Guest Editorial

"I was born too soon", was sometimes said by someone I knew, who was born in 1899. She suffered all her life with depression. In her early years she received very little sympathy or understanding, mainly because at that time the people around her had no knowledge of her condition, so she was often told to "Snap out of it". It wasn't until the 1950s when antidepressants were discovered that her life became more tolerable.

In our 24/7 media world of today it is hard to imagine that the early years of the twentieth century must have been a very lonely place for people with mental health issues. No television, or radio, therefore no open and public discussions where people with similar conditions could talk about their situation, no experts giving advice, no information being sent across the airwaves. No social media, which may, or may not have been a good thing and probably no close friend with whom she could confide. She must have felt very alone.

It was also in the early years of the twentieth century when men and boys were returning home from the First World War, physically injured and mentally scarred. Who knows what atrocities they had seen and had to live with for the rest of their lives and very rarely spoke about it. How many times have you heard people say, "He was in the war, but never talked about it"? Fortunately there was some help for them. The Royal British Legion was founded in May 1921, primarily to provide help for those affected by World War1.

Treatments applied to what was know as "shell shock" ranged from very gentle to the more extreme. Later this condition became known as post-traumatic stress disorder, but it wasn't officially recognised until 1980, although the symptoms were being recorded in America in the 1970's when veterans from Vietnam were returning home and more was learnt about the condition. In the early years of the twentieth century not everyone had sympathy for these returning servicemen, some saw them as cowards and malingerers.

What a different world we live in today. Now mental health issues are better understood and no longer carry a stigma. We are encouraged to talk about anything and everything openly. Some subjects being so intimate and personal, previous generations would have been horrified and would have had them reaching for the smelling salts. It is only relatively recently that mental health concerns have been so openly discussed and the subject become less taboo. People are now encouraged to discuss their problems, more so since Covid 19 when it was assumed that the whole country was in a collective depression. We were all encouraged by the media to "open up", discuss our anxieties, hug a tree, take a walk in the countryside or, discover the therapeutic benefits of gardening.

Many programmes on television which involved a discussion would gravitate to the assumed depressed state of the nation, nature and gardening programmes to name a few. "Celebrities" were encouraged to come forward and talk about their mental state so it seemed that everyone in the country had an issue. We were in danger of going too far the other way and not distinguishing the difference between a genuine and serious mental heath problem and a temporary set back in life.

Very few of us are given a smooth path to travel during our time on Earth, but some of us can cope with the bumps in the road better than others. For those who cannot cope there is help at hand. Not necessarily in the over worked N.H.S. where there can be a long wait to see a

psychiatrist and parents wishing to have their children assessed for autism or ADHD can have a two year wait.

Help can be found in other ways. I was once in a large church in the Midlands where a Christmas tree festival was being held. There were over two hundred trees inside the church. There was one section of maybe a dozen trees or so where each tree was sponsored by an organisation or charity offering to help people through a dark time in their lives. I had not heard of some of them and didn't realise that so many existed, but between them they seemed to have covered every eventuality. This was in a town where there is a fair sized population. Rural areas maybe do not have the same choice and have to search harder or, travel further for help.

We have come a long way since the early years of the twentieth century and through the power of media we have become a more informed and hopefully caring society. No one needs to suffer in silence today if they look and ask for help. Let us be thankful that our problems can be discussed openly without the fear of a stigma, as many other people are in the same position. We live in a more understanding time where help is to hand, so if you have mental health issues then talk about it, if you don't then be the one who listens, so no one today can say they were born too soon.

Heavens Above

The Summer Triangle dominates the evening sky for the next few months. It's not a constellation as such but a large asterism or star pattern formed by Vega, Deneb, and Altair, the brightest stars in the constellations of Lyra the Harp, Cygnus the Swan and Aquila the Eagle.



