### **Guest Editorial**

I can't have been the only person in and around Hawes who was seriously upset by the news that the lease on Mason's was likely to pass to someone who wouldn't be selling newspapers. Panic set in. I have been collecting papers in Hawes around 8.00am since deliveries came to an end a good few years ago. I have been reading a daily paper for over 60 years.

Neither of my sons buys a daily paper. One reads the Times on a screen and the other buys a paper from time to time but mostly reads the Guardian on a screen. The son in West London doesn't know where he can buy his Times since the stall outside the entrance to his nearest tube station closed when the man who had run it for years retired. There is a large M and S next to the tube station but the daily routine doesn't allow time to descend to the basement and buy a paper. Both sons enjoy reading a printed version more than a digital version but they don't think the hard copy will be available for many more years. They forecast that the paper option will go altogether in due course, perhaps with the Sunday papers surviving in printed form for longer than the dailies because more people have more time to give to them on Sundays.

This has made me wonder whether my generation of pensioners has been faced with more challenging change in the way we live our lives than, say, my parents or grandparents. I wouldn't argue that all the changes make life worse. I may be one of the last people never to have sent an email while I was working. I was molly-coddled by people sending them on my behalf and didn't need to do it by myself. I realised later that I had been discouraged from sending my own emails because my staff feared losing touch with what I was up to. Within days of retirement I discovered how brilliant a development emails had been despite being a slow and inaccurate typist.

I have been carrying round the same cheque book since June 2018 and I last wrote a cheque in December 2020. I don't miss writing cheques and I do appreciate easy access to the state of our bank accounts sitting in front of a laptop. I feel a little nostalgic for the telephone contact I had with bank staff in Leeds and Scotland before I was able to do more or less everything without speaking to anyone.

Thinking through these issues for the purpose of this article has made me realise that I am in some sort of muddled middle when it comes to conducting life through electronic devices. I plead guilty to being part of the reason that so many bank branches continue to close by never going into one but, when it comes to newspapers, I am a passionate advocate for keeping them in printed form.

I watch as an interested but distant observer to see where the working at home/working in the office debate ends up. I am more of an old fogey on that subject than on most other issues. The Guardian son works in the office two days a week and at home three days a week. The Times son could work at home five days a week but prefers to work in the office. I confess to having worked at home but only after working five days in the office.

I wish there were a neat way of rounding off this article but on all these changes the world seems to be almost as muddled as I am. Optimistically I have some hope that papers will continue to be available in Hawes and that I will get what I want in the shop I have often visited after collecting my paper. I hope that by the time this has been printed my optimism has not been proved wrong.

#### Merlin Magic

#### Dales Countryside Museum. Thursday, May 11th. 7.00pm to 8.00pm.

Merlin magic is a project that aims to help conserve merlin, the UK's smallest bird of prey, which has been red-listed as a bird of conservation concern following recent declines in numbers. Scientists, gamekeepers and raptor workers have collaborated to study breeding merlin on our moorlands and to help better understand how we can guide conservation to support both merlin and other species in upland habitats.

Phil Warren, the Merlin Magic Project Officer, will provide an update on the findings of the twenty month project where we have investigated merlin nesting habits on heather moorland; assessed whether the availability of small birds, key prey during the breeding season, is limiting and deployed nest cameras to collect information on prey provisioning rates to nests.

## A New Era Begins

The changing landscape of Spring always brings delight as the fields fill with the sound of new life, the hills glow in an easy light and the hedgerows begin to flourish with colour. Change is taking place. As a nation we've seen a great deal of change in recent months. ## Middleham and the Dales Local History Group

Middleham Key Centre, **Tuesday, May 16th at** 2.00pm Carving the statue of Queen Elizabeth II for York Minster by Richard Bossons

On November 9th 2022 King Charles III unveiled a majestic statue of the late Queen at York Minster. It is situated by the west entrance to the Minster and depicts the Queen in the robes of the Order of the Garter, the design was chosen by the Queen. The statue was commissioned by the Minster to mark the Queen's Platinum



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Jubilee and was completed in August 2022 shortly before her death.

This fascinating talk will illustrate the whole process from design drawings through to lifting the statue in. Richard Bossons, the stonemason responsible for this prestigious statue will talk about the design brief and context and the practicalities of modelling in clay, then carving in stone and fixing it in place.

Richard is an expert architectural carver and stonemason and this was his first ever portrait. He has been a full time stonemason for 28 years, beginning his career at Wells in Somerset where he worked stone for the Cathedral and other buildings such as Blenheim Palace. From there he moved to Gloucester and spent three and a half years working solely on the Cathedral, before going self-employed and working all over the Cotswolds. In 2011 an opportunity came up to spend the winter working on a large lottery funded phase of work at York Minster, but within only a few weeks "He was so seduced by the work, the building and the city that he moved to York and has been there ever since."

