

Guest Editorial

Everyone knows that in Britain people talk a great deal about the weather, possibly because it is so infinitely variable but also because there is a long tradition of discussing weather in casual conversation. We might be furious with politicians, outraged by rising prices, appalled by dismal public services, but we feel on safe ground when chatting about the weather. We check the weather forecasts when we plan an outing and such is the general interest in weather prediction that I have met quite a lot of people who say they listen to the shipping forecast in the middle of the night as a cure for insomnia.

We would probably all agree that over the last few decades there have been changes to the weather. This year has seen torrential rain and long weeks of glorious sunshine that at times felt positively Mediterranean. In August I had sunburned arms after a day at the Reeth Show and hosepipe bans were in place across the country. Three years ago in 2022 a temperature of 40.2 degrees Celsius (104.4 Fahrenheit) was recorded at Heathrow airport. When it rains these days, the rain is often so heavy that it leads to serious flooding in many parts of the country. I don't remember apocalyptic rain in England years ago, but today torrential downpours are increasingly common. Friends across Europe report similar changes in the intensity of weather phenomena in winter and in summer. And of course, out in the countryside we experience the weather more directly, we can see the clouds gathering long before the rain starts, we can see the power of the wind increasing as we look at the way it shakes the trees. Weather matters more in the countryside, harvests depend on weather, drought or flooding can cause enormous damage that jeopardise people's livelihoods.

Here in the Dales we can see how important weather is for farmers, and we can see how even animals are attuned to the changes in weather. Mention sheep to townspeople and they might think of rather silly creatures, but the reality is that sheep are highly intelligent especially when it comes to weather prediction. I have often driven up the dale and seen sheep gathering in the lee of stone walls, anticipating the storms that will be coming in from the west, sometimes well ahead of the BBC weather forecasters. Sheep are canny weather predicters, and we can also learn from sheep when it comes to having a

sense of direction. I remember once following a flock of sheep moving down the Kettlewell road, through Gayle and over the beck, past the Creamery, then turning right through Hawes, turning left by the medical centre and on over the river to their final destination. How did they know where to go, I asked the shepherd who had been following them on a quad bike, to which he replied that it was just sheep instinct. Not one sheep tried to turn the wrong way throughout that 25 minute run! My admiration for sheep rose to new heights after that experience.

Sheep are an essential part of living in the Dales. In the Midlands village where one of my daughters lives there are fewer sheep because the village is primarily agricultural, so there are fields of potatoes, corn and cabbages. There used to be more cattle, but many of the old byres and barns have been converted into luxury homes, often bought by people moving out of big cities. Now we walk dogs past what used to be the sheep dip and the fields where I would take my small children to watch the cows heading back at milking time. The sheep dip has become a narrow strip of grass and the fields belong to someone who trains horses. Still rural, but differently so than in the north.

Three years ago when I was having chemotherapy I stayed with another daughter, who lives in London, albeit in a part of London with big parks and plenty of trees. But the shift away from nature can be seen in the fact that so many houses have replaced lawns with astroturf or, even worse, done away with their front gardens to create parking spaces. You see this now in many cities - desolate concrete areas in front of houses which means the end of habitats for insects, worms, butterflies and garden birds, not to mention the lack of flowers and the ugliness. What I find odd is that some of the people who have done this sort of thing are keen to pontificate about the effects of global warming, without making the connection between their behaviour and the impact it has on the environment for us all.

Thankfully, even in London, where you cannot see the stars because of the light pollution, nature is not entirely subdued. At night the shrieking of foxes as they wandered around the streets looking for waste human food kept me awake. The first time I heard a fox late at night I thought someone was being attacked, but eventually I adjusted to the noise. Urban

foxes are an example of how nature refuses to give in, even when fields have become housing estates.

I have come to think that the biggest factor that divides this country is not the growing gap between the haves and have-nots, nor the much discussed differences between north and south, nor even the gap between younger generations trained to use electronic media and older people who are less confident, but rather the great gulf between life in cities and life in the countryside. Everything in cities moves at a faster pace, but the biggest difference is surely the way in which nature is subjected to that heightened speed. In my daughter's road, theirs is the only house that has not replaced the lawn with astroturf. In my garden here in the north I listen to birdsong, and an app on my phone allows me to identity birds. One afternoon in summer there were 13 varieties of birds singing their different notes. In the last week the owls are back, calling just before dawn. And everywhere there are the gentle sounds of sheep. However bad the winter weather can be, being able to live so close to nature is a great consolation.

