The Tale of the Little Green Bin

Once upon a time, someone had the clever idea that a small green bin would be a good way of households collecting and disposing of their garden and vegetable waste. As a result, a nice little green bin on wheels was made and delivered to properties in Richmondshire.

For those with a garden these were wonderful - at last, a place to put our compostable waste and garden clippings etc that didn't end up all over the path or drive when the black bags split! However, for those without a garden, these became an eyesore and a waste of space.

There are some places in Richmondshire where the storing of a green bin at a property is nigh on impossible with either poor access or insufficient space to store them, particularly as every home already had a big black bin too.

Collection days in small villages, such as West Witton, created not only an eyesore but also a hazard to pedestrians and indeed motorists (when it was a windy day) with lines of green bins waiting on the footpath for emptying.

After some time, the Council realised that this service, whilst useful to some, was not needed by all and was not actually making them any money. So, it was decided to introduce an annual fee for those who wanted a little green bin. If you wanted a bin, you could pay the annual fee and receive a sticker in exchange which you could put on your bin identifying to the operatives which ones were paid for and should be emptied on a fortnightly basis.

Whilst not popular as deemed an additional cost on top of our Council Tax for the privilege of having garden and/or a lot of compostable waste (which we assumed the Council could turn into compost and sell), this scheme continued successfully until this year.

With nothing ever standing still these days (except the green bins awaiting emptying on the footpaths), the creation of a new North Yorkshire Council saw the closure of the district council offices across the region. This appeared to spark discussion on many fronts but we were told it would be a good thing as it would cut out an unnecessary layer of local government and make life easier, not to mention save money for the Council.

Well, that all sounded fine, but then the practicality of it came to light. I won't go into the cost of re- branding this new Council and relabelling countless vehicles, buildings, signs, literature etc, etc. However, the fate of the poor little green bin has been distressing.

It would appear that in a big Council area, he who speaks louder gets what he wants (usually the case) and, as we know, those who live in the Dales don't tend to make much noise unless they are really upset about something.

And so it came to be that all those who had previously signed up to a little green bin were sent an email advising them that, under the new bigger and better Council, there would only be one uniform size of green bin and that would be the large one, as preferred by those who spoke louder!

We were advised that we had a choice - woo! We could either keep our little green bin but pay an increased cost, or we could have a swanky, new big green bin and pay almost double the cost for the same collection arrangements. Not much of a choice really! As if that wasn't bad enough, we were then told that we could either keep our old little green bin and use it for some other purpose, or we could ask the Council to collect it, but this would not be for some time as they would be busy delivering new bins.

Poor little green bin!! Not only has it been abandoned as useless for its original purpose but now it is just hanging around somewhere waiting for someone from the Council to come and collect it! Do we think they will ever materialise? Possibly but even if they do, what are they going to do with all these abandoned little green bins? Is there a retirement home for them? Perhaps it is with all those hideous banks of recycling bins that were imposed upon every village a couple of years ago - most of which were subsequently returned as they were not required, weren't in keeping with villages in a National Park, or were just a waste of time and money.

I suspect that somewhere in the area, there will be a storage facility newly hired to store all these redundant bins! Meanwhile, the new big green bins have turned out to be a big disaster for many! If you look closely at them, the build quality is very inferior to that of the little green bin and suggests that it won't be long before replacement green bins are needed. However, for many the biggest problems relate to the

storage of such a big bin (for many, finding the space for a little green bin was bad enough!) but there is an even bigger problem that no-one seems to have realised. Once you fill your big green bin with all your garden waste, lawn clippings, vegetable peelings etc etc, it is so heavy that you can't actually move it!!!! Trying to drag this huge bin to the nearest site where an operative is prepared (or allowed) to collect it from is like training for the World's Strongest Man! As a consequence, I now hear that many of these bins are being returned as they are utterly useless to those who are not fit enough to move them!!

Perhaps I have inadvertently found a use for the retired little green bin? Maybe we are all supposed to hang onto it to store half of our green waste so that the big green bin goes out for every collection only half full?! At least that way, we would always have a bin for collection as we would be so far behind with our green waste during the summer months that it would take weeks to catch up! Perhaps that makes a big green bin better value for money as we are at least making use of every collection which we are not always doing with a little green bin in the 'dead' months of the year! However, let's not forget that if we adopted this idea, we would then need to be fit enough to tip the contents of the little green bin into the big green bin - I doubt many of us could manage that!