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## Views sought on potential housing development sites

Land has been suggested for 600 new homes in the Yorkshire Dales National Park, with the details being published as part of a public consultation launched on March 24th. The public consultation will close on Friday, May 12th.

A 'call for housing development sites' in January 2021, prompted by a need for more permanently occupied homes in the National Park to sustain local communities, resulted in over 100 sites being put forward. Initial checks on suitability have reduced this long list to 33 sites with indicative capacities ranging from between five to 100 homes. Most of the potential development land is in the National Park's largest settlements including Hawes but sites have also been identified in other villages.



The Member Champion for Sustainable Development at the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority, Carl Lis said: "During the time that we've been working up a new Local Plan it has become clear that we need more people in permanently occupied homes in the National Park. New house building is part of the approach that will help sustain local communities and it is our role as the planning authority to make sure those new homes are built in suitable locations. Action on housing particularly affordable housing - is vital for the long term viability of local communities in the National Park as it faces a significant population challenge that risks reducing demand for local services. Allocating a site for housing development means that planning permission for housing will be granted, subject to plans meeting policies on design, affordability and such like. So this is a big moment. I want to stress that this is a consultation, not a done deal and I would urge people to share their views with us on the suitability of each of the 33 potential sites."

Allocating housing development sites is part of the process of creating a new Local Plan for the Yorkshire Dales National Park. The new Plan will contain a set of planning policies that will shape development up to 2040. At the moment there are already planning permissions in the National Park for around 330 new dwellings that have yet to be developed. This means that if the proposed sites are allocated, the requirement for 850 new homes in the National Park by 2040 could be met. Additional housing will also be able to be built on smaller plots of land within housing development boundaries. Maps showing draft development boundaries have been published today and form part of the public consultation.

People are encouraged to consider the contents of the paper titled 'Consultation No. 6 – Land for housing development'', alongside the background evidence documents and draft maps of more than 90 settlements that show where possible site allocations, development boundaries and important open spaces are proposed. ## Friends of the Dales Events May 2023

Two events to look forward to this month. The first concerns peatlands and the second a walk from Sedbergh.

Over the last year, Yorkshire Dales environmental campaigning charity. Friends of the Dales have collaborated with Yorkshire Peat Partnership to recruit and train Eyes on the Bog volunteers to monitor peatland condition across various sites in the Dales. Eight small monitor teams are now in place, and so the charities are inviting those interested in volunteering for the scheme to come along to their next joint training event taking place Saturday, May 13th, 10.00am – 3.00pm near Ribblehead Viaduct.

Healthy peatlands are vital to biodiversity, water purity and crucial for preventing the thousands of years of carbon stored in the form



of peat being released into the atmosphere. Eyes on the Bog is a IUCN programme which offers a scientifically robust, repeatable, low tech way for individuals and small groups from villages or parishes to review the condition of their own local peatlands two or three times per year.

If following the training event, people want to commit to becoming a volunteer monitor, they will be given easy to use kit enabling them to assess vegetation quality and measure the depth and fluctuations in the water table and also variations in peat quality and depth. Their findings are then fed directly into the Peat Data Hub hosted by the University of Leeds and are an important resource for assessing the effectiveness of restoration and how peatlands are changing through time.

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### Prunings

It is all about colour. Take a quick spin over to Catterick and the gorse is glorious, and we all know what they say about gorse and kissing. Down the A684 the oil seed rape is emerging and the verges are filling up with dandelions. Above the understory there is blossom in profusion and for a brief spell the blackthorn is everywhere. The sunshine makes it glisten, but then too quickly the rain comes, the flowers begin to go over and all that creamy beauty is over for another year. Other trees hold their display much longer and we should thank those thoughtful planters who put in cherries and the various varieties of prunus which keep on flowering for weeks. Looking back I wish I had put in magnolia years ago as now there are so many places where they are putting on a magnificent show.

The roadsides green up according to how much sun hits them. Dog's mercury gives everywhere an acidic tinge and the unmistakeable leaves of the lords and ladies fill up the spaces. Hedges are leafing up and the grass is growing strongly enough for lots of lambs to be out enjoying the sunshine. Spring really has arrived.

Looking round to see what damage the weather had done I am pleased to report that my long-suffering agapanthus are beginning to emerge and there are hellebores hiding where I had forgotten about them. One of the casualties which surprised me was a choisia which had been growing on the front wall for several years.

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I was fond of it because it had a pink flower, but now it is just a mess of brown stems. I think it might be quite a job to remove it.

There is more cutting back to do: the hypericum 'Rose of Sharon' is enormous, it really needs a serious haircut. The fuchsia 'Mrs Popple' is similar and the winter clematis which flowered so impressively is now beetling its way up the main power cable and needs attention before the whole lot pulls off the wall.

