with the Authority's education team and other organisations. It also provides information about teacher networking sessions and details of new and exciting projects to increase young people's nature connectedness.

Let's go summery! Here are two recipes for a lovely pate and quick and easy soda bread.

Chicken Liver Pate

450g tub of chicken livers
1 medium onion, finely diced
110g butter + 60g for topping
1 clove of garlic
Salt & black pepper
Zest of half an orange (optional)
2 tablespoons of double cream (optional)

Firstly prepare the chicken livers. Take each liver and cut in half. If there are any small, greenish looking sacs remove and discard them as they are very bitter.

In a pan over a medium heat, melt the 110g of butter and soften the onions without browning until translucent and then add the garlic and stir for a further minute. Add the chicken livers with a pinch of salt and a good grind of black pepper and stir until they are sealed and then reduce the temperature and simmer gently for ten0 minutes. Add the orange zest and the cream if required and liquidise until really smooth.

Spoon the pate into separate ramekins or one large bowl and bang carefully to smooth the top. Melt the remaining butter in a jug and carefully pour the clarified clear butter over the top of the pate to seal, leaving the milky remnants in the jug. Put in the fridge to cool and set. Keeps for up to a week in the fridge.

Soda Bread

250g plain flour 250g wholemeal bread flour 100g porridge oats 25g butter 1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda 1 teaspoon salt 250ml Whole milk yoghurt 250ml milk

Pre-heat the oven to 200C. Mix all the dry ingredients in a large bowl and then rub in the butter. Add the yoghurt and milk and stir until it all comes together into a stiff dough. Turn out onto a floured surface and bring together into a nice round – work as little as possible once all the mixture is evenly combined. Deeply score the top of the loaf into 8 triangles (like a clock face). Transfer to a baking tray and bake on the bottom shelf of the oven for around 30 minutes until golden brown.

Keeping the momentum going...

April and another month for planning and rescheduling for a positive Autumn return to live events. It is also

the time for our management board to report and reflect on what has been achieved in the last twelve months.

Who would have thought our weekly Zoom sessions would be noting such milestone moments as; our one-year anniversary of making-music all together in the same room, one-year of being together in a virtual community, celebrating Jake and Fred turning 13 and 14 years old, Dan successfully auditioning for University and our volunteers becoming eligible for their vaccine appointments?

We launched our Play>Record>Perform project in the Autumn as planned and opted for 100% digital delivery due to COVID-19 restrictions. The group worked on The Sounds of the Dales heritage project and *A Magical Christmas Concert* DVD presentation presenting a selection of solo and collaborative performances – over twenty creatives of all ages took part.

We have provided mentoring and technical support throughout the pandemic supporting twenty young people so far. Support has included equipment loans such as computers, interfaces, microphones, headphones to musical instruments, sound systems and video cameras.

We have given guidance on setting up spaces to record music at home, getting online to be able to take part in other learning activities, preparing and recording submissions for graded exams, advice on Arts Award, university applications and writing personal statements. Of these, eight have chosen to engage in our regular weekly sessions on Zoom.

Since October, we have been delivering 3 onehour sessions (Monday, Wednesday and Friday) where young people have put forward the songs they would like to play, record and perform together. They have chosen all the material covered from several genres including Indie, Folk, Rock, Jazz, Pop and Musical Theatre which has created some interesting discussions around musical tastes and adapting music to suit different genres.

We have piloted the use of JamKazam - a music making platform which reduces latency and allows real time music-making and recording. It has been a great way to continue working together and make the most of the current restrictions.

Our *BlueAngels* continue to be our lifeline of support. In addition to the many hours of in-kind support given by our volunteers, it is the monthly pledges and one-off donations which have enabled us to cover our essential costs and keep the organisation moving forward. Farmers see case for riverside tree-planting

Ten pockets of woodland are being planted by watercourses in the Upper Ure catchment over the next few weeks. Newbiggin Beck (pictured) is one such area where trees are about to go into the ground. The planting will create better conditions for fish and stabilise riverbanks. In each case farmers have readily agreed to the planting. Recent flooding, such as in November last year, saw large amounts of soil being washed away by the Ure and its tributaries.



The ten new woodlands constitute the first part of a project known as 'Keep Ure Rivers Cool'. Woodlands Project Officer for the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA), Phill Hibbs, speaking during a site visit to Newbiggin Beck, said: "We can see some tree cover along the edge of the beck. It's mainly mature trees – a couple of oaks on one side, a sycamore on the other – and there is not much natural regeneration. Any young trees



have been grazed out, so we're having a decline in tree cover. That means more sunlight is getting to the beck and warming the water and that's not good for the native fish.