Either way, I am struggling to see the sense in whole exercise. never this mind (forgive the pun!) credentials of manufacturing all these bins and chucking out a load that were perfectly useable. And that is before we even contemplate the potential need for new lorries to empty the bigger bins and the storage facility purchased or hired to store all the retired little green bins!!!! I expect there was also a cost associated with training the operatives in the safe way to move these big green bins! The list - and the cost - goes on!

Am I alone in thinking this was all a complete waste of time and money? I rather doubt it!

So, if you can think of a new use for all these hundreds of little green bins who have been cast aside, now is the time to speak up! An adoption scheme could see them re-homed and living happily ever after, rather than cast on the scrap heap as a hideous indictor of our wasteful society!

Affordable Homes in Bainbridge

The Upper Dales Community Land Trust (UDCLT) is very excited to share the news that their first affordable housing project is nearing completion. Two brand new 2-bedroom flats have been created from what was a beautiful but crumbling - former Methodist Chapel in Bainbridge, Upper Wensleydale.

These will be available to people with a local connection who would otherwise struggle to



afford to live in the area (see end of article for more information on qualifying for affordable housing and the application process).

The UDCLT is a volunteer-led charity whose mission is to create affordable housing for those born, living and working in the remote Upper Dales. It was formed in 2017 by a group of concerned Upper Dales residents and local council members who recognised there was, and is, a critical shortage of affordable housing in our region. Since our inception we have built up important partnerships and attracted enough funding and support to purchase the Chapel, and then carry out the building works necessary to create the affordable homes. These homes will be let and managed by our partners North Star Housing Group.

We have a number of ambitious and exciting plans for the development of more affordable homes in the deeply rural areas of the North Yorkshire Dales, plans that reflect and resonate with current research identifying the challenges faced by residents within our Upper Dales area who just cannot afford to live in the place they have been born and brought up in.

Herbal Remedies

It was when the wind started composing tunes through our brickwork that I realised we needed the front of the house repointing. Before the builder started, I had to peel off a climbing hydrangea which had effortlessly reached bedroom height. This tenacious brute seemed intent on breaking and entering and persuading it to let go was no easy task: the aerial roots clung fast and any stems in crevices had swelled and locked in. After a half day's slog, up a ladder with a chisel, an accident waiting to happen, job done. Wow, look, a naked house. Two weeks on and the pointing's done but no more climbers for me though – one door shuts etc and there's a well drained 10ft by 6ft sun trap revealed, perfect for scented herbs.

I've read that the most evocative sense we have is smell, a waft of scent can transport you anywhere, peel back the years. Not always good - a hint of chlorine and I'm returned in a flash to the 60's, enduring fraught swimming lessons at Pudsey baths. Upsides are plenty though, particularly in the garden, where a perfumed rose or brushed artemisia and I'm a scrawny kid again, back bug hunting in that childhood Sandsend holiday cottage rockery.

Let's start planting at the rear with the beefriendly savoury leaved sage, Salvia officinalis, 2ft by 3ft, with the prettiest tiny blue flowers. I'll surround it with three hardy Hidcote lavenders, very dependable as long as you remember to deadhead lightly in Autumn and prune just above new growth in spring. By the front door and it's got to be artemisia abrotanum, the southernwood. This 'lad's love' is as pungent as it gets, the crushed leaves giving off an 'aroma' which, coupled with its toxicity and insignificant yellow flowers, divides opinion on suitability. I love it but posties and delivery drivers aren't so

keen - that Evri driver's got looking daggers off to a fine art.

As a centrepiece I've chosen common myrtle, communis, which has flourished in a sheltered position in my garden for several years. Despite its tender reputation, the profusion of small white blooms has never failed, and set against the glossy aromatic foliage, this will win your heart.

Let's simplify towards the front and give the bees a treat by alternating common thyme with its posher cousin, Golden Queen. The dark and light leaf tones are complemented by a wealth of purple flowers in summer. Prune lightly after flowering to maintain compactness, otherwise trouble free. Give all mentioned sun lovers plenty of room to spread, as they all have sharp elbows and hate 'clutter' and consequent shadow.

Two I rejected for the project are lemon balm and mint. Well-disciplined when young, the balm thickens too quickly and seeds all over the garden. Don't get me started on garden mint. Nice as a sauce with tatties, but the plant spreads like juicy scandal and will take over your garden. Assert yourself and grow it in a bucket, show it who's boss.

July: a General Election, the 'Euro24' Final and the Olympic games. What a month! There will inevitably be a mixture of celebration and commiseration as our hopes and expectations bring either delight or disappointment on the pitch, track or in the ballot box.

We will see some wonderful examples of human determination and skill in the coming weeks, but one quality that unites all the participants is that of integrity. There has already been some encouraging displays of honesty and fair play on the football pitch and I am hoping that we will see the same from our political candidates and athletes.