Red Alert

Every year, spring and summer always make a promise before autumn and winter come along to break it – that's how it feels to me anyway. There's a garden down dale which, months back, was budding up, brim-full with potential and readying to break out and display; it's all over and is now a blank canvas again, but rather than mooning about, I'm eagerly tensed up and plotting, awaiting the first decent day to take advantage and try a new scheme.

Red's the theme – I'll cram as much in as possible; listen up, you wily garden centres, I'll insist on a 'fire engine red' shade so don't fob me off with purples and oranges, are you colour blind? I'll want those almost scarlet blooms of dependable Weigela 'Bristol Ruby' as a starter-very easy to grow but best mothball those secateurs as any hard pruning means you'll never see a flower – just allow to reach 6 – 8 ft and enjoy the show. Let's include the shrub Potentilla 'Red Robin', an absolute shoo-in, in my opinion winning hands down against its brother, 'Red Ace', which I've rechristened 'Mucky Orange' as I've found it soon fades in direct sunlight.

If you're feeling more adventurous then why not try Callistemon 'Splendens', the Australian bottlebrush, which sounds exotic, but for the last 10 years we've had an absolute bonzer one down in tropical Leyburn, thriving and eventually topping off at 5ft, so be brave. A sheltered, well-drained site in full sun's the order of the day here; bees and butterflies swarm over those crimson bristles and, last year, we were mesmerized when even a dandy little hummingbird hawk moth fussed over it for an hour.

True red perennials, hmm, that's a tough one. Ladybird poppies, red cosmos, shouty geraniums are all done in a year - what we want are permanents like Crocosmia 'Hellfire' which, I believe, wins over the more popular 'Lucifer' by having a deeper, purer red. The latter is watered down with yellow flecks, spreads like a virus and gets so tall it tends to collapse and become a magnet for house hunting hedgehogs which is all well and good but no consolation in midsummer when you're after an upright display.

Another contender for back of the border would be Lobelia 'Queen Victoria'. So, a 6-inch ground hugging annual, only good for stuffing into hanging baskets as a dangling filler... wrong! This is a 3 foot absolute dish whose wine-red leaves perfectly complement masses of scarlet flowers which last for months however, be aware that this short-lived diva demands moisture retentive soil, so site near a pond or marshy area to guarantee survival. Of a similar size are the Campions, but unfortunately I find that they're the main culprits for red/orange/purple confusion; I'm not aware of a true red one although would try 'Arkwright's Vesuvius' for the name alone – christened by a foul tempered, Victorian, mill owning plant finder by the sound of it, splendid stuff.

On to smaller reds with the indispensable Helianthemums. I'll go for 'Beech Park Red' and 'Fire Dragon' rock roses to site towards the front; they're redder than a fire engine, more like a Royal Mail post box, oh I could talk distinctions all day, anyway, THAT kind of red, and I love them but just remember to prune lightly after flowering and they'll then keep their shape and live for years.

Two fiery herbaceous potentillas I'll use are 'Gibson's Scarlet and 'Monarch's Velvet'. Wine tasters use 'muscular red' to describe shiraz etc but I'm rolling it around my mouth and borrowing it for my two pet potentillas, perfect. These two will burn away and beef up the border and, if planted alongside Heuchera 'Red Tears', will give us the full squad. I've struggled with Heucheras over the years; fiendish capsid bug grubs eat them from the fleshy roots up, so they're always a risk for me, but you may have the magic touch.

So that's 'Red Alert' done, corrections, suggestions welcome; no doubt you'll have your own favourites, but admit it, aren't they just the tiniest bit purple or orange? - go on, be honest.

Hawes. They have learnt about the river, food chains and observed microscopic river life too!

Class 2 then sketched riverside animals and transferred these ideas into stunning watercolour paintings. They thought about the visual elements of line, shape, colour, texture and form and were encouraged to represent the animal in their own unique ways too. The end results were absolutely incredible! What talented children we have! They also completed some creative writing and a piece of bunting for the final display which will appear in the Museum later this term.

Class 3 also explored their creativity in the context of the nature that surrounds our rivers. After learning a lot of new techniques, they created incredible lino prints of river animals. The Hillary Family of Hillary Hall, **Burtersett – Quakers, Tropical Diseases** and Lifeboats!

There have been Hillary's in Wensleydale dating back to at least the 1600s, when a Matthew Hillary was born in Wensley. His grandson was William Hillary, born 1629, whose second wife, Ann Metcalfe, was the only child of Trinian Metcalfe of Birkrigg and Rigg House in Upper Wensleydale. On his death in 1686, these properties came to the Hillary family.