All three stars are pretty easy to identify. Steely-blue Vega, the brightest of the trio, marking the Triangle's north-west corner, lies almost overhead at present, so its easily located. Deneb, the second brightest, lies at the Triangle's northeast corner and sits at the top of another well-known asterism, the Northern Cross, which outlines the Swan's body. It's a really formidable star, much bigger than our own Sun and nearly 200,000 times more luminous. The last of the trio, Altair, marks the head of the Eagle and forms the Triangle's southern corner. Altair's a very young star about a 100 million years old, and around twice the size of our own Sun. It.'s an amazingly fast spinner taking just under 8 hours to rotate on its axis - the Sun in comparison takes a leisurely 25 days. As a result Altair bulges at the equator making it look like a gigantic satsuma.

On a clear moonless night from a dark location, well away from street lights and the like, you can trace the Milky Way as it flows down through the Triangle towards the rich star clouds of Sagittarius low on the southern horizon. Its pale, luminous ribbon is a treasure trove of star clusters and gaseous nebulae well worth sweeping with binoculars or a wide-field telescope.

During July we're right in the middle of the Noctilucent Cloud season. Displays of these rare silvery-blue high altitude clouds can be really spectacular especially when they spread right across the sky. Look for them glowing wraith-like low in the north-west after sunset, and in north-east just before dawn. If by any chance you are out and about in the early hours keep an eye out for Venus shining brilliantly low in the north-east. On the mornings of July 21 and 22 it lies close to the slim crescent Moon. A striking sight in the deep blue pre-dawn sky. Have clear skies!

Notes from Thorney Mire

Late Spring

I was opening the door of the outbuildings when something shot above my head and got in there before me; it was a swallow. It circled round for a while presumably looking for somewhere to nest, then flew out again. There was a pair of them. I saw them the following day and then they disappeared and I never saw them again. No swallows have nested with us this year and I have not seen any house martins. Where are they all? A few years ago we would have had several nests of swallows and house martins under the eaves of the house. The sky seems empty without them.

On the same day that I saw the swallow I heard the cuckoo. It was some distance away. I didn't hear it every day, but on several days afterwards. Once it was so loud it must have been close but I didn't see it.

We may not have had swallows, but a variety of other birds have nested in the garden and the surrounding area. Goldfinches built a home in the tall cypress tree several weeks ago and are still there now. They can have two or three broods a year. Blackbirds became their neighbours in the adjoining golden cypress where they reared their young. Spotted flycatchers renovated an old nest made of moss in the trellis in the front garden and reared three chicks.

I have managed to pot up all my window boxes and hanging baskets, but the wall baskets have had to wait because a wren chose to nest in the mossy lining of the basket next to the kitchen window. Wrens can have two broods a year, but I hope this one chooses not to as I've got geraniums waiting to go in there. There is a very small T-shaped gap in the stone work in one of our outbuildings. A blue tit managed to squeeze through the hole which would have been an achievement if it had done it from a standing position, but to fly in there from a small area between the wall and the greenhouse was even more incredible. It had to hit the gap at the right angle with Red Arrows precision, or it would have crashed. The gap was too small for me to see the nest, but I know there were chicks in there as I saw her doing her house keeping and removing the faecal sacs. (Apologies if you're eating). I have seen a young thrush in the garden, so there must have been a nest close by,

also a young robin looking a bit lost and not yet sporting its red breast.

There has been a frenzy of feeding around the bird station. A male chaffinch was feeding a young one. The female greater spotted woodpecker became an almost permanent feature on the peanuts, so would have had a nest in the wood. We had a family of great tits and the only way you could tell the difference between the old and young was to watch which one was being fed by a parent. A nuthatch came to feed by itself, then, out of nowhere, two gatecrashing siskins arrived and started to bully the great tits. The male woodpecker flew in which ended the dispute, as all the other birds flew away.

Darby and Joan, our two local collared doves have not put in much of an appearance this year, but they flew by yesterday afternoon when I put some bread on the feeders. They don't seem to like commercial food but prefer kitchen scraps.