Which Gardening has an interesting test lab article on dark leaved dahlias. I was pleased to read that "Bishop of Llandaff" came out top of the survey. I usually try to find at least one as they are very beautiful and are good both for cutting and for pollinators. Most of the dark leaved specimens are single flowered but they listed one decorative in the dark leaved tests which looks really beautiful and performed well from August to November. If I can find it anywhere locally I shall have one, although the tubers are available from Sarah Raven and it would not be too late to start them off now. Last year I had several of the "Bishop" types and was quite pleased with them, but they didn't have a very high score on the "Which" tables.

Whatever you grow, take time to enjoy it!



## A New Look for an Old Favourite

After a three month closure, Aysgarth Falls Hotel has now re-opened following refurbishment by owners, The Brook Group from Barnsley.

The refurbishment is the first part of the company's planned re-development of the business to make it a destination venue in the Dales. All eleven bedrooms in the hotel have been re-decorated in a contemporary style with smart new bathrooms. All the bedrooms are now named after local villages which is a nice touch and so much better than room numbers.

The restaurant is now more formal with glass doors separating it from the rest of the hotel. The restaurant has been called 'Palmers' to link to its past (locals still call the hotel 'Palmer' after its previous name of the Palmer Flat Hotel - so called as it is believed to be on the site of a medieval hospice where pilgrims returning from the Holy Lands were treated for their injuries. It is believed that these pilgrims often carried palm leaves with them as mementoes and this has led to the restaurant carrying the palm leaf as its logo).

The restaurant offers a formal dining option with dishes created by local, Tristan Prudden, Executive Chef at the hotel. An ideal venue for a special celebration, or just a treat! The bar and middle room have also been refurbished although this has divided opinion amongst locals - a good reason to call in yourself to decide what you think. Gone are the tables and



chairs, to be replaced with banquette seating and upholstered chairs for a more relaxed feel. A different menu is available in these areas, with food now served all day.

The next phase of the re-development is due to be conversion of the old garages into a deli/ cafe bar and there is currently a planning application in for the conversion of the existing camp site at the rear of the hotel into intimate permanent pods, along with a car parking area. Hopefully, the work will continue throughout the year to make this already popular hotel/pub a real feature of Wensleydale.



blankets and hot water bottles ready to be stripped of these in time for 'ACTION' The loud diesel heaters bellowed warm air into the tent but proved impossible to work with when it came to sound recording. Helen Dalton and I would race out to turn them on and off again and again.

Rather than trotting up and down hills, we had set our head torches aside to become runners for the film. We did manage to maintain a very healthy step count throughout, by striding up and down the village with water and food for the drinks and snack stations. We always tried be in the right place at the right time, but you could guarantee the second we weren't we would be called and pulled in several directions. Lots of other familiar faces helped by being Extras, drivers and caterers. Timings would be changed and waiting around was frustrating but, most were happy to be involved and interested in the bigger picture. We all took away an amazing insight into an industry we knew nothing about. So many different people with different roles, somehow managing to work together for long periods of time, with (mostly!) smiles on their faces. Hopefully by the end of the year we will be able to go and spot the scenery we know so well on the big screen!

## Healthwatch North Yorkshire appeals for more people to feedback on NHS care

'Review culture' is on the rise, yet only one in ten feed back on health services. People are nearly four times more likely to share their thoughts on a dinner out or takeaway than on according NHS services. to new а survey. National research highlights how widespread the culture of reviewing products and services is now in England. When polled, 84% of adults said they would likely leave a review if they had a positive or negative experience.

Online review forums and product websites are the most likely ways people would share their views. Yet when asked if they would provide feedback after visiting their doctor, nurse or another healthcare professional - just one in ten (11%) people said yes.

Patient feedback can enable the NHS to spot issues and identify where services may need more resource or other support. It can also help address inequalities in access to care, the extent of which has been laid bare by the pandemic.

With NHS and social care services under pressure, Healthwatch is calling on more people to tell the NHS when they are doing a good job and when services can be improved.

Healthwatch North Yorkshire CEO Ashley Green said: "Here in North Yorkshire last year, 2,700 people shared their experiences of health and social care with us. That's great but we would like that number to be even higher so that we can tell local service leaders what things are working well and highlight where there needs to be improvement.

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## Notes from Thorney Mire

### Late Spring

The latest report from the ongoing red squirrel survey in our woodland is favourable. There is still a lot of red squirrel activity and in our neighbouring woodland, one adult and four young have been seen together. One squirrel ventured from the wood and came to investigate the bird feeders in the courtyard. No grey squirrels have been found in our wood but about two miles west of here, three grey squirrels have been found and disposed of. We have had a visit from a stoat in the front garden. Identifiable by the black tip to its tail which distinguishes it from the weasel. The weasel is smaller in size and its tail is shorter than that of the stoat. Another way to tell the difference between the two is, the stoat when it moves, arches its back and moves with a bounding gait whereas the weasel is quicker and moves flatter to the ground.