William and Ann had a son, John born in 1666, who became a Quaker as a young man and met Mary Robinson, the daughter of Richard Robinson of Countersett, head of a leading Quaker family. On their marriage, Richard and Mary lived at Birkrigg and had five children there, including William born in 1697. Birkrigg was a very isolated farmhouse, and around 1699, the growing Hillary family moved five miles down the Dale to Burtersett and a larger property, which became known as Hillary Hall. It was also much nearer to Mary's Robinson family in Countersett and more convenient for attending Quaker meetings.



Hillary Hall is today described as Grade Two listed, built in the late 17th century, and altered by John Hillary who put in larger windows and a moulded doorway and a keystone inscribed 1729. The house was altered again the 19th century. John and Mary had four more children born at Hillary Hall in the early 18th century. Hillary Hall passed to their eldest son Isaac, who lived there unmarried, until his death in 1783.

an apprentice apothecary with a fellow Quaker in Bradford, but decided to take up medicine. At that time, Quakers were not allowed to study at Oxford or Cambridge due to their religious beliefs, as they were not members of the Church of England. William therefore went to Leyden University in Holland and graduated there in 1722, his dissertation being concerned with fevers. He returned to England and started a practice in Ripon, later moving to Bath. His interest in epidemic diseases led to published research papers on mumps, smallpox and influenza. In 1747, he became the chief medical adviser in Barbados. There he specialised in the study of tropical diseases and gained a reputation in medical circles for his many books and pamphlets on this topic. He returned to England in 1759 and died here in 1763.

William's younger brother Richard Hillary, born 1703 in Burtersett, became a wealthy Liverpool merchant and ship owner. He was a partner in several companies trading with the West Indies, where he owned plantations with some 900 enslaved people. Richard married Hannah Wynne and they had three children – Richard, Mary and William. His son Richard continued the family business as a merchants and slave owners, but never married. He became a member of the Jamaica House of Assembly and died in Jamaica in 1803, leaving all his property and estate to his younger brother William.

His sister Mary born in 1775 also has a claim to fame, as she published a number of books of poetry and was a contributor to several periodicals such as The Literary Gazette. She married Henry Rolls, who became ordained and served as the rector of several parishes in Northamptonshire.

However, perhaps the most well-known of the Hillary family is Sir William Hillary who was born in 1770 in Liverpool, the youngest son of Richard Hillary and Hannah Wynne. William spent two years as an Equerry to Prince Augustus Frederick, Duke of Suffolk, the sixth son of George III. He learnt basic seamanship and navigational skills whilst sailing with the Prince in the Mediterranean. In 1800, William married Frances Elizabeth Disney Fytche of Danbury Place, an Essex heiress. In the same year, they had twins - Augustus William and Elizabeth Mary. William inherited the West Indian sugar estates from his elder brother in William Hillary, born 1697, began adult life as 1804 and, together with his wife's money, he spent some £20,000 on creating the First Essex Legion of Infantry - England's largest private army at the time, numbering some 1,400 soldiers. This army was put at the disposal of King George III, to defend against Napoleon's threatened invasion. As a result, he was rewarded with a baronetcy in 1805, becoming Sir William Hillary Bart, of Danbury Place, Essex, and of Rigg House, Yorkshire.

William got into debt, despite his inheritances, and had to sell off Hillary Hall and Rigg House. His marriage broke up and he divorced his wife under Scottish law in 1812. She continued to live at Danbury Place until her father died.

Leaving Essex, William went to the Isle of Man, possibly to evade his creditors. He married a Manx woman, Emma Tobin in 1813, but the wedding took place in Scotland. There is some controversy as to whether his divorce from Frances was truly legal, and this is partly borne out by the fact that William and Emma married a second time in the Isle of Man in 1828. Emma's family also had connections with slavery, as her brother Sir John Tobin, was a captain on several slaving voyages.

Living on such a small island, and with a nautical background, William was acutely aware of the dangers of ships being wrecked off the Manx coastline. He drew up plans for a lifeboat service for the British coast, manned by trained crews. In 1823 he published a pamphlet entitled 'An Appeal to the British Navy on the Humanity and Policy of Forming a National Institute for the Preservation of Lives and Property from Shipwreck'. At first, the Admiralty showed very little interest in his ideas, but William still had influential contacts with politicians and West Indian merchants who backed him. On March 4th 1824, the National Institute for the Preservation of Life From Shipwrecks was set up at a meeting in a tavern in Bishopsgate Street, London. King George IV later granted the royal prefix to the title. The first of the new lifeboats to be built was stationed at Douglas, in recognition of Sir William Hillary. He himself was actively involved as a crew member, helping to save over 300 lives. He was awarded three gold medals for gallantry, one of which was for saving the lives of those on board the steamer St George off the Douglas coast. The RNLI still use the family motto 'with courage nothing is impossible' on their long service medals which also feature a bust of Sir William Hillary.

