

Guest Editorial

I was reminded the other day of how offended my grandmother once was by a photograph in a magazine in which a heavily pregnant woman in a pretty flowered dress stood drinking a cup of tea. What reminded me was a TV advert showing a woman sitting on a lavatory and explaining how useful she found incontinence pads which are so easily available these days. The contrast between those two images shows how far society has changed over fifty years. What my grandmother would have made of the incontinence pad advert boggles the mind.

But it's a change to be welcomed, because today all kinds of topics that were once hidden from view can be spoken about openly. Incontinence, in both men and women, is one such, as are all kinds of health issues, including cancer, dementia, loss of sight and hearing, the menopause, impotence, a whole host of conditions that people used not to talk about in public. Mental health, death, grief, terminal illness, funeral planning are also much more visible in the public domain today. Of course every individual can choose whether to share personal information, but the point I am making is that for those who do want to talk about a particular issue that is troubling them it is now possible to do so without the sense of shame and discomfort that prevailed for so long. Now, long standing taboos seem to be diminishing.

Over the years I have lost several people very close to me from cancer, and in some cases I had no idea of their illness until the end came. Afterwards I not only felt the grief of loss, but also the fact that I had not been able to offer any kind of moral support because they had chosen not to tell anyone beyond the immediate family. Their choice, of course, but when I think of the way in which Dame Deborah James dealt with the bowel cancer that eventually killed her, I am grateful to her for making her illness so public and am sure she must have saved many lives by so doing. By sharing the details of how she coped with a terminal diagnosis she made people so much more aware of how someone in her condition could still get joy out of life right to the end.

Last year I was diagnosed with that same cancer and because there had been no symptoms, by the time it was discovered it had already spread elsewhere. But I am fortunate in that both sites of the cancer were operable and

today I am undergoing chemotherapy for the second time, after two major operations. I have no words to describe the gratitude I feel towards the wonderful medical staff who have been helping me through this long unpleasant process, to fellow patients and to family and friends

There is a lot to learn when you are diagnosed with a serious illness, and the very word 'cancer' is terrifying. Over the months I have discovered all kinds of things about the human body that I never even thought of before, and knowing more helps with the insecurity and the fear. The second cycles of chemotherapy have been much easier than the first, because now I know what to expect. The information provided by Macmillan and Cancer Research UK, to name just two is splendid, clearly written and provided both in paper format and via the internet. Similar publications are available for other health conditions and it has helped me and my children enormously just to be able to understand more about what cancer involves.

Because my children are scattered from London to Yorkshire, a first step was to make a plan so as to share the caring for Mum after the operations and during the treatment. My three daughters and sons-in-law, my son and his lovely wife all pitched in and have driven hundreds of miles taking me to and from hospital appointments, sitting with me during conversations with consultants and cooking patiently for me even when I lost my appetite. They have been a constant source of

cheerfulness and good humour, though I know how hard it has been for them to deal with the situation.

What has also astonished me has been the support of friends, neighbours and colleagues. The nature of my job means that I work in different languages and so over the years I have acquired a vast network of contacts across the world in many countries. At the start, when the cancer was diagnosed, I sent a round robin email to quite a lot of people, who then shared that information with others. I simply explained my situation, said I didn't want to be pitied but would appreciate staying in touch. What has happened over the months has been truly humbling. Not a week has gone by without emails, texts, cards, books, flowers, gifts of all kinds, photographs, music, prayers said for me in different religions, and the cumulative effect of all this love and attention has helped me more than anyone can ever know.

What I have learned from having cancer is that for me, the best way to deal with the fear, the pain and the side effects has been to talk about it all, to share with those willing to listen. One friend commented that I didn't seem to have lost my sense of humour, so I pointed out that cancer doesn't have to mean that all fun goes out of one's life.

The Bridge of Sighs – Skellgill Bridge Reborn

Finally, Skellgill has its bridge back after seven months of intriguing activity.

Over a period of years, the bridge has suffered from wear and tear and, following a partial wall collapse, NYCC sent a survey team with a view to repair or replace the bridge.

Some 18 months later, the decision had been made to not try and repair the very historic bridge, but to replace it with a modern concrete superstructure which would be faced with as much of the stone from the original bridge as possible. In due course, after an incredibly dry spring and summer, residents were informed that work would begin on the new bridge on September 12th last year for a scheduled period of 8 weeks!



Suffice to say, the bridge was opened to grateful residents and local farmers on April 19th – almost 7 months to the day, so much for 8 weeks of scheduled works!

They say timing is everything and this couldn't have happened at a more inconvenient time. Our notification that the bridge works were going to commence was only given in July/August, however we had already booked builders etc. to do a new kitchen for us back in January and you guessed it, they came to start the same week!