"What planting like this will do is cast dappled shade and cool the river, as well as stabilise the banks. Flood fencing, not square fencing, will be used, so that when it floods the fence won't get taken away. We're not using plastic tree guards here, as we don't want them to get into the beck, so instead we're planting in a much higher density – a new tree every metre rather than every two metres – to try to overcome the rabbit problem. We'll be planting native trees that can stand in the wet: goat willow, grey willow, alder, downy birch and alder."

'Keep Ure Rivers Cool' is a 'Dales to Vale Rivers Network' partnership project bringing together the YDNPA, Yorkshire Dales Rivers Trust (YDRT), Woodland Trust, Wild Trout Trust, University of Leeds and Environment Agency to plant riparian trees at priority sites along the Ure catchment.

Sarah Clarke, Senior Catchment Partnership Officer at YDRT, said: "The 'Wenslevdale Project strategy' and Environment Agency mapping work has shown that the Ure is suffering from extreme temperature ranges owing to a lack of shade from bankside trees. This causes problems for aquatic life, particularly during the summer months and during drought conditions. 'The 'Keeping Ure Rivers Cool' project has identified eighty-three sites amounting to 6.2 km of riparian habitat creation. We may not be able to get all these sites planted up with trees, but carrying out work on the top ten is a good start. The planting will help species such as river lamprey, brown trout, white clawed crayfish, otter and kingfisher. We're going to involve volunteers and school children, too, as the project develops. The more people that care for riversides, the better."

News from the Vets

As life hopefully starts to get back towards some sort of normal, we would just like to bring to peoples attention the possibility of separation anxiety and other possible behavioural problems in pets especially puppies. In order to minimise these:

Provide appropriate exposure to the physical domestic environment e.g., introducing things like the lawnmower and other household appliances in a non-threatening way.

Provide adequate exposure to the external physical environment – this is so that your pet isn't distressed by unfamiliar stimuli once lockdown is lifted.

Ensure your puppy gets used to being left alone – start with them being alone in a different room for short periods of time

Get your puppy used to being handled- start with gentle stroking and gradually introduce other actions such as brushing, having paws handled and looking in ears and mouth.

Use this time to get puppy used to riding in a car.

Landscape made fit for dormice

Woods and hedgerows across a 9.5 kilometre (six mile) stretch of mid-Wensleydale have been connected to create an ideal home for the endangered Hazel Dormouse. Land managers have spent the past three years planting, or bringing into 'appropriate management', hedgerows and woodlands either side of Freeholders' Wood at Aysgarth Falls, where dormice were reintroduced in 2008. Farmers have even planted brambles – plants they might usually regard as a thorny nuisance – in order to provide the mammals with late season fruit.

Records show that dormice were found in Wensleydale in 1885 but became locally extinct. Although now formally completed, the impact of the three-year 'Wensleydale Dormouse Project' will be monitored. Simple tubes, containing inked pads, have been hung in hedges to track how far the dormice spread out from their Aysgarth stronghold. Over three

years more than twelve kilometres of existing hedgerow was surveyed, with a quarter of it brought into more appropriate management. Almost two kilometres of new hedgerow was planted. Ten woodland areas, covering more than four hectares, were also brought into appropriate management.

"Local people have really taken to hazel dormice," said project officer Phill Hibbs. "School children at Bainbridge studied them during lockdown, so they'll know that the dormice are about to wake up from their winter torpor, while local landowners – particularly Stuart Raw at Hollins Farm and Tom Orde-Powlett of the Bolton Estate – have enthusiastically supported the work."

Referring to one such woodland on Hollins Farm, Mr Hibbs explained: "This woodland had shrunk to a few mature ash, sycamores and hawthorns. About 15 years ago it was underplanted, but the rabbits got in and knocked it all back. To put it into good management, we've secured all the boundaries and added tree stock, going heavy on the hazel, the primary tree the dormice would use, as well as rowan, hawthorn, blackthorn and holly – and dog rose, bramble and honeysuckle to get a longer fruiting period. These small woodlands are stepping stones for the dormice as they go down the dale."

Ian White, Dormouse and Training Officer for PTES said: "It's been great to see how an appealing small mammal such as the dormouse has galvanised landscape-scale nature conservation. Hazel dormice are endangered, nocturnal and also very shy, so it's comforting to know that all this effort has been made to help a mammal that few people will ever see."