Sir William Hillary died in 1847, two years



after his wife Lady Emma, and they are both buried in Douglas. In 1854, the name changed to the Royal National

Lifeboat Institution, and 200 years after its formation remains a vitally important volunteer service in saving lives at sea. A service of commemoration is held in Douglas each January to remember the work of their founder.

There have been several references in various publications to a link between Hillary Hall and Sir Edmund Hillary, the famous explorer. As yet, it has not been able to prove such a link, but if any reader knows of definitive evidence to prove or disprove this theory, the DCM would be very grateful to receive it, in order to respond to an enquiry from a distant Hillary relative in Australia.

Little Berries at Swinithwaite

Berry's Café and Farm Shop was developed by the Thornton -Berry family in April 2012.

More recently the café was run by Fairhursts but eventually it closed. The café will be missed by many but a new venture has emerged: a Child Care centre called Little Berries.

I visited the establishment last week and was struck by the sense of purpose and the efficient organisation of the enterprise. It is the brainchild of Charlotte, who is local to the Dales, being part of the farming community. She realised that there was a significant demand for child care, somewhere that parents could safely leave their children while they are at work. When Berry's Café site became available, it seemed the ideal place: a central Dales location, good access, plenty of parking and spacious accommodation. So plans were made to go ahead.

It took a lot of effort to get the project off the ground. The biggest stumbling block was Ofsted, the government inspection body. Their slow response meant that it took the first six months of this year for the go-ahead to be given. Finally on July 1st they got the clearance they needed. Fortunately the Thornton-Berrys were understanding and fully accepted the delay.

Since then, Little Berries has gone from strength to strength and is now very busy.

During term time the children are all pre-school age. Those aged from three months to two years are known as Seedlings, of whom there can be a maximum of twelve. Two to five year-olds are called Little Blossoms. There can be up to 24 in this group. Each of them is assigned a key worker who monitors their progress. Naturally, there is a lot of play activity but there are educational targets as well, so each day is well structured. They are long days too, starting at 7.00am and finishing at 6.30pm, which means that the staff have a twelve-hour day. In addition, during school holidays, children up to the age of eleven are also accepted, which must be much appreciated by many parents.

Charlotte has appointed a manager, Katherine, who deals with a lot of the organisation. There are seven child care workers, five full time and two part time, all of whom live locally. All are trained in child care, most to level three, some to level two, and there are two workers who are trained in special needs.

Such a long day requires some sustenance and I was astonished when Charlotte said that the children are fed five times a day: breakfast, lunch and tea, plus mid-session snacks. A full time person is independently employed to cater throughout the day.

It is quite obvious that Little Berries is a great success story. There is a positive atmosphere about the place and it is clear that they are providing a very valuable service. Long may it continue: this Newsletter wishes them well.



I am searching for a complete copy (50 pages) of the 2004 (approx) report Half a House, which was published following detailed external research into the feasibility of a scheme for affordable home ownership in the Upper Dales (Wensleydale, Swaledale and Arkengarthdale). An 8 page summary, with colour cover, was published in January 2004 but only the full 50 page report contains the original research and statistics, on which the scheme was based.

The innovative feature of the proposal was that it was not for the acquisition, development or letting of properties but on the feasibility of establishing a Home Equity Fund to help local people to afford to buy their own house. The chairman of the Joint Initiative was Peter Annison, who also wrote a short executive summary of the scheme shortly before he died in 2018. Heavens Above

If you're out and about on Bonfire Night check out this month's Full Moon. It's the biggest and brightest 'Supermoon' since 2019 – 14% bigger and 30% brighter than the faintest Full Moon. It won't look as spectacular to the naked eye as the images you'll find in the media, but if you can catch it just after its risen early on in the evening, you'll find it will look much larger than usual due to a famous optical effect known as the 'Moon Illusion'. This causes the Moon to appear larger to the naked eye when it's close to the horizon than when it's higher up in the sky. As far as I know no-one has come up with a really satisfactory explanation for why this should happen. Can you think of one?