An entire old kitchen and rubble had to be removed, all new appliances, entire new kitchen plus numerous tradesmen and tools all had to make frequent trips from vans parked some distance away.

Lots of tea and biscuits certainly helped to lessen the blow, if not almost bankrupt us in the process.

It was certainly an interesting time in the

makeshift parking lot where our cars vied for position with our workman's vans and numerous contractors' vehicles.

The contractors who won the tender were based in the Leeds area, this meant that the core team of 2 - 3 men who did the majority of the work from day one, were travelling daily from Leeds and Halifax and enduring all the weather that a winter in Wensleydale could throw at them!

It seems hard to imagine that with a mid September starting date, there was never going to be any realistic proposition of completion before Christmas, given the likely working conditions and probable weather disruption.

In order to 'speed' things up a team of three stone specialists were subcontracted for the final 6 - 7 weeks of the build, and these poor chaps had to travel from Rotherham every day.

On a much more positive note, the temporary footbridge (which of course had to be provided as the bridge and road are also a public footpath route) has now been removed and we have road access back to our property once more.



The bridge itself, whilst no longer quite as historic and quaint as it was, is, under the surface of the original stone facing, a modern, fit for purpose construction, and given some weathering over time, will blend in as naturally as its predecessor.

Heavens Above

It isn't the best time of the year for star-gazing especially during the weeks surrounding the Summer Solstice - Midsummer's Day - this year June 21st. The sky only gets reasonably dark around midnight so you've got to be prepared to stay up just that little bit later to sample what's on offer. If you do venture out you won't be able to miss brilliant Venus, a dazzling Evening Star blazing away in the west soon after sunset. It reaches its maximum brightness for the year on July 9th but soon after that drops rapidly in the sky and disappears into the twilight by the beginning of August. Try looking for it around 11.00pm on June 21st, the same date as the Summer Solstice, when it pairs up with a thin crescent Moon and the Red Planet, Mars. A beautiful sight in the deep blue twilight.

If you look south you'll notice the main springtime constellations, Leo and Virgo, have drifted noticeably westwards, though Bootes the Herdsman, with its brilliant orange leader Arcturus, is still prominent high in the southwest. The Plough is high in the north-west which means the distinct 'W' of Cassiopeia (on the opposite side of the Pole star) is rather low in the north-east. Most of the south-eastern sky is filled by a set of dim constellations led by Hercules the Strongman. To his right you'll find the ancient constellation of Corona Borealis, the Northern Crown - very appropriate in the light of last month's Coronation celebrations (or over-the-top flummery depending on your point of view!). It's a distinct semi-circle of stars representing the golden crown of Princess Ariadne who according to the old Greek myths helped the hero, Theseus, find his way out of the Labyrinth on the island of Crete after he defeated the monstrous bull-headed Minotaur.

High in the south-east for the next few months you'll find the well-known Summer Triangle, a large asterism or star pattern formed by Vega, Deneb, and Altair, the brightest stars in the constellations of Lyra, Cygnus, and Aquilla the

Eagle. Cygnus, or the Northern Cross as it's sometimes called, lies in the rich star fields of the summer Milky Way – well worth sweeping with binoculars on a dark, moonless night.

June sees the start of the Noctilucent (night shining) Clouds season. At an altitude of 75-80 kilometres - almost on the edge of space - they're the highest clouds in the Earth's atmosphere shining by reflected sunlight long after other clouds have faded away into the darkness. They're probably caused by ice forming around tiny particles of interplanetary or volcanic dust. A display of these eerie silvery-blue bands and strands low over the northern horizon is a magical sight on a clear summer's night. If conditions are just right you might be lucky enough to see them spread right across the sky. The best time to look for them is around midnight late on in June and early August.

Have clear skies!

New Hosts at Corn Mill

For many years, the Corn Mill Tearoom in Bainbridge has been in the hands of the Peacock Family, but not any more. The new proprietors are Craig and Bridie, the couple who have developed The Bake-Well in Askrigg. They weren't particularly looking for an additional cafe but when the Corn Mill came on the market they decided to expand. Craig says they must have been slightly delusional, especially when they knew a baby was on the way. Bobby was born in March and the tearoom was opened on April 24th, so it has been a bit hectic, but so far they have had no regrets.