I have been reminded recently of the life of Eric Liddell, the Christian sprinter whose story was famously captured in the Oscar winning film 'Chariots of Fire'. Seen as a favourite to win the 100m final in the 1924 Paris Olympic

Games he risked coming away from the games with absolutely nothing after refusing to compete because that particular race was scheduled to be run on a Sunday. In the end he competed in the 400m, an event he had not trained for, and won Gold. The film depicted a man who put God before his sporting career.

The Bible describes our lives as a race – a race of unknown length and one in which none of us know when we will reach the finishing line. Whether we agree or disagree with Liddell's decision is, for me, not the point. What I find attractive is his courage and integrity in standing for what he felt was right. In sport, politics or daily life, we all benefit when such qualities are lived out by ourselves and those around us. With such a testing month ahead, it may be good to remember that the Bible also speaks a great deal about HOPE!

Wensleydale Concert Series July Concerts

St Andrew's Church will ring to the sound of two fantastic, and very different, concerts in July.

The first concert on Saturday, July 6th, is a four-hand piano recital by two truly brilliant musicians: Benjamin Frith and Heidi Rolfe. The first half of the concert is a varied mix of music by the Irish composer John Field (famed throughout Europe and admired by Chopin and Liszt), quirky French composer Erik Satie, a Rondo by Franz Schubert and one of Brahms's ever-popular Hungarian Dances. The second half is devoted to one work, Nicolai Rimsky-Korsakov's spectacular and entertaining "Scheherazade". This is an ideal summer concert for all music lovers and a great introduction to anyone new to classical concerts, it will be a spectacular evening!



The second concert on **Saturday**, **July 27th**, features the Herschel Trio - three musicians playing baroque instruments: flute, recorders, viol and harpsichord. Their programme is a survey of early music from the British Isles and includes sets of 'airs' from Wales and Ireland, as well as music from England by Purcell and Handel and less well known, but nonetheless brilliant, baroque composers. The concert features works by: James Oswald from Scotland, Moravian composer Godfrey Finger

who worked in the court of James II of England, English Composer Thomas Arne (probably most famous for "Rule! Britannia!") and London based violinist and composer, Nicola Matteis. This will be a real treat from three amazing musicians, another ideal concert for a summer evening.

Sedbergh, Hardraw, and the Kitchener Camp Rescue in World War II

In the middle of World War II, a company of German-speaking soldiers arrived in Sedbergh. These men weren't Prisoners of War, but British Army troops – so what was their history? And how did they come to be in Sedbergh?

Kitchener camp has been largely forgotten today, but in 1939 this derelict World War I army base on the Kent coast became the scene of an extraordinary rescue of around 4,000 Jewish men from German concentration camps. The rescue was funded and run by the same organisations that ran the 'Kindertransport' for children. Indeed, some of the children of Kitchener refugees were saved on the Kindertransport scheme.

When war was declared, many hundreds of the Kitchener camp refugees enlisted in the British army in Autumn 1939. My father was one of these volunteers. For the first few years of the war, the refugees were only permitted to join the Auxiliary Military Pioneer Corps – an unarmed labour unit. My dad was in 69 Company, AMPC.

In January 1940, 69 Company was sent to France as part of the British Expeditionary Force. During the main Dunkirk retreat, the Pioneer Corps soldiers were kept behind to 'hold the line', while thousands returned to safety. They were ordered to destroy vehicles and ordnance so they would not fall into enemy hands. Finally, 69 Company was brought back to Britain on unarmed fishing trawlers on 16 June 1940.

Next, 69 Company was moved around the country laying mines, digging ditches, and erecting miles of barbed-wire fencing. By Autumn they were clearing bomb sites in Bexley, recovering victims, and bringing out the dead. In December 1940, five of the company were killed and 19 injured when a bomb hit their bus.

In 1941, 69 Company arrived in Sedbergh, to construct a large petrol and oil depot. Many were billeted in the old workhouse and some were billeted at the vicarage in Hardraw, including my father.

As a child growing up in Yorkshire, I often heard talk of 'Uncle John' Steele, vicar of St Mary and St John's Church, Hardraw. He and his wife Margaret (Meg) befriended my father in the heart of their home – a loving kindness that was especially needed when my dad learned after the war that none of his close family had survived the Holocaust.

There is an account of the Pioneer Corps' stay in Sedbergh in a book by Norman Bentwich, *I Understand the Risks*. Bentwich outlines the work the soldiers were carrying out here, but also describes dinner parties and concerts, and the relationships formed with people in the town.