If you look low in the north-east on a clear night this month shortly after 8.00pm, you'll spot mighty Jupiter, the Solar System's largest planet. Shining steadily close to Castor and Pollux, the twin stars in the constellation of Gemini, the giant world dominates the southern sky for the next few months. It's at its closest to us on January 9th next year when it far outshines any of the stars at a spectacular magnitude of minus 2.7. With a diameter of 143,000 kilometres Jupiter is bigger than all of the other planets put together. Despite its huge size it spins round on its axis in less than 10 hours. As a result, it bulges outwards at its equator like a monstrous satsuma. Befitting its status the giant planet has a retinue of 95 satellites but most of these are tiny objects just a few miles across. The four biggest, however, Ganymede, Europa, Callisto and Io, are much,

much larger (Ganymede is bigger than the planet Mercury) so are fairly easy to pick out with good binoculars, appearing as tiny points of light which change position from night to night as they shuttle round Jupiter in their respective orbits.

There's another opportunity to catch a few 'shooting stars' this month when the Leonid meteor shower comes to a peak on the night of **November 17th/18th**. There's no Moon about to spoil the view so you've a good chance of spotting a fair number of these high velocity meteors which originate from dust and debris left behind by Comet Tempel-Tuttle which was discovered in 1865. Best time to look out for them is before midnight.

We say good-bye to Venus at the end of this month. It's been a brilliant 'morning star' since early April but sinks out of view in the dawn twilight at the end of November. Its place is taken by the tiny innermost planet, Mercury, which puts on its best morning display of the year low in the east during the last few days of November and the first couple of weeks of December. Have clear skies!

Remembering and Responding

Since I was a child I have always found Remembrance Sunday a moving and a special occasion. Not in any jingoistic or xenophobic way but in a manner of respect and gratitude for the sacrifice of those who have gone before me. Those who had fought and struggled in so many different ways to create a world that would be better than the one they were living in - a world free from tyranny, fear and hardship. I lived with first-hand accounts from my family of what that meant, what that looked like and what that cost. This year the remembering has a particular timeline associated with it as we mark the 80th anniversary of the end of hostilities in Europe and the Far East.

During a recent visit to the Yorkshire Air Museum at Elvington I was struck by the size and fragility of the Halifax Bomber, 'Friday the 13th' that is housed in a hangar there. The Halifax flew in great numbers from Elvington and other airfields across East Yorkshire. My admiration was rekindled as I considered once more the courage and

self-sacrifice of my grandparent's generation and thanked God that I had never had to face such a similar challenge. And yet we know, all too sadly, that violence and injustice continue to ravage our world. It was never meant to be like this.

Writing some 800 years before the birth of Christ, the prophet Isaiah spoke the heart of God when he gave the instruction: 'stop doing evil and learn to do what is right. See that justice is done; help those who are oppressed, give orphans their rights, and defend the defenceless' Isaiah1:16f

In a world where we continue to create and deliver such havoc and horror upon one another, may we be willing to consider our part in it all and to do just that.

The communities of Upper Wensleydale will hold an act of Remembrance in St Margaret's Church in Hawes and in St Oswald's Church, Askrigg on Sunday, November 9th at 10.30am and in St Matthew's, Stalling Busk at 1.30pm.

A New Chapter With Rebrand and Sixth Form Closure

From September, The Wensleydale School and Sixth Form in Leyburn has officially rebranded as Wensleydale School, following the permanent closure of its Sixth Form provision.

The Sixth Form was suspended in 2023 and, after a two-year consultation process with the local community and stakeholders, the decision has now been made to close it permanently. Headteacher, Julia Polley, and governors explained that national policy changes, reduced funding, and the limited course offer available at a small school made it increasingly difficult to sustain a high-quality post-16 experience. Students were missing out on the wider opportunities, debates, and experiences that larger sixth form colleges can provide.

Instead, the school has focused on building strong partnerships with local providers, including Queen Elizabeth, Richmond, Darlington and York Colleges, Askham Bryan, and a growing number of apprenticeship routes. Wensleydale students have benefitted from taster days, career guidance, and support with transport to ensure they can make the best possible transition after Year 11.

The rebrand to Wensleydale School reflects its official redesignation as an 11–16 school. The refreshed logo and uniform – which will be phased in gradually – symbolise a simplified, modern identity that reinforces the school's inclusive and welcoming ethos. Importantly, the rebrand does not affect the school's values, policies, or behaviour standards.

Julia Polley said, "This is about looking forward. By concentrating all our resources on Years 7–11, we have seen a sustained rise in GCSE outcomes over the past four years. Our Year 11 students now take on senior leadership roles within the school, developing confidence and skills that will serve them well beyond their exams. We aim to continue to raise aspirations, secure high outcomes and teach a generation of young people to be kind."