I'm in dispute with a wood pigeon at the moment. I don't mind it hoovering the debris the other birds have dropped, but I do object to it sitting in the pots and flattening my plants. It's no lightweight!

I have not seen any red squirrels recently, but I've seen a hare on several occasions, One afternoon I saw a red deer with a faun in the wood, but she didn't hang around when she realised that I was watching her.

Twice recently, when I have been weeding in the garden I have accidentally disturbed two ants' nests exposing the larva. There are over 12,000 ant species in the world, but I suspect these were the black garden ants. Once the larva are exposed then it's action stations! Lots of little bodies running around in search of the vulnerable larva, picking them up in their pincers and returning them under the soil for protection. Some of the ants seemed to know what they were doing and retrieved the young straight away, others seemed to be heading in my direction, they probably thought I was the enemy and were going to mount an attack. Ants are some of the strongest creatures in the world in comparison with their size and can carry fifty times their own weight. They sometimes band together to remove larger objects, but even so, I think they might have had a bit of a problem with me.

Thornton Steward Sailing Club (TSSC)

Setting Sail for the Future: How TSSC is Keeping Sailing Alive in the Yorkshire Dales.

Nestled in the breathtaking landscape of Wensleydale, just five miles west of Bedale, lies an oasis for water sports enthusiasts—the Thornton Steward Sailing Club (TSSC). A Royal Yacht Association Recognised Training Centre, TSSC has become the heart of sailing in the Yorkshire Dales, offering everything from dinghy training to paddleboarding, kayaking, windsurfing, and even radio-controlled yacht racing. Beyond recreation, the club serves as an essential gateway for local schools and youth groups to experience the thrill of sailing and watersports first hand.

Why the Tide Must Turn

Despite its strong community presence and commitment to training future sailors, TSSC faces a crucial challenge: outdated larger dinghies that hinder the quality of instruction. These aging boats take forever to drain after capsizing, impacting both safety and learning. As demand for training grows, the club is seeking to upgrade its fleet with two modern, self-draining RS Quest dinghies—boats designed for durability, stability, and enhanced spinnaker training.

By investing in these state-of-the-art dinghies, TSSC aims to increase participation from 20+trainees to more than 30 annually, while also expanding its outreach to local schools and youth groups. This step will ensure that aspiring sailors can smoothly transition from beginner training to club activities and racing, fostering the next generation of skilled competitors.

We are currently in receipt of a Sport England grant to buy two new sailboats. This requires match funding of £7,500 and we are working with fantastic local businesses to raise this money using a crowdfunder page.

The RS Quest dinghies perform similarly to racing boats, ensuring students can seamlessly step into competitive sailing—perhaps even following the path of Britain's Olympic sailing champions.

Dales Countryside Museum

Our Class 2 children visited the Dales Countryside Museum to work on the 'The Herds' project. They worked with Rural Arts and the museum staff to make puppets of creatures in the Yorkshire Dales National Park and found out about how climate change might be changing their habitat. All the children enjoyed their creative day.

Bikeability for Year 6

As part of our PE provision Year 6 children have undertaken their Bikeability training run by Stage 1 Cycles. They worked on the playground during the morning and then the children went out training all day on the road. Leyburn Arts & Community Centre

Our Community Shed was last month officially opened after six years of hard work and collaboration by volunteers and supporters of the project.

The shed has been built in the grounds of St Peter and St Paul Roman Catholic Church adjacent to the Centre, which is based in the adjacent former Catholic primary school.

Three shipping containers were welded together to create the shed, which has been equipped with woodworking tools and also includes a space for crafting activities, workshops and IT sessions.

Funding for the £70,000 project has come from North Yorkshire Council, the Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust and the Wensleydale and Swaledale Quaker Trust, as well as other funders, the Centre's own funds and numerous donations from the public.