I look for coltsfoot coming every year and saw the first ones on February 21st on the verge along the lane. I also look each spring for the small patches of primroses that hide beneath the trees, by the wall near the top of the lane. You have to search for them and they never seem to spread. I saw and heard the first curlew on February 26th. I never believe they are here until I actually see them as there are some good imitators in the bird world.

Every year follows the same pattern along the lane, coltsfoot, primroses, curlews, noisy rooks and jackdaws nesting in the top wood, next should be lapwings, but this year the pattern has been broken. I have seen lapwings in their usual nesting grounds along Bands Lane, but this year, although we've seen lapwings flying by, none have returned to their nesting sites in the fields which border our lane. Every year four lapwings return to the same area, once there were only three and one year six, but this year none.

On a damp, overcast morning in March I went in the courtyard to tidy up a small bush. There seemed to be a strange atmosphere but I couldn't decide why. It was so eerily quiet. There was no traffic about, but it wasn't that and then I realised what it was, there was no bird song. No chirping, no tweeting even the normally vociferous rooks and jackdaws were silent. There is normally so much background noise from the birds that it becomes part of the way of life so that you don't notice it until it's not there. A bit like living on a main road when visitors say they can hear the traffic noise and you say, "What noise?"

The results of the R.S.P.B. bird count have been published. Over half a million people took The house sparrow came in first. The part. report states that ten million pairs have disappeared since the 1960s but the numbers have remained stable over the last twenty years. We very rarely see house sparrows in the garden, and starlings, which came in third, only visit us occasionally. What we do have are two collared doves. Collared doves did not come to the U.K. until the 1950s. They are good colonisers having come here from Asia and have now reached America. I call ours Darby and Joan, as they are always together, and where one goes the other follows. They are not the most active of birds, not flittering about using energy looking for food, nor constantly on the alert. They will sit for hours on the garden wall watching the world go by, not that much of the world passes by our garden. They are monogamous and re-affirm their bond by a bit of neck rubbing and pecking.

This year they have produced two young. They like to build their simple nest of twigs in the lower part of our large conifer tree, goldfinches nesting in the upper half, a coexistence that seems to work. The first baby appeared about a week ago which now seems totally abandoned by its parents. It's inherited its parents genes for watching the world go by, sitting on the garden wall or using the hanging basket as a hammock and watching me garden. We never saw this one being fed by its parents. It just appeared one day, almost fully grown and left to its own devices. Then this morning, I looked up from typing this and sitting on the window sill was a second baby dove, smaller than the first one. Its mother joined it and gave me a demonstration on good parenting as it regurgitated some food and the baby put its beak inside the adult's beak to feed. The parent flew onto the garden table, regurgitated some more food, returned and repeated the process about four times.

Having typed up this article I shall now go and prepare my lunch and feel thankful that I am not a bird.

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## **Heavens Above**

Venus steals the show again this month, blazing away in the west soon after sunset. It doesn't set until after midnight so later on in the evening we get to see it in a properly dark sky - a dazzling sight especially with binoculars. Look out for it on the nights of May 23rd and 24th when it's joined by a slender crescent Moon with the planet Mars off to the pair's upper left.

Venus gets even brighter during the next couple of months reaching maximum brilliance (a whopping magnitude 4.5) on July 7th. It's so bright it can even cast shadows on a really dark, moonless night. No wonder its often mistaken for some kind of UFO.

There's quite a good meteor shower in the early hours of May 7th – the annual Eta Aquarids produced by tiny particles of dust left behind by Halley's Comet. They're predicted to be unusually prolific this year so it's a real shame that strong moonlight will badly affect the view.

If you look high in the south on a clear May night you can't possibly miss Arcturus. It's the brightest star in the northern hemisphere and the fourth brightest in the entire sky. Its name comes from the old Greek and means the 'Guardian of the Bear' as it appears to shepherd the constellations of Ursa Major and Minor – the Great and Little Bears – around the sky.

If you look carefully you'll notice Arcturus has a distinct pale orange hue, largely because it's a red giant star like Betelgeux in the constellation of Orion. It's much bigger than our own Sun with a diameter of roughly twenty million miles. As a result it shines well over a hundred times brighter than the Sun despite being only 1.5 times as massive. Even so it's still a puny object compared to Betelgeux – a red supergiant which is almost 1000 times wider than the Sun.

Arcturus is the main star in the large but faint kite-shaped constellation of Boote the Herdsman and marks the kite's sharply-angled bottom corner. In the old Greek myths Bootes (pronounced Bo-Oh-Tease) was placed in the sky as a reward for inventing the plough. I think I would have preferred an endless supply of Bounty Bars.