Craig and Bridie have been at The Bake-Well for three and a half years and are well established there. They were both at the Kings Arms in Askrigg before that, Craig as head chef, Bridie as a manager, so they have built up some experience in the catering trade. The Bake-Well has proved a popular venue, particularly as a takeaway outlet. But it's not just sandwiches and packed lunches: Full scale meals are provided by request. That is, providing customers are prepared to come and collect, because, with being so busy at the moment, there are no immediate plans to provide an outside catering service. That may change in the future, of course; we'll have to wait and see.

The Corn Mill is more of a café, although it does offer a takeaway service. It has a lot more seating, which, in fine weather, can easily be extended out front, overlooking the village green. There is a good range of cakes on display to attract customers and there are plenty of other light bites and snacks on the menu. Bridie specialises in baking, whereas Craig focuses more on the main meals. Many of the recipes are standard favourites but they do like to add a little twist of their own, maybe a little surprise.

Although the two premises differ slightly in their objectives, the aim is to provide some consistency. For example, the opening hours will be the same for both. They are open **seven days a week** (a big selling point) from **8.30am to 4.00pm (10.00am - 3.00pm on Sundays).** Not many cafes in the dales open as early as 8.30am, so this is a real bonus. Hopefully they will be able to sustain this ambitious timetable, but they have admitted that it will be more of a challenge in winter.

Craig said that trade was fairly quiet in

Bainbridge at first. That suited the couple well because they were easing their way into a new project whilst looking after a new born baby. They said that they have been lucky with staff, when other establishments have struggled to find workers. They plan to keep three staff at each of the cafes, although they are interchangeable, as all of them are happy to work at either location. They will continue to use university and college students who are often available when the cafes are at their busiest. That sounds like a win/win situation.

Last month a group of nine of us dropped in at the Corn Mill after a walk. The café was busy so we ordered our drinks and cakes and sat outside. Even the committed beer drinkers (who rarely visit cafes) had to admit it was good. The slices of cake were all very generous and delicious and with so much choice we were thinking about what we would select next time.

And there will be a next time. We gave the place a thumbs up and reckoned we would be back. In the interim we all wish Craig and Bridie the best of luck in their new venture. Why not give it a try?

I think it might be time to give them a little more space as a reward for making it thus far. They must have filled their pots by now. Looking out of the porch window I can see buds on the cotoneaster horizontalis. Once again it has grown too big and will have to be curtailed, but I can see the little pink buds forming. In a week or two it will be alive with flying creatures and I shall hear it as I walk past. Amazing!

Seeds Sown For Next Season

Young footballers have sown the seeds for a new full-sized pitch on Hawes Community Fields. Hawes United Under 12s have been playing 9-a-side football this season, but from September they will graduate to 11-a-side – and for that a bigger playing area was needed.

Last year the charity which manages the Community Fields bought land to enlarge the 'Big Field' and last month 141 tonnes of soil were brought in to create a level playing surface, with another 200 tonnes moved from the bunds around the tarmac area in the middle field.



It's the final piece in the jigsaw of a four-year, £130,000 'Improving Facilities Project', which has seen the creation of a mini-pavilion called the Johnny Walker Laithe as well as the Match Hatch for serving refreshments.

Hawes Community Fields already has one pitch, which is the home of Hawes United men, but it can drain poorly, limiting its use during winter, and it is some distance from the roadside pavilion.

Hawes United Juniors Under-12s captain, Adam Whaley, speaking after their last match of the season on Saturday against a talented Spennithorne team, said: "I really like football and I've always wanted to play for a football team. It's very, very good that we have a full-sized pitch to play on next season."

Our latest exhibition, Within These Walls -Hay time in the Yorkshire Dales (until September 17th) is now open. At our Meet the Artist event visitors chatted with artist and printmaker Hester Cox and we were particularly thrilled that Mr and Mrs Marley from Ireland were able to come along. They have shared photos of their ancestors and other Irish workers from Glenhest, who travelled to work in the Dales at hay time until the middle of the last century. The exhibition celebrates the history of hay time and Hester's stunning installation, beautiful lino cuts and collagraph work reflect her passion for these important hay meadow habitats. Visitors are enjoying listening to the oral history clips of local people talking about hay time and seeing the archives and artefacts linked with hay time activity. Look out for our meadow events including a lino cut workshop with Hester.



Our volunteer team have been adding features, games and play prompts to the outdoor trail and have also created a small meadow area on the platform which will complement our hay time exhibition. Tees-Swale Community Engagement trainee, Hermione, has added activities which helped families connect with nature and celebrate National Bee Day on May 20th.

Partnerships – The Way Forward For Upper Dales Community Land Trust

The former Methodist Chapel in Bainbridge recently hosted a significant gathering of people who will all play an essential role in the Upper Dales Community Land Trust's ongoing journey towards the creation of affordable housing for local people living and working in the remote Upper Dales.