The shed was officially opened by Chris Ellison, who was the first person to donate to the appeal. She gave the money in memory of her late father Alan, a former metal and woodwork teacher who lived in Leyburn, also donating his tools to the shed.

Julian Pinches, project manager and a trustee of the Arts and Community Centre, thanked the organisations, businesses and members of the community who had supported the scheme.

He said: "£70,000 is quite a lot of money, but when you see what we have achieved with that money, I think you'll agree it's a bargain. There has been huge challenges to get where we are. None of us had any experience of doing this before but we've done it." He added: "We've now got 40 members and an even split of men and women, which we're delighted about." Exhibition: Inspiration – From Past to Present. **Until July 13th**.

Members of the Small Group have spent time exploring the museum collections, including knitting sticks, socks and gloves, textiles, wheelwright and blacksmith tools, minerals, ink wells, tinsmith shelves, fossils and items from the Victorian kitchen, medicine bottles and butter markers. All these things have been used as inspiration for stunning textiles, created using many different textile techniques and mixed media. The exhibition also showcases vintage garments repurposed to illustrate facets of the collection.

The Wensleydale Sheep: A Handcrafted History

This exhibition features the unique work of 40 textile artists from throughout the UK. Every piece has been crafted using native, rare breed Wensleydale Sheep wool. It is the first of its kind to promote the unique Wensleydale Longwool fleece and the versatile range of textile crafts for which it can be used.

This celebration of rural history, heritage woolcrafts, and the increasingly popular and sustainable practice of using British wool in textiles, highlights the Wensleydale breed as a luxury wool producer. The pieces vary from hand woven tapestries and knitted lace garments, to felted "wool paintings" and reupholstered furniture.

Special events link with the exhibition, organised by a small group of passionate individuals within the Wensleydale Longwool Sheep Breeders' Association.

A Sprint Not A Marathon

Certainly is, tackling a grassed area half the size of a football pitch and just as empty. We're pushed for time, the three of us having just a day to turn this featureless expanse into the beginnings of a garden, to soften with herbaceous borders and hard as nails smaller trees. The area fronts an immense house situated in parkland and is in desperate need of greenery. Situated south of Middleton St. George, it's a bonny, rural location but extremely exposed, so there are some careful choices to be made.

A medal please for the operator of that tiny mechanical digger who's spared us a ton of donkey work, partly excavating a trench for over a hundred hedging conifers. Nine inches down we're on to hardcore but Bob the Builder's made short work of that, quickly gouging out a decent depth for planting. Unfortunately, he's gone awol, so we have a 10ft pick and shovel slog remaining - time to roll up our sleeves. Don't you just love grunt work though, lets the mind wander and puzzle over the weird stuff - when was the last time I saw a pipe smoker, why no bypass for West Witton etc. Before you know it, job done and as our mate's been feverishly backfilling with yummy compost and planting, our hinges need oiling – brew time.

With the hedge boundary in place, spirits soar as we can now see a garden emerging -time's flying though so only a miserly 5 minutes for contemplative cuppas, deep breath and away we go, tree time. Viewing from the grand house, the eye follows the conifer hedge, left and right, as it converges on to a distant 10ft high thorn hedge. Pleasantly showy in summer, it's bare and gloomy for the rest of the year – solution? Inevitably, a couple of white birches, yes, I mention them EVERY article, either 'Jermyns' or 'Silver Shadow', planted 10 ft in front to create a mesh of luminous branches which will contrast effectively with that dingy background.

We're reducing as we approach the house with a pair of fabulous Crataegus persimilis pruniflia (just ask for plum leaved thorn, far easier), 15ft, white flowering, red berries AND autumn colour. Closer still, two 'Ballerina' Amalanchiers, 12ft, white, good late colour; that's enough now on the left-hand side as it's a mistake to overplant, as all ends up cheek by jowl and squabbling when what we need is plant harmony, thanks.