I'm planning a visit to Sedbergh and Hardraw this year, and wonder whether someone might have a family memory of this time: a company of German-speaking troops in British Army uniform in the middle of World War II must surely have been something of an event. And I would very much like to engage with anyone who has been told about it by parents or grandparents – who might have some letters exchanged with the refugees, or even photographs of social events.







Although there are many challenges, there are opportunities to shape a positive future. As part of the nationwide Our Upland Commons project led by the Foundation for Common Land, Rob and Harriet Fraser have spent time in these special parts of England meeting people who are passionately committed to a positive future: farmers, landowners, conservationists, heritage specialists, ecologists, scientists and others.

The exhibition offers a glimpse into the online collection of 'Commons Stories' with insights into farming, wildlife and conservation, and perspectives on how to move forward collectively to protect and enhance the landscape and its communities.

Scurry Club Pass:

If you'd like your child to be able to visit all year round, why not think about a Scurry Club Pass? Your child and an accompanying adult carer can visit all year round and kids can start collecting their squirrel badge and first stamp as soon as they visit. We're developing a colourful

Innovative Flood Resilience Project Introduces Talking Lampposts to Yorkshire

Ousewem, an innovative flood resilience project, is transforming community engagement efforts by enlisting the help of talking lampposts to raise awareness about natural flood management (NFM) in North Yorkshire.

Led by City of York Council, in collaboration with North Yorkshire Council, Ousewem aims to identify and deliver nature-based solutions (NbS), including NFM, to reduce flood risk in vulnerable North Yorkshire communities across Yorkshire's Swale, Ure, Nidd, and Ouse (SUNO) river catchments. "We're excited to introduce cutting-edge interactive technology to increase understanding of how water is impacting our local area and community," said Victoria Murray, Innovative Flood Resilience Project Manager, City of York Council.

Together, we look forward to addressing the critical issue of flood resilience in Yorkshire. This partnership represents powerful commitment engagement and environmental stewardship, and we are excited about the positive impact we make together." "These interactive conversations are designed to evolve gradually over time, offering continuous educational materials. resources. engagement and opportunities," added Murray. "We're encouraging everyone to keep an eye out for our talking signs when out and about!"

www.goodjourney.org.uk is an occasional free mailing - with attractive photos backing up ideas of destinations for car-free adventures. Sources of public transport information and interesting discounts (such as free cups of tea at 40 selected National Trust properties) are publicised in the current issue.

www.dalesbus.org and www.moorsbus.org are websites with a wealth of information on summer services using buses chartered from commercial operators at week-ends. Routes connect towns, cities, coast and countryside with destinations in the Yorkshire Dales and Yorkshire Moors National Parks.

As an example, the Sunday DalesBus No 838 departs from Darlington at **8.30am**. Its route includes Richmond, Catterick, Redmire, Carperby, Askrigg and Bainbridge, reaching Hawes at **10.0am**. The service then continues to connect with train services at Ribblehead station (Leeds-Settle-Carlisle Line).

There are many more possibilities for days out into the Dales, using DalesBus services starting from York, Leeds, Keighley, Wharfedale, Northallerton, Leyburn etc. Place names served on the Moorsbus network include Pickering, Malton, Helmsley and Scarborough. Both websites include maps of their own route network.

For trains to and from Garsdale station on summer Sundays until **October 20th**, it is a familiar vehicle (a Little White Bus) but operating as Sunday bus number 857. This service runs from Hawes to Garsdale station - and then to and fro between Garsdale station via Hawes-Bainbridge-Askrigg-Carperby-Redmire-Castle Bolton village green.

It's a great journey, whether you are planning a walk, going to visit the castle (admission fee), meeting friends along the route for a (prebooked) Sunday lunch - or just going to enjoy the scenery, using a valid free bus pass or paying the current £2 adult single fare. Recommended!

Wensleydale School News

Every now and again the Government talks about how schools should take a firm line with mobile phones, encouraging tough policies to ensure that phones are not a distraction to learning and are not used negatively during social times. Whilst part of me wishes the Government would issue a blanket nation-wide ban on student use of phones in school (as is the case in some countries), I do 100% agree that schools need to be firm on this issue and allow no grey areas.

I've visited many other secondary schools and every time I go out, I am even more convinced that our mobile phone rules at Wensleydale are absolutely right. Students are welcome to have mobile phones in their possession at our school, and we don't ask them to be locked away in special lockers each morning like some schools, but they must not be seen or heard at all when a student is inside our school gates. If a phone is seen or heard then it is confiscated, a policy enforced by every member of staff.