Back in 2022, the volunteer-led Upper Dales Community Land Trust (UDCLT) were delighted when they were awarded funding in excess of £340,000 from the then Richmondshire District Council. This funding enabled them to buy the former Methodist Chapel in Bainbridge for a planned conversion into two 2-bedroomed affordable housing units.

However, although they now had a property they still required additional financial support to complete the renovations, and they were short of specific housing expertise to manage the ongoing build and maintenance of their project.

Happily, they were introduced to North Star - a north-east based housing association whose purpose is to provide affordable housing, invest in their communities and develop new homes across the Tees Valley, North Yorkshire and County Durham. North Star had been looking to extend their housing network into this remote part of the Yorkshire Dales, and so were very pleased to find out about the premises the UDCLT had already purchased at Bainbridge, and the Trust's ongoing build ambitions.

As a small community land trust, the UDCLT isn't a registered housing provider and therefore is not able to apply directly for financial support from Homes England, the non-departmental public body that funds new affordable housing in England. However North Star is a registered provider and they were able to approach Homes England on behalf of the Trust. All involved were thrilled when Homes England confirmed they were awarding a grant towards the Bainbridge project.

Hence the recent gathering - Stephen Stubbs, Chair of the UDCLT, North Star's Sarah Fawcett (Head of Development) and Richard Panter, Growth Manager at Homes England, along with volunteers from the Trust - all came together to celebrate new partnerships and to see the former Chapel prior to its transformation.

At the meeting Sarah explained her organisation's role in this project: "The heart of North Star is very much about working in communities and not imposing ourselves upon them. We just felt that this was an opportunity for us to partner with an organisation in a rural area we've not currently got a connection with. There's obviously a housing need, and the UDCLT has skills, expertise, passion and interest; it feels like this could be the start of a partnership relationship that we'd love to explore to meet additional housing needs in the area."

Homes England's Richard Panter, who was keen to see the building and community 'before' the works start, confirmed the importance of alliances: "When North Star and the UDCLT teamed up it was a beautiful moment. We rely on organisations such as North Star to hear about opportunities for us to provide financial awards in areas where we've not to date been able to reach. This project involves a community land trust promoting community-led rural housing, and in a location where we know we haven't delivered a lot. We also know there's very high need and big affordability issues."

Richard went on: "The fact that the local authority had already invested in terms of the land means there's real commitment and real partnership there and it looks like a deliverable scheme; lots of heavy lifting had been done before I got involved and North Star brought it to us."

Sarah agreed: "It's extremely helpful that HE can provide financial support and I think it's been exceptionally helpful that Richmondshire District Council have been so supportive financially because these things are expensive to do. North Star is prepared to put money and expertise into these projects, but we do need other people to contribute to the costs as well."

Stephen Stubbs summed up what these alliances mean for the UDCLT: "The Trust volunteers all have jobs so we don't have the capacity to organise the build of these properties and then manage them in the long term. We do have in-depth knowledge of the rural communities and insight into the area's affordable housing need so we see ourselves as facilitating the creation of affordable housing in these deeply rural areas by teaming up with partners such as RDC, North Star and Homes England."

The Trust is hoping that building work on the Chapel will commence this Autumn. The UDCLT has a number of future affordable housing projects in the pipeline. Anyone wanting more information or interested in supporting the UDCLT should email UDCLTrust@gmail.com or visit www.udclt.co.uk.

Living Verges

The last 80-90 years have seen the acceleration of a biodiversity emergency in the UK as more intensive farming, driven by farming policy, has eroded our once prevalent hay meadows.

Species-rich meadows are not only more resistant to climate change and store more carbon than non-biodiverse grasslands, but they also support hundreds of varieties of plants, myriad insect life and dozens of bird species. The good news is that there is something we can all do to help and prevent further decline in biodiversity, we can look to protect and enhance those former strips and remnants of traditional grassland that have survived as roadside verges.

The principles of nature positive verge management are simple. Cut verges or other village grassland no later than April and clear cuttings away to prevent the build-up of thatch, which increases soil nitrogen levels and can



encourage docks, nettles and thistles to take hold. Do not cut the grass between May and August (inclusive) to allow plants to flower and set seed. If cutting

can't be avoided, consider mowing paths or narrow edge strips but leave some areas uncut as a wildlife refuge. This can also help to address concerns about untidiness and safety. Remove invasive weeds (nettles, thistles, docks) by chopping down/uprooting, not spraying. Do a second cut in September, clearing all cuttings away. In other words, cut less, cut later, takeaway!

Summer Sunday Dales Bus Services

More Sunday DalesBus services start **June 4th** in Wensleydale for the summer season.