C'mon, no dawdling, onto the right-hand side where there's the problem of two giant manhole covers to disguise, so what to do? DON'T plonk a couple of containers over them - believe me, that would look, er, not great. Tiny features stuck in such a large area wouldn't work, so after a hurried consultation we decide to incorporate the problem into a larger rugby ball shaped border, 30 feet by 20 feet at its widest, and plant up with thuggish groundcover stuff: periwinkle, persicaria etc. with paired up red and yellow leaved berberises as centrepieces.

Phew, just look at that time, nearly 3 o'clock but let's not panic, the finishing line's in sight. Last up and most importantly, a pair of matching borders separated from the front of the house by a 10ft flagged patio. As this is in prime position, visible from lounge and three bedrooms, we need a wow factor without too much height, so peach coloured potentillas 'Daydawn', and 'Abbotswood', brilliant white, surrounded by a massed planting of asters, cat mint, golden oregano and lowering to the edges, especially for the lady of the manor, with fetching pink phlox and dianthus. You're welcome, ma'am.

That's it, exhale, all planted up for five o'clock in deep, rich soil with a cast iron promise from the lord of the manor to keep well-watered. Skates on now, we're all booked in for beer and pizza tonight, though as we leave, I'm looking beyond the infant hedge into a huge field and can't resist further suggestions. A couple of copper beeches and a smattering of my all-time favourite Austrian pines wouldn't go amiss and how about I just shut up as we obsessives don't know when to call it a day.



Literacy Strategy - Words Matter.

As we continue to embed the practice of Reading weeks, it is useful to understand why literacy is central to everything we do in schools. We follow the Education Endowment Foundation recommendations and below is a brief explanation of how we have implemented them in our school.

In September 2022 we began the journey by:

1. Prioritising 'disciplinary literacy' across the curriculum.

Disciplinary literacy emphasises the importance of subject specific support. We developed word banks in every subject and year group,, which has developed into our Homework booklets - students have to learn words and definitions from each subject each week for a key word test.

2. Provided targeted vocabulary instruction in every subject.

Teachers in every subject should provide explicit vocabulary instruction to help students access and use academic language. Our 'Fast 5' starter at the beginning of every lesson are 5 quick recap questions which revisits key vocabulary from the previous lesson, so that it is embedded...which also links in to.....

3. Develop students' ability to read complex academic texts.

To understand complex texts, students need to actively engage with what they are reading and use their existing subject knowledge. Reading strategies, such as activating prior knowledge, prediction and questioning can improve students' comprehension.

4. Break down complex writing tasks,

Writing is challenging and students in every subject will benefit from explicit instruction in how to improve. The introduction of teachers marking 'Live' in the lesson ensured we give prompt feedback.

5. Combine writing instruction with reading in every subject.

Teaching spelling, grammar and punctuation explicitly can improve students' writing, particularly when focused on meaning. The use of 'live' marking in terms of correcting Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar (SPAG) in every subject supports this strand.

6. Provide opportunities for structured talk.

Talk matters: both in its own right and because of its impact on other aspects of learning. Our introduction of Oracy lessons in KS3, a few years ago has embedded our debating skills for all students.

7. Provide high-quality literacy interventions for struggling students.

Schools should expect and proactively plan to support students with the weakest levels of literacy, particularly in Year 7. This is our biggest challenge and one that we are working towards for September 2025, More to follow.



They both really enjoy talking to customers and exploring new ideas for stock and services they can offer.



A few key changes to the layout and the addition of extra shelving has made the shop look more spacious. They have kept all the usual stock from local suppliers but have also added some new products like the "Fakeaway Freezer" range of pizzas, currys etc and Wensleydale ice cream. Helen is lactose and gluten intolerant and so stocks a wider range of 'free from' goods and dairy alternatives. There are a wider range of cheeses available and you can now get freshly baked pies on a daily basis. They have had a suggestion box in the shop and have already