It's a very simple rule and an effective one, and one that I know has had an impact on learning, behaviour, student wellbeing and in a reduction of online bullying. I am aware that the policy can be annoying to some parents and carers at times, but I stand by it as being one of the most transformative things we have done in the 10 years I have been Headteacher. I will always remain very grateful for the support of families with this policy, as together it is making a difference.

However, no matter what safeguards we put in place at school or at home, we as adults need to be mindful that the camera-phone can be a danger to the teenager who uses it. The BBC reported recently that the authorities had taken the unusual step of asking schools to warn students about the dangers of voluntarily sharing explicit images of themselves. It is a timely reminder that we need to keep

Once the images are out there, they can never be deleted. So often young people believe in or trust the person that they are sending pictures to, only to have that trust broken with serious consequences. More and more, criminals are now deliberately targeting teenagers and young adults in the hopes of exploiting their shame and embarrassment for money. For that reason, we as a school, will carry on making our students aware of the dangers of voluntarily sharing images online, and I'm sure that parents and carers will do the same.

Quaker Celebrations

Quakers celebrate 400th birthday of cofounder who had a vision of a great people in Wensleydale.

Four hundred years after the birth of their founder, George Fox, Quakers are celebrating with events across the world. Born in July 1624 into times of religious and political upheaval, Fox gathered people interested in a more egalitarian form of faith. With time they became known as the Quakers, or Friends. Today there are more than 400,000 worldwide.

Although the largest groups of Quakers today are in East Africa and South America, the movement's founder had an early vision of "a great people in white raiment by a river side, coming to the Lord; and the place that I saw them in was about Wensleydale and Sedburgh."

Fox believed that rather than needing to worship in "temples made with hands", people could simply "wait to receive the Spirit of the Lord, that they might know themselves to be the temples of God." A group meeting according to these principles settled following Fox's visit.

Quakers today are present in more than 100 countries, with events to mark Fox's birthday in many of them. Quakers continue to meet locally at Bainbridge, Kirkby Stephen and Brigflatts.



Heavens Above

If you look high in the south-east on a clear night this month you can't possibly miss brilliant blue-white Vega, the 5th brightest star in the sky. It's easy to recognise as there aren't any other bright stars nearby.

Together with Deneb in The Swan and Altair in the Eagle, it forms the famous asterism or star pattern called The Summer Triangle which dominates the night sky right through Summer and well on into Autumn. The Triangle isn't an official constellation – the term was invented by the late Sir Patrick Moore some years ago – but it seems to have caught on and everybody uses it.

Vega itself is a young, hot star much bigger than the Sun, lying a mere 25 light years away – a gnat's whisker as cosmic distances go. One of its many claims to fame is that it was the very first star to be photographed way back in 1850. More recent photographs show that it's surrounded by a ring of dust and rocky debris where astronomers think planets are in the process of being formed.

Vega is the main star in the small constellation of Lyra (the Harp) which is meant to represent the instrument played by Orpheus, the famed musician and poet of the Ancient Greek myths, when he attempted to bring back his young wife, Eurydice, from the Underworld - she'd died from a snake-bite shortly after they were married leaving Orpheus inconsolable. Hades the King of the Underworld was so entranced by Orpheus' musicianship that he

DL10 4SX agreed to Eurydice being allowed to return to the Upper World but on one condition – that Orpheus must lead the way and not look round to see Eurydice until they were both through the gates of Hell and back into the sunlight. The couple had nearly reached the gates when Orpheus panicked, glanced back for a split-second to see if Eurydice was really following only to find her sliding back into the gloominess of Hades never to be seen by him again.

Most of the planetary action this month is still in the very late evening and early morning sky apart from Venus, which is lost in the Sun's' glare, and tiny Mercury, the innermost planet, which puts on a good show in the early part of the month. You should be able to catch sight of it very low in the north-west straight after sunset. The best time to look out for it is on July 7th when it forms a striking tableau with the slim crescent Moon. Mercury's pinkish- gold dot lies immediately below the lunar crescent. A lovely sight seen with a good set of binoculars. Have clear skies!

Dales Quoits League

The Upper Wensleydale teams of the Dales Quoits League are slow to find form this season. After promotion last year the renamed 'Middle House, Askrigg', formerly the White Rose, are at fifth place in Division 1 as they adjust to the more exacting standards of the top flight.

Also sporting a new name while retaining their old position are 'Village Pub, Redmire', formerly The Bolton Arms, who are propping up Division 2. Meanwhile, 'The Fountain, Hawes' are currently in fourth place in Division 2 after a sluggish start. Hawes did pitch well enough to move through to the second stage of the League KO Cup, beating old rivals Askrigg in a nail-biting clash in grim weather conditions at the Middle House.