There are some changes for 2023 offering some new travel opportunities, although sadly Northern DalesBus service 830 to Richmond will not run this year due to changes to the connecting train service. It is hoped to restore this service next year.

Wensleydale Explorer bus 855 will provide improved connections with trains on the Leeds-Settle-Carlisle line at Garsdale, as well as links to and from villages down the dale as far as Castle Bolton. It will run every Sunday until October 22nd between Garsdale Station, Hawes, Bainbridge, Askrigg, Carperby and Castle Bolton, as follows:

From Hawes Market Place to Garsdale Station at 10.10am, 4.00pm, 5.30pm and 6.10pm.

From Garsdale Station to Hawes at 10.45am, 4.30pm, 5.55pm and 6.35pm.

From Hawes Dales Museum to Castle Bolton at 11.10am and 2.50pm.

From Castle Bolton to Hawes at 11.40am and 3.30pm.

Wensleydale Explorer 855 will be operated by Little White Bus as part of the DalesBus network managed by Dales and Bowland Community Interest Company with financial support from Upper Dales Community Partnership, the Friends of the Settle Carlisle Line, Bolton Castle, Friends of the Dales and other local supporters.

Northern DalesBus 832 will again provide a Summer Sunday service to Ribblehead, Ingleton and Kirkby Lonsdale. It will run every Sunday until October 22nd, and also on August Bank Holiday Monday, leaving Hawes Market Hall at 12.35pm, and returning from Kirkby Lonsdale Booths at 3.30pm. This service is operated by Arriva North East, with support from Friends of the Dales and the Jack Brunton Charitable Trust.

There's no need to book to travel on these services, so you can simply turn up and go. Local bus fares are capped at just £2 for each journey all summer as part of a national initiative which includes these Sunday buses. Concessionary bus passes are valid for free travel on Wensleydale Explorer bus 855, but not on Northern DalesBus 832.

Bow Bridge

Last month's Mystery Picture, Bow Bridge over Grange Gill Beck is a grade II listed building. An extract from the English Heritage Inspectors report said:

"Bow Bridge is thought to date to the 13th century and was built to service the

Wensleydale estates of Jervaulx Abbey. The bridge is located north east of the presumed site of Fors Abbey which was the original foundation before the monks moved it to Jervaulx in 1156.

The site of Fors Abbey was occupied after by a grange of Jervaulx known to have existed until the mid-16th century. The bridge provided access from the grange to the extensive Jervaulx estates in upper Wensleydale and also lay on a significant medieval route carrying traffic along the northern side of Wensleydale and over the Dales to the west. It continued to serve as part of the road network through the post-medieval period and in the late 18th century was widened on the southern side in order to carry the Richmond to Lancaster turnpike. The bridge was replaced in 1899 by a new bridge built thirty metres downstream when the road was widened and straightened.'

"Bow Bridge is a good example of a surviving medieval pack horse bridge which retains a range of constructural features. Its importance is emphasised by the historic link with the Jervaulx Abbey estates and by its later widening as part of the 18th century turnpike network.

Taken as whole the bridge makes a significant contribution to the study of transport and communications in the Yorkshire Dales in the medieval and post-medieval periods."

Afoot in Two Dales Challenge Walk

The Irregulars is a local group within the Long Distance Walkers Association (LDWA) for people with the common interest of walking long distances in rural, mountainous or moorland areas.

The group is currently organising a 50 mile/5,500ft circuit of the Yorkshire Dales for experienced walkers and runners, entitled Afoot In Two Dales (AKA The Yorkshire 50), to be held over the weekend of **July 15th and 16th**. This is a circular walk on footpaths, bridleways and quiet roads through Swaledale and Wensleydale offering some of the best walking that the Yorkshire countryside has to offer.

After starting at Harmby Village Hall, participants make their way to checkpoints at Castle Bolton, Haverdale, Muker, Hardraw, Bainbridge, Thoralby and The Gallops, where they are given refreshments, eventually

returning to Harmby for a cooked meal. They will be setting off from Harmby at **8.30am on Saturday, July 15th** and have 22 hours to complete the route.

We charge an entry fee to cover the cost of e.g. hiring several village halls, provision of food and drink, transportation for anyone dropping out through injury or fatigue and first aid at the finish. After the event our intention is to use any surplus funds to make a donation to the Swaledale Mountain Rescue as we did last year. We anticipate around 150 people entering the event and over 100 have already signed up.

The event is held with kind permission of the walk's originator Jill King, and the Cleveland LDWA Group, and is available as an 'Anytime Challenge' walk that could be completed over two to three days.
